Appointment Gazetted.

The appointment of Mr. Justice Gregory to be judge of the court of divorce and matrimonial cases in New Brunswick was gazetted Saturday at Ottawa.

The Natural History Society meets this evening in the High School. The subject for the evening will be "Birds." Mr. William Moore of Scotch Lake will be the speaker.

Mock Trial.

The students of the U. N. B. conducted a mock trial in the library of the college on Saturday evening. There was a fair attendance of spectators and the proceedings were greatly enjoyed by all.

Attended Divine Service.

The students of the University attended divine service in a body at St. Paul's church yesterday morning. A special sermon to young men was delivered by the pastor, Rev. Willard Macdonald, and was listened to with the closest attention.

College Y. M. C. A.

The members of the college Y. M. C. A. enjoyed a treat Sunday afternoon in the form of an address from Rev. F. C. Hartley, pastor of the Free Baptist church. The rev. gentleman spoke with his usual vigor and his remarks were listened to with great interest.

Two Alarms of Fire.

The alarm of fire on Sunday afternoon was for a burning chimney on a tenement house on George street located near the old well. The firemen turned out promptly but their services were not required. The firemen were again called out at six o'clock this morning for a burning chimney on a house on Smythe street occupied by a Mrs. Hamilton. No damage was done.

Death at Marysville.

Mrs. Nowlan, wife of Martin Nowlan, died at the home of Solomon Russell, Marysville, last night after a short illness. She was 38 years of age and is survived by a husband, now in the United States, and family of three children. The funeral will take place at two o'clock tomorrow afternoon, Rev. Mr. Pierce officiating. Geo. W. Adams has charge of the arrangements.

Moncton's Water Famine.

Owing to the shortness in the water supply from the reservoir the town is being temporarily supplied from Humphrey's upper mill pond, and pipes have been laid and the water is being pumped into the main pipe. Owing to the uncertainty in regard to the quality of this water, the Board of Health, as per notice in another column, advises all householders to thoroughly boil it before drinking or using for cooking purposes.—Moncton Transcript.

Stanley Keirstead Dead.

Stanley Keirstead, barrister, formerly of the firm of McKeown & Keirstead, St. John, and a graduate of the University of N. B., died Sunday morning at Sussex. He and Mrs. Keirstead arrived there about a week ago from their home in West Superior, Wis., and had been staying at the Depot House. He was hoping to recuperate his health, but a third attack of paralysis seized him Saturday night and he passed quietly away at an early hour next morning.

A Cold Snap.

Our citizens have experienced several different kinds of weather since Saturday, but it seems that autumn is still lingering in the lap of winter. There was a light rain fall during Saturday, followed by a drop in the mercury and a flurry of snow on Sunday morning. A strong wind sprang up during Sunday afternoon and the coldest snap of the season was the result. Ice formed along the shores of the river during the night, but not in sufficient quantities to interfere with navigation.

His Judgment Upheld.

The case of Ingraham vs The Temperance and General Life Assurance Company, decided by the Supreme Court last week, was first ventilated before Justice of the Peace, D. J. Stockford, who after due deliberation, decided in favor of the company. Ingraham afterwards brought an action against the company in the

County Court, for false imprisonment, and obtained a verdict for \$94, which verdict the full bench has set aside. Squire Stockford is quite elated to find that his interpretation of the law has been endorsed by the Supreme Court.

POLICE COURT.

Boys Under Arrest for Smashing a Church Window.

Two youths named O'Hara, aged ten and eight years respectively, were arrested on Friday, charged with throwing stones at St. Ann's church and breaking one of the large stained glass windows in that edifice. Their examination was commenced before Col. Marsh at the police court this morning, and after one witness had been examined, was adjourned until Monday next. The boys were released from custody upon their own recognizance, they having spent Saturday and Sunday in jail.

The boy who gave evidence, swore that he saw the accused throwing stones at the church but did not see him strike a window. It is said that the boys who broke the window, did so as a means of wiping out a grudge which they had against Verger Smuin.

PROSPECT NOT BRIGHT.

Corporation Drive May be Caught by the Ice.

