THOUGHT HE WAS A DEER.

Another Fatal Gunning Accident in the Maine Woods.

Greenville Junction, Me., Nov. 9.—W. C. Tuckey, a sportsman from Collinwood, Ohio, was accidentally shot by J. H. Hostatler, another western hunter of Toledo, Ohio, about 4½ miles from Lilly Bay, Moosehead Lake, early this morning.

The story of the accident, as related by one of the party, who accompanied the body here, is as follows:

Mr. Tuckey, accompanied by Hostatler, left the camp shortly after breakfast. They had proceeded hardly 50 yards when, striking a trail, Hostatler decided to sit down, allowing his companion to go ahead with the expectation of joining him later. In the course of half an hour a deer appeared and Hostatler having been perfectly still during his comrade's absence, the deer came within close range and, without a moment's hesitation, he fired. As he did so he heard a cry and on reaching the spot where the supposed deer stood, he found marks of blood, and only a short distance behind his companion with a bullet-hole in his head, lifeless. As near as can be learned up to the present time, the bullet struck its mark and glanced off, striking Mr. Tuckey and killing him almost instantly.

BIG FIRE AT PUGWASH.

Fine Residences and Business Places Wiped Out.

Pugwash, N. S., Nov. 11.—At 6.40 o'clock last night fire was discovered in Elliott's block, by James Connors, and in less than four hours about \$35,000 worth of property was destroyed. The wind was blowing a gale from the northeast and only for the heroic efforts of the large crowd present the whole south end of the town would have been destroyed.

Mr. Elliott's loss is serious, as his whole season's lobster catch, together with boats and fishing gear were destroyed.

A steamer or hand engine would have downed the fire in 15 minutes. The want of it has practically ruined every business man and burned out and destroyed some of the finest houses in town. The contents of the post office were saved and nearly all there was in the Gaston's house. The insurance will not be more than one-third. The origin of the fire is a mystery.

EDITOR STOREY'S NOTION.

Theory on Which He Remitted a Fine and Raised a Salary.

"I was slashing copy on old Storey's Chicago Times many years ago," said one of the guests at a reunion dinner. "We had a correspondent in an Illinois town who simply would not schedule his matter, but as he generally sent good stuff we let him run on, slashing his stuff to suit the exigencies of the night. Besides, his stuff always suggested good headlines, and that was one of Storey's hobbies.

"On one occasion the correspondent sent up about 700 words which went into 100, with nothing over. On the 100 words I constructed a headline which was right up to the mark. The next day I was instructed to tell the man who made out the checks for the country correspondents to knock \$5 off the correspondent's pay.

"When he received his check, he wrote to Mr. Storey saying that under ordinary circumstances he wouldn't kick about the deduction, but in this particular instance he did because the fool headline over the item made by a fool telegraph editor had infuriated the man whose name was mentioned in the dispatch and brought on a fight between him and the correspondent, the result of which was that the correspondent was fined \$5 in the police court.

"Mr. Storey was a very just man when you got at him the right way. He instructed the cashier to send the correspondent the amount of the fine and raised my salary because the headline I wrote had caused a row. That was his way of encouraging a headline writer."
