PRINCE OF WALES

Astonished Londoners by His Eloquence.

IMPRESSIONS DERIVED FROM HIS COLONIAL TOUR.

Hearty Welcome in the Great Metropolis.

London, Dec. 7.—The visit of the Prince and Princess of Wales to the city yesterday evoked demonstrations of loyalty worthy of the best traditions of the capital of the British Empire. It was the first royal visit to the city since the accession of the King, and the citizens rose to the height of such an unique occasion. Happily, the day was not foggy, and the royal couple made their progress in comfort through the gaily decorated streets and cheering crowds to the Guild Hall, where the Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Court of Common Council were waiting to welcome them home from the memorable tour.

The scene in the library of the Guildhall was one of utmost brilliance, the bright colors of the levee of diplomatic dress, which was worn by the guests, contrasting prettily with the mazarin gowns of the Councillors. Here the city's address of welcome was read by the Recorder, and after a short reply from the Prince a move was made to the Guildhall proper, where a sumptuous dejeuner was served. Endergues and flowers, corporation silver and viands in richest profusion covered the board, and behind the chief seats at the longer table was ranged the famous gold plate of the city.

The great feature of the occasion was the speech of the Prince in response to the toast of his health. The statesman-like tone of his remarks astonished the 900 assembled guests. He spoke in warm terms of the loyalty, affection and enthusiasm which invariably characterized the welcome extended to the Princess and himself throughout their 45,000 miles tour. He referred to the journey across Canada, which enabled them to see something of the matchless scenery of that vast territory, the richness of its soil and its boundless prosperity. They saw, too, the success which crowned the efforts that have been made to weld into one community the people of the two great races residing there.

If he were asked to specify any particular impression derived from the tour he would unhesitatingly place before all others that of loyalty to the Crown and attachment to the old country, and were he to seek for the cause which had created and fostered that spirit, he would attribute them, in a large degree, to the life and example of Queen Victoria.

After appreciation of the military services rendered to the empire by the colonies, the Prince pointed out that if Great Britain wished to hold her own against the foreigner in the commerce of the world she must take advantage of the mineral wealth and vast expanse of virgin soil in the colonies, and send the surplus population of her cities to live there, under healthy conditions, liberal laws and free institutions.

MANY GIVEN VICTORIA CROSS. Record Cases Which Have Been Singled Out for Conspicuous Bravery.

The Victoria Cross has been conferred upon the undermentioned non-commissioned officers and soldiers for conspicuous bravery in South Africa.

Sergt H Hampton, 2nd Battalion Liverpool Regiment.—On August 21, 1900, at Van Wyk's Vlei, Sergt. Hampton, who was in command of a small part of mounted infantry, held an important position for some time against heavy odds, and when compelled to retire, saw all his men into safety, and then, although he had himself been wounded in the head, supported Lance-Corporal Walsh, who was unable to walk, until the latter was again hit and apparently killed, [Sergt. Hampton himself being again wounded a short time after.

Private H. G. Crandon, 18th Hussars.—On July 4, 1901, at Springbok Laagte, Privates Berry and Crandon were scouting towards a kopje when the Boers suddenly opened fire on them at a range of 100 yards. Private Berry's horse fell and became disabled, and he was himself shot in the right hand and left shoulder. Pte Crandon at once rode back under a heavy fire to his assistance, gave up his horse to the wounded man to enable him to reach shelter, and followed him on foot, having to run for 1,100 yards all the time under fire.

Private C Kennedy, 2nd Battalion Highland Light Infantry.—At Dewetsdorp, on November 22, Private Kennedy carried a comrade, who was dangerously wounded and bleeding to death, from Gibraltar Hill to the hospital, a distance of three-quarters of a mile, under a very hot fire. On the following day, volunteers having been called for to take a message to the commandant across a space over which it was almost certain death to venture, Private Kennedy at once stepped forward. He did not succeed in delivering the message, as he was severely wounded before he had gone twenty yards.

Private E. Durrant, 2nd Battalion Rifle Brigade.—At Bergendal, on August 27, 1900, Acting Corporal Wellar having been wounded, and being somewhat dazed, got up from his prone position in the firing line, exposing himself still more to the enemy's fire, and commenced to run towards them. Pte. Durrant rose, and pulling him down, endeavored to keep him quiet, but finding this impossible, he took him up and carried him back for 200 yards under a heavy fire to shelter, returning immediately to his place in the line.

Sergt.-Major Alexander Young (Cape Police).—Towards the close of the action at Roiter's Kraal, on August 13, 1901, Sergeant Major Young, with a handful of men, rushed some kopjes which were being held by Commandant Erasmus and about twenty Boers. On reaching these kopjes the enemy were seen galloping back to another kopje held by the Boers. Sergt.-Major Young then galloped on some 50 yards ahead of his party, and, closing with the enemy, shot one of them and captured Commandant Erasmus, the latter firing at him three times at point-blank range before being taken prisoner.

Three rivers, Quebec, has the honor of the first long-distance electric power transmission plant in Canada. The power comes from Grand Chute, on the Batiscan River, 16½ miles from the city, and operates 6,000 16-candle-power incandescent lamps, 100 32-candle-power lamps, and 87 1,200-candle-power arc lamps.

Two persons were burned to death and seven injured in a fire at Carnegie, Pa., Saturday morning. The dead are Mrs. Sarah Klee, 43; and Mary Klee, 9. The father was badly burned while rescuing a baby boy, and the other children injured by having to be thrown out of a window.

EVANGELISTIC WEEK FOR SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

To Superintendents, Teachers and other Workers.

In accordance with the resolution passed at the recent Provincial Sunday School Convention in Fredericton, the Executive Committee takes this means of calling your attention to the important matter of evangelistic work in the Sunday Schools.

We believe that there are tokens of God's favor in reviving his work, and from the teaching of his word, with personal effort to get consideration of eternal things, we ought to expect his blessing.

In the past years some schools have sought and received a gracious outpouring of the Holy Spirit, and many scholars have been turned to the Saviour and have since lived Christian lives. Does not this indicate that he is ready to be found of all who seek him earnestly, and that the time has come for "a forward movement" towards God, that our Sunday School may be visited with his salvation?

The second week of January is recommended by our Provincial Convention as a week of prayer for our Sunday Schools, during which special appeals be made to bring the scholars to a decision of Christ.

The result of such movement will depend upon the preparation beforehand in the heart and mind of Sunday School workers. It is not even now too early to begin such preparation. We therefore suggest that superintendents and teachers arrange for an early conference with their pastors and other christian workers to consider:

1. If God is pouring out His Spirit elsewhere, quickening teachers and turning scholars to Himself, has not the time come for special prayer and effort in your school?

2. Whether this can best be accomplished by your own school alone, or by uniting with other schools in your locality?

3. Whether it would be of advantage to ask help from persons of experience outside your locality, and can this committee render any such aid?

One denomination has already adopted this evangelistic week.

We ask your prayerful consideration on this subject, fraught with as much interest to home, church and nation. We believe that God is calling and not to respond may be to close the doors for a long time.

As an organization set for better Sunday school work, we desire to aid this in every way we can.
