FROM LATE DESPATCHES AND EXCHANGES.

British Columbia ranchers are making heavy purchases of cattle in Ontario.

Mrs. Frances M. Woodworth, mother of Attorney General Longley, of Nova Scotia, died at Hantsport, N. S., Friday.

Kingston, Ont., Council has adopted a by-law authorizing the use of voting machines at the coming municipal elections.

The Grip Printing and Publishing Co., of Toronto, has assigned. The engraving business is taken over by a company calling itself Grip.

A new Liberal morning newspaper will be started in Ottawa early in the new year with A. J. Magurn, of the Winnipeg Free Press, as managing director.

A Crown Lands statement reports 85,883,925 acres, or 67 per cent of the province, still unsurveyed in Ontario, and 83 per cent of the province is still Crown lands.

Captain Thomas, of Fredericton Junction, came to St Andrews last week and purchased several thoroughbred young Holsteins from the "Chamcook Farm." Beacon.

During the Thanksgiving services in Plymouth Church Brooklyn N. Y. Thursday, Rev. Dr. Hills made an eloquent prayer for King Edward and the British nation.

Alex McRitchie, an aged farmer living at Scotland, Ont., slipped and fell into a 40-foot well on his farm Thursday and was drowned. He leaves a widow and eight children.

A resolution favoring a protective duty on corn was modified by the British National Conservative Union at Wolverhampton to demand for better protection of the food supply in war times.

There is a newspaper in Kansas whose motto is "Lie, steal, drink and swear," and is thus explained by the editor: "When you lie, let it be down to pleasant dreams; when you steal, let it be away from immoral associates; when you drink, let it be pure water; when you swear, let it be that you will patronize your home paper, pay your subscription and not send your jobwork away from home."

Sir Edward Grey, M. P. speaking at Glasgow Thursday night, declared that the country had been greatly shaken by what had happened during the South African war, and that it was only honest to tell the Irish members of Parliament he believed it was impossible to repeat the Home Rule experiment of 1892. Sir Edward expressed his conviction that no Liberal Government, dependent on the Irish vote, could do what the Irish people demanded.

Miss Jessie MacLachlan's friends will be sorry to learn that during the recent fog in Glasgow, burglars entered her home, which had been locked up while she and Mr Buchanan were in this country, and carried off everything of value except the heavy articles of furniture. What Mr and Mrs Buchanan feel most is the loss of many articles which had been presented to them during their artistic career, and which of course cannot be replaced.—The Scottish American.

James Wilter, who lives near Lockport, N. Y., came to Chicago recently in search of his wife, who had been missing seven years. He fell into the hands of confidence men and lost \$400. While in court taking out warrants against them, he saw his wife on the witness stand, testifying in a civil action. Wilter ran to her and embraced and kissed her, to the surprise of the court and lawyers. The pair had been separated by illness and never could get trace of each other. Mrs. Wilter will accompany her husband to New York.

NEW YORK CANADIANS.

A Toronto Gentleman's Speech Before Canadian Society.

THE PEOPLE OF THE DOMINION, HE ASSURED THEM,

Have the Utmost Faith in its Future as a Partner in John Bull & Co.

Mr. A. E. Ames, President of the Toronto Board of Trade, was one of the guests at the annual dinner of the Canadian Society of New York, and in response to the toast of "Our Guests," he said, in part:—

I feel very much gratified at having been asked to be present at your banquet. In looking at your clean-cut, honest faces I am impressed with the idea that you do not belong to that class of citizens who leave their country for their country's good; on the contrary, you impress me, judging as I do, to some extent, by your air of prosperity—which is not detracted from by the present surroundings—that you have left your country having the idea that it was for your own good. I am free to admit that your action has been of benefit, having regard to the sumptuousness of this feast, to those of us who are fortunate enough to be present from Canada at your invitation.

I understand that the night selected for this dinner is the 34th anniversary of Confederation. That subject has been touched upon by previous speakers, and, perhaps, I may leave it, and suggest that if the banquet had not been arranged on that account it might well have been arranged in commemoration of the notable victory in municipal reform which has just been achieved in Greater New York. It would not, of course, be in taste for me to talk politics to you, but in reading a number of New York papers this morning I gathered from all of them that the campaign was not fought at all upon political lines, but was in reality a contest for supremacy between the forces which make for good government and the forces which represent bad government. The influence of the result of your contest cannot, I am satisfied, fail to be very far-reaching, both in its effect upon the people and municipalities of your own country and the respect with which foreign countries will regard the affairs of this country. I might continue upon this strain, but that I am haunted by the possibility that the newspapers which I read may by a coincidence happen to have been newspapers opposed to the present organization, while some other papers may have regarded the issue as to some extent political.

GENUINE GOOD FEELING.