The tail end of the corporation drive is reported to have passed Esli River on Saturday. Logs are running quite freely into the Douglas boom, and a great many are being rafted along the river and brought to Springhill. The water is very low and the contractors find it difficult to get men to work on the drive at this season of the year, still they are employing all that come along, and are making every effort to get the logs into the boom limits before navigation closes. During the past week the drive was moved at the rate of about two miles a day, which means that unless the conditions become more favorable it will take at least twenty days to reach the Douglas boom.

Fireworks and Band Concert.

The fireworks display and band concert in front of the Post Office on Saturday evening attracted a large crowd of people and passed off most successfully. The fireworks were in charge of Chief Lipsett, Assistant Chief Rutter, Johnston McKenzie and other members of the fire department. It was beyond a doubt one of the best exhibitions of the kind ever seen here. In addition to setting off numerous sky rockets, booms, etc., several new devices were introduced, including a transparent balloon and a Japanese policeman. These latter, after being lighted, went soaring heavenward and are probably going yet. The R. C. R. I. band rendered a choice programme of music during the progress of the fireworks exhibition.

Deserters Captured.

Sergt. Empey and Corporal Crampton, of the Royal Canadian Regiment, arrived from Halifax on Saturday after a deserter named Escubald, who surrendered himself to the military authorities here a few days ago. While the escort and prisoner were getting ready to leave the barracks guard room this morning, another young man, who claimed to be a deserter from the same regiment, put in an appearance and surrendered himself. The escort left for Halifax by the ten o'clock train with both prisoners in charge. Escubald belongs to Bermuda, and surrendered with the hope that he might be permitted to return home with the companies of the R. C. R. likely to go to the West Indies.

Only One Case.

Dr. B. M. Mollin, chairman of the County Board of Health, reports that there is only case of smallpox at Waterville in the Parish of Southampton. The patient is under the care of Dr. Owens and is reported to be doing well. All the members of the household where he is being cared for, have been vaccinated.

U N B vs. CITY

Exciting Football Match on Saturday Afternoon.

GOOD PLAYS MADE ON BOTH SIDES.

But the Game Resulted in a Tie.

UNIVERSITY TEAM HAS A GOOD RECORD FOR THE SEASON.

The teams representing the U. N. B. and City met Saturday afternoon on the gridiron for the second game of the series. The contest was snappy throughout and characterized by several good plays on both sides. The U. N. B. had the kick-off, the City failing to return it, and within five minutes the U. N. B. compelled the City to touch for safety. About the middle of the half McCarthy, the U. N. B. quarter, secured the ball from a throw in and dashed across the line for a try. The attempt at goal failed. After the kick-off by clever punting and passing, the City team worked the ball down to the College five yard line, and were trying hard to score when the whistle blew for half time. Score, U. N. B., 3; City, 0.

The second half opened with sharp playing on both sides. U. N. B. first gaining the advantage and carried the ball to their opponents 5 yards line, but the pressure on the city goal was relieved by a long punt by one of the city team bringing the ball well up into college territory. After a few minutes of play a try was made by Allen of the city team, but Babbitt failed to kick a goal. The game closed with the ball in city territory. U. N. B. 3; Fredericton 3.

The teams were very evenly matched. The U. N. B. scrimmage was far superior to that of the city. DeLong and Legere were specially noticeable. Sweeney and McCorquindale played their usual good game for the city. The clever passing and punting of the city halves was particularly noticeable, while the work of the U. N. B. half line though mostly defensive was strong and steady. McLellan and Tibbitts did especially good work for the city, the former making several good runs. Ryan and McKenzie played a good game for the College. The quarters on both sides played well keeping their halves well employed.

The U. N. B. team was the same one that played against St. Joseph's. The City team was made up as follows: Forwards, Sweeney, O'Regan, Slade, Smith, Moore, Sadler, McCorquindale, Allen; quarters, Tibbitts, Murray; halves, Dever, McLellan, Ferguson, Tibbitts (capt); full back, Babbitt. H. A. Allison, of Sackville, acted very satisfactorily as referee.

Death at St. Mary's.
