CRETE'S INDEPENDENCE.

Copenhagen, Oct. 22.—Negotiations have been reopened between the four protecting powers with regard to the independence of Crete. King George of Greece already had a long conference with the Czar and King Edward, and the question is the principal object of his visit to Paris, whence he proceeds to Vienna to discuss matters.

STEAMER AGROUND.

Mr Douglas had found trouble with certain weeds this summer. A house on the turnip crop had been very destructive.

All voted that it was a very successful meeting. Next meeting will be held at Stanley.

JOHN CRERAR, K. C.

A Hamilton Man Who Takes an Interest in Sports.

The Montreal Star publishes the following sketch of John Crerar, K. C., of Hamilton, Ont., whose daughter recently became the wife of Chas. E. Neill, late of this city:

John Crerar, K. C., Hamilton, Crown Attorney and Clerk of the Peace for the County of Wentworth, now famous in this and many other parts of the country for his oratory, was quite a celebrity in sports years ago. When the original Tecumseh Baseball Club of London was organized, Mr Crerar was selected as its captain, and under him it achieved great distinction as an amateur organization, before such men as Goldsmith. Powers and Mountjoy landed the National championship almost a quarter of a century ago. Mr. Crerar was one of the four curlers who went from Hamilton and won a trophy at the Montreal winter carnival sports twenty years ago, and has since been prominent as a bowler and golf player. He holds the peculiar distinction of being orator to the Ontario Lawn Bowling Association, an office that was created especially for him some years ago.

HIS DAYS NUMBERED.

Anarchist Czolgosz Will be Executed This Week.

Albany, N. Y., Oct. 21.—Warden Meade, of Auburn prison, was in conference today with Superintendent of State Prisons Collins, arranging the details for carrying out the sentence imposed on Czolgosz, the murderer of President McKinley. They went carefully over the 1,200 requests received for invitations to the execution. There will be but 26 witnesses admitted. The prison physician will be assisted in the conduct of the autopsy by Dr. Carlos MacDonald, former president of the state commission in lunacy. There will also be a number of other physicians in attendance.

The details for the execution have been practically completed. It is believed the execution will take place before 6 o'clock on the morning of Oct. 28, or if everything cannot be ready on that day, at a similar hour on the 29th. The work of selecting the jury to sign the death warrant of the murderer has been completed but their names are withheld.

THE LATE N. F. DAVIN.

The Funeral Took Place at Ottawa.

Ottawa, Oct. 21.—The funeral of the late N. F. Davin, K. C., ex-M. P., took place this afternoon to Beechwood cemetery immediately after the arrival of the Winnipeg train. There was not a large attendance, due to the fact that the notice was so short. Among those present were: Hon John Haggart, Hon J. C. Patterson, Mr Birkett, M. P., Mr Belcourt, M. P., Mr Marcell, M. P., Sir James Grant and a delegation from the parliamentary press gallery. In the cemetery chapel the burial service was read by Rev. Mr. Moore, pastor of Bank Street Presbyterian church. Geo Taylor, M. P., and others telegraphed their regrets at not being able to be present owing to short notice.

A committee has been formed in Holland for the purpose of ending the Boer war by boycott. The plan is to order a general strike of Belgian, French and Dutch dock laborers, forbidding the men to load or unload freight for British ships. This, it is considered, would seriously interfere with English trade and merchants would further be requested not to ship by British vessels. The merchants who would refuse to use British ships would give indubitable proofs of their attachment to the Boer cause, inasmuch as over half of the world's carrying trade is done by the use of British ships.

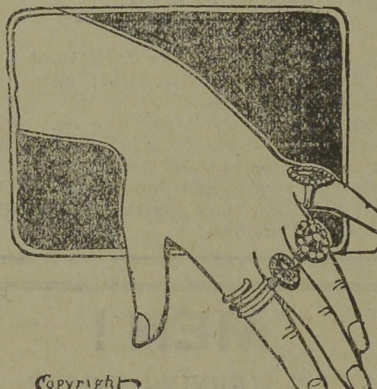