I was very glad to participate with you in the first toast, that to the President of the United States, and to join in a feeble way in the rendition of "America." Recognizing the feebleness of my effort I felt disturbed, because I recalled a very pleasing incident which occurred a few months ago in Toronto at a luncheon which was given to the State and foreign delegates to the World's Fair at Buffalo. These delegates in the heartiest possible way joined in the toast to the King, and, so far as I noticed, each and every one of them joined in our national anthem more vociferously than I was able to join in yours. We in Canada take a great deal of interest in the occupant of the Presidential chair in your country. In this connection it may not be out of place for me to mention, as evidencing the genuine character of this Canadian feeling, that it was my privilege to make a few remarks at a memorial service to a late President McKinley which was held in one of the principal churches in Toronto. In these remarks I tried to indicate something of the value which President McKinley had been to the great country whose affairs he administered. I said of him that during the past four years the progress of the United States had been so steady, while rapid, that it was hard to realize what an enormous difference there was in the conditions of the country between the time when President McKinley took office and when he died. At the first period the United States was the subject of suspicion amongst other peoples, and the stability of her Government was questioned by her own. Now the contract for payment of

money in the United States is regarded as a sacred contract, and no one questions but that your "dollar" means a dollar in gold of the standard weight and fineness, or its exact equivalent. President McKinley finished a life work of extraordinary usefulness, and at his death could afford to hand over the reins of government to his resolute and capable successor.

This is a great country, boundless in its potentialities, and is destined to play a great role on the world's stage. A modern nation of 75,000,000 energetic, resourceful, free—and equal—people, staggers one's senses in contemplating what it may mean in commerce, in art, in literature, but, above all, in the part it may play in co-operation with the Supreme Being in working out some portions of His tremendous universal plan. I take it, gentlemen, that this reference to the United States is not out of order in the Canadian Society of New York, and that, while you are deeply attached to the land of your birth, the United States has no citizens more faithful than you to the land of your adoption.

THE HERITAGE OF CANADA.

It is a little late, and I shall not touch upon one or two subjects about which I have been thinking. I should like, however, to say a few words about the country which lies just north of the border. A few weeks ago in Canada we welcomed the heir to the British throne, who has now arrived in England after having gone around the world, never having during that wonderful tour placed his foot upon other than British soil. The British Empire is too big a theme to need eulogy by me, and time only permits that I touch upon the Dominion of Canada. Canada has gone through the teething, colic and measles of infancy. Years ago she looked around upon higher natural resources, her latent possibilities, and learned, but as youths learn, something of the richness of her heritage. Maturing years have intensified her satisfaction with the value of her assets and her future, and I verily believe that now she is passing through that period during which she has been content with the attitude fitly described by Kipling, "Daughter am I in my mother's house, but mistress of my own." Believing this, it seems right that, in referring to the country, I should now change the gender from the clinging feminine to the self-reliant masculine. I do so in order to state that Canada—bound up forever, as I believe it is, with the empire of Britain—must yet become not merely a favorite son of an indulgent father, but more dignified, more natural now than that, shall I say, speaking in the language of these times of giant enterprises, a Vice-President and influential member of the Executive Committee of that aggressive combination, "John Bull, Johnny Canuck & Co., Unlimited." Canada is no longer petty in her interests. Her people have been slow to develop business they did not understand. But the last five years have completely changed the aspect of her affairs. She has gained much experience. She has gained great wealth. As a nation Canadians are not foolhardy, but there is no people more courageous, and I am satisfied that the next few years will draw attention to the magnitude of her labors, the richness of her resources, and, last but not least, to the calibre of her people.

ROYAL SCANDAL

Of Netherlands Grows Almost Daily.

LATEST REPORT IS PRINCE HENRY FOUGHT A DUEL.

Wounded in Stomach Man Who Interfered.

Amsterdam, Nov. 30. — Sensational stories of a royal scandal are again current. It is learned from an intimate court source that it is not improbable that Queen Wilhelmina will apply for a divorce on grounds of cruelty and improper behavior on the part of the prince consort.

Public sentiment is intensely with the queen. Last night a biograph picture of Wilhelmina, which was displayed at the Carre theatre, was tumultuously cheered, while one of the prince consort was loudly hissed.

A letter received from a well informed Hague correspondent states: "There is no longer any doubt that the queen's illness is due to her consort's ill-treatment. A personal friend of Maj. Vantes, adjutant of the royal household, tells me that Vantes had the courage to interfere once when the consort had actually struck the queen. This led to a duel, in which Vantes was dangerously wounded in the stomach, and now lies at death's door."

"Prince Henry has been absent from the Het Loo palace, where the queen, still is, since the duel. He is officially described as hunting in Germany, but it is believed he has been summoned by the kaiser, whom he still regards as his oberst kriegsherr (uppermost ruler in wartime) to explain his behavior."

"It is now asserted that the prince was averse to the marriage from the first, but that the kaiser insisted on it, in view of the increasing German influence in Holland. This is said to explain the unhappy appearance of the prince at the wedding, which was then generally remarked."

"Dowager Queen Emma is heart-broken over the outcome of the marriage, and is now endeavoring to effect a reconciliation."
