

TWO MORE CASES

Of Smallpox Developed
in St. John Today.

**BOTH ARE IN THE INFECTED
DISTRICT.**

**A Couple More Houses Added
to Quarantined Locality.**

(Special to Daily Herald.)

St. John, Nov. 11.—Only two new cases of smallpox developed today, one a child two years old. Both are in the infected district.

(Telegraph Monday.)

Saturday night and Sunday, five new cases of smallpox were reported. The death of one of the inmates of the epidemic hospital is also reported, the victim being Mrs. Beyea, whose infant, too, contracted the disease and is confined at the hospital.

The new cases are: Ethel McGuire, 19 years old, who resides with her relative, Frank Rafferty on the Marsh Road, about three miles from the city; William Alward, 70 years old, 10 Haymarket Square; his daughter-in-law, Mrs. H. E. Alward, 20 years old, same address; Harold Hamilton, 5 years, 95 Marsh Road; Rebecca Robinson, 65 years, a patient in the General Public Hospital.

The new cases add two houses to the number in quarantine, one No. 10 Market Square where the Alwards reside, and which is in the vicinity of other infected houses, and the Rafferty farm house on the Marsh Road, where Miss McGuire is ill. It is stated she was formerly a patient at the General Public Hospital and was released on the day the institution was placed in quarantine.

Altogether the cases now, including two in the country, number 33, and 27 of those are in the epidemic hospital.

Mrs. Beyea, who died between 5 and 6 o'clock Saturday afternoon, is survived by a husband and four children, who are quarantined in their home at the North end of Waterloo street, and an infant who is at the epidemic hospital which is within one hundred yards of the Beyea home.

Sunday afternoon the remains of Mrs. Beyea were taken to the Church of England cemetery and buried. There was no ceremony. En route to the cemetery the ambulance carrying the body, which was wrapped in a carbolic saturated sheet, and placed in a metallic coffin, was compelled to pass the house where husband and children of the dead woman were confined.

Mr. Alward is the second male adult to contract the disease since the Barton case. Persons who turned out in the snow and wind last night to attend the church service at the Tabernacle, Haymarket Square, and to listen to the new pastor, Rev. Howard H. Roach, were disappointed, as the church has been closed for the present owing to the smallpox in that vicinity. Several quarantined houses are quite near.

BURIED AMONG STRANGERS.

Samuel Long of St. Mary's Died at St. John Hospital—Remains Could not be Brought Home Because of Smallpox.

The remains of Mr. Samuel Long, of St. Mary's, who died of consumption in the General Public Hospital St. John Friday, was buried in the Church of England burying ground Saturday afternoon. It was the intention of the dead man's wife to have the body taken home for interment, but the Board of Health forbade its leaving the city. Rev. Mr. King, of St. Mary's, came down to the city to accompany the remains to York county, but he had to return to the widow with the disappointing intelligence. No person was allowed to view the body, strict precautions being taken to prevent the spread of smallpox, as Mr. Long had died in the quarantined institution. In explanation of a consumptive's presence in the hospital, which is contrary to the rules of the institution, it may be stated the deceased called there the day before quarantine was established to see if anything could be done for his ailment. He was closed in with the other patients. Mr. Long was forty-one years of age and a bridge builder. He was born at Land's End King's county, up Milkish way, and has brothers and parents there. They did not know of his death until Saturday morning, when two men went up in a small boat and told them. A widow and a ten year old son survive.—St. John Globe.

Another Wallace.

GRAIN COMPETITION.

1000 Illustration Plots on Canadian Farms.

The reports for 1901 from competitors who are operating a seed grain plot in the Macdonald Seed Grain Competition, show that the systematic continuous selections of seed grain recommended by Prof. Robertson, when given a practical test on Canadian farms, is meeting with the unqualified approval of all who are giving the work careful attention. Farmers are quite as much interested in the work as are their boys and girls. That which at first seemed wholly theoretical and capable of being followed only by the scientist, when brought into practice on their own farms, has turned out to be even more simple and quite as practical and as necessary to success, as the methods they have long been accustomed to follow in the selecting and breeding of poultry, pigs and sheep.

On the average farm of 100 acres, two acres of land—one for oats and one for wheat—is as much as is required for growing seed for the main crops on the farm. This seed grain land should be especially prepared with a view to forcing a vigorous growth of plants that will give a large yield of grain of good quality. The time required to gather by hand, before the grain is cut, sufficient of the best developed heads to produce enough good seed for an acre of land—the seed grain plot—need not exceed four hours with two persons.

Experiments have been conducted by Prof. Waters of the Missouri State Experiment Station, to determine the effect of a change of seed from one soil to another, and from one locality to another. Two varieties of wheat, three varieties of oats and two varieties of potatoes were used. Many samples of each variety were obtained. The results are remarkable. Here the productive capacity of the seed was accurately measured, and the difference between strains of seed of the same variety, obtained from the same locality, was in many cases greater than the indifference caused by variety on the locality from which the seed was obtained. In summing up the results Prof. Waters says: "The difference appears to be due more to previous treatment of the seed, than to a difference of climate or latitude. The productive capacity of the seed in several cases, was unquestionably reached before that of the soil."

What the competitors in the seed grain competition are doing, is simply growing seed grain on specially prepared plots of land—one quarter of an acre in each plot—selecting seed each year from those plots to sow on the plot for the succeeding year, by first gathering large well filled heads from vigorous plants before the grain is cut and when all the conditions of growth may be observed, and then threshing these heads and, by screening and hand-picking, selecting the large well developed grain for seed. To encourage the boys and girls in this work, Sir. William C. Macdonald of Montreal, donated the sum of \$10,000 to be given in cash prizes, according to plans which were arranged by Prof. Robertson, of Ottawa. This work of selecting seed has now been conducted for two years on over eight hundred Canadian farms which are fairly well distributed throughout the Dominion.

LORD STRATHCONA

**Says it Would not do to
Have a Colonial**

**APPOINTED GOVERNOR GENERAL
OF CANADA.**

**Occupant of Rideau Hall Should

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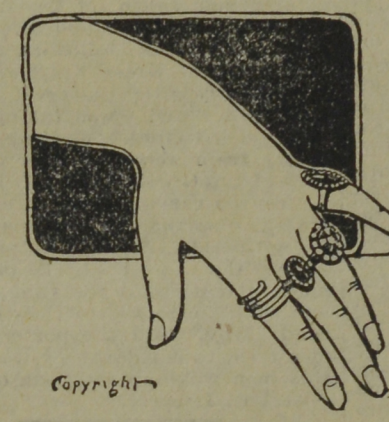
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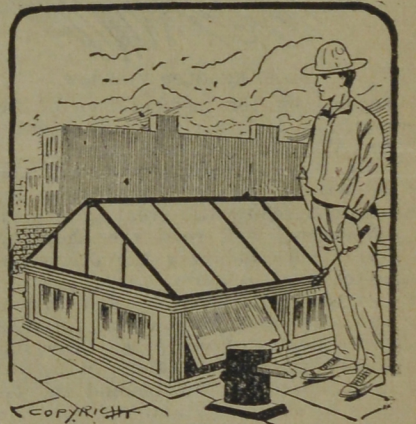
