FROM LATE DESPATCHES AND EXCHANGES.

Hall Caine has consented to become a candidate for the Manx (Isle of Man) Parliament in behalf of the town of Ramsey.

It is reported that H. M. Crill, a miner, lumber expert and prospector, has discovered the location of an extinct canal across the United States of Columbia, which he thinks at one time connected the Atlantic and Pacific oceans.

Francis J. Lascelles, brother of the Earl of Harewood, has been acquitted on the charge of manslaughter, but has been committed to the provincial asylum. He killed his Chinese cook at Golden, B. C., while insane. His friends will endeavor to take him to England.

About three weeks ago, Rev. A. D. McLeod, Methodist clergyman at Tay, Settlement, York county, was thrown from his carriage while driving and sustained a severe shaking up. He has just returned from a trip to Boston but is still unable to occupy the pulpit.

A suit for \$5,000 has been begun by Sarah M. Pond of Torrington, Conn., against Wm. Latimer, of Derby, who, in company with the plaintiff's husband, went hunting in the Maine woods a year ago. Mistaking his friend for a deer, Latimer fired at Pond, the bullet resulting in death. It was pronounced an accident.

Health Commissioner Meigs, of Bayonne, N. J., has stirred up a hornet's nest among the women of the town by his announced advocacy of a law to compel them to wear short skirts. The women have determined to call a mass meeting and publicly protest unless he gives up his plan to have such a measure passed. They favor the short skirt, but want it distinctly understood that they will be dictated to by no man.

Grant Saunders, youngest son of W. S. Saunders, about eight years of age, met with a painful and serious accident on Friday last. He was playing with a horse that was tethered in the yard, when the animal kicked him on the forehead just above the eye, fracturing the skull. It was found necessary to trepan in order to relieve the pressure on the brain. Although the little fellow is suffering a good deal, he is bearing it bravely, and it is confidently hoped he will entirely recover.—Woodstock Sentinel.

Historic Spots Marked.

The members of the Niagara Historical Society have placed seven markers on historical spots in Niagara-on-the-Lake and vicinity. They were made by Mr. James Monroe, St. Catharines, are of Queenston stone, three feet high, 18x18 inches, to appear above the ground eighteen inches, with sloping top for the inscription. The points so marked are: No. 1, site of Government House in the time of Simcoe; 2, Glenora printing office, 1817, and Masonic Hall, 1792; 3, Military Hospital and Indian Council House; 4, Brock's grave at Fort George from 1812 to 1824; 5, Navy Hall; 6, Count de Puisaye's house; 7, spot where bodies of soldiers were found, killed 27th of May, 1813. This marking of historic spots, fast fading from recollection, has been an object of ambition with the Niagara Historical Society, who hope to mark other important points in the future.

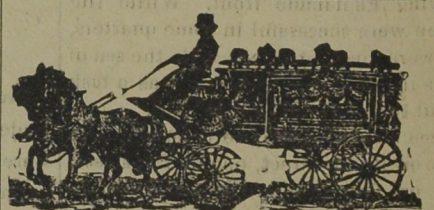
