AT MARYSVILLE.

Ringling Speeches in Mr. Gibson's Behalf.

BY HON. D. C. FRASER M. P. AND C. J. MILLIGAN.

Disreputable Tactics of Dr. McLeod's Friends Strongly Denounced.

The public hall at Marysville was crowded to the doors last evening with an enthusiastic audience assembled to hear addresses on the issues of the campaign from Hon D C Fraser, M. P. of Guysboro, N S and C J Milligan of St John. Coun Rowley occupied the chair, and after a few appropriate remarks, introduced Mr. Milligan as the first speaker. Mr Milligan delivered a capital address of half an hour's duration and was accorded a splendid hearing. After a reference to the events which led up to the Conservative defeat of 1896, he went on to speak of the great progress that Canada had enjoyed under Liberal rule. Under Mr Blair's capital administration the Intercolonial railway had been extended and improved until it had become a source of pride to the people of Canada. He also spoke of the great development that had been made by Canada along agricultural lines, since Hon Mr Fisher had been at the head of that important department. Referring to the postal department, he called attention to the great results that had been achieved by Hon Mr, Mulock, such as the establishment of penny postage, which the Conservative postmaster general had declared could not be done without great loss of revenue. What had been accomplished by Mr. Mulock, was the result of adopting business methods. Mr Milligan closed with an eloquent reference to the work of the Canadians in South Africa, and made a strong appeal to the electors to support Mr Gibson on the 28th. He was heartily applauded on resuming his seat.

HON. D. C. FRASER, M. P.,

who was received with cheers, made one of the ablest, most entertaining and convincing political addresses ever heard in the flourishing Nashwaak town, and fairly took the audience by storm. He said that he was not sorry that he had come to the county of York. The mighty Nashwaak river and town of Marysville, of which he had read so much, were a revelation to him and had opened his eyes to the greatness of this county and also to his own ignorance of the greatness of this country. Coming down to political issues he said that good Conservatives were supporting Mr. Gibson in York today, not because they are Conservatives, but because they are good, faithful, honest citizens of this country. He had made the discovery that this county, which the campaign literature styled as very corrupt, had some very kind people, whom he felt sure would give him something to eat if he were hungry or lend him a coat if they could find one large enough for him. (Laughter.) He knew a little about politics and would make the statement without fear of contradiction, that there had not been an election run in forty years without some violations of the law, and there would not be one in the next five hundred million years. Men violate the law without knowing it, and he did not think the proper way to make a county honest was by proclaiming to the world that it was a nest of robbers and boodlers. If this county is as bad as represented, what has Dr McLeod been doing that he has not ferreted out a lot of you and landed you in jail. Who brought about this corruption? Who held this county for the last fifteen years? Didn't it occur to Dr McLeod when he was striking at corruption he was striking at his own party? Then how can he associate himself with that party now? (Applause.)

Touching upon the prohibition question Mr Fraser said he never saw a more practical prohibition town than Marysville. It was proof that when people make up their minds that a temperance community is better than a drinking community, then will we have prohibition; but he did not believe that Canada by act of parliament could either make men temperate or send them to the Kingdom of Heaven. Prohibition is not and cannot

be an issue in Dominion politics today, and in view of the recent decision of the Privy council, the only way was to work it out by provinces. Neither of the political parties had declared for prohibition and unless Dr McLeod was going to build up a party of his own from the other parties, there was no reason why he should go to parliament upon the prohibition question.

Mr Fraser devoted some attention to Mr Pitts' campaign sheet, and amidst thunders of applause, exposed the disgraceful tactics that have been employed in Dr McLeod's behalf. He explained that he had not come to York to say a single word against any man, but he thought he had a right to discuss literature entering into the contest. Modesty, said he, is characteristic of all great men. Shakespeare was one of the greatest as well as one of the most modest of men. A man was in politics because of certain ideas he represents—ideas that are behind him and are brought before the people. He was reminded of a picture that used to hang in the lodge room in his boyhood days. There was depicted a full faced, healthy looking man alongside of a most uncouth and ragged tramp. Just below were the words, "Look on this picture and then on that." Those same words he found repeated in the columns of the Reporter extra, which pretended to make a comparison of the respective candidates. Dr. McLeod is represented as a man of learning and refinement, which may all be true. Mr. Gibson on the other hand is put down as a man of very meagre education. That is not true. (Applause.) If it were true then Mount Allison college, which has educated some of the best men in the lower provinces, is no good, for Sandy went there. (Applause.) A little further on Mr. Gibson is represented as "a man with no ideas, and no ability to express them if he had." I would ask in all seriousness if that is the way to conduct an election campaign? Does Dr. McLeod think that is the kind of a canvass to make to the intelligent electors of York? He has evidently forgotten to read the epistles of Paul, that best of all saints. The doctor might learn of Paul—if Paul had not the misfortune to learn of the doctor—(Applause and laughter) that an honorable man does not speak of another man except as a gentleman. (Cheers.) Dr. McLeod, according to the Reporter, has been known all over Canada for twenty-five years as a leader in moral and religious movements, while Mr. Gibson is hardly known outside of his own parish. If he (Fraser) wanted to be unkind he would say that the doctor made more money out of politics during that twenty-five years than any man in politics. (Cheers.) Mr. Gibson is known in his own parish as a good, honest fellow, and one who has the respect of his neighbors. (Applause.) Dr. McLeod is set up as a representative of whom the people of York might be proud, while Mr. Gibson is classed as a nonentity, which means that he doesn't exist at all. Oh modesty, charming modesty that. I want to say to you intelligent men that if Dr. McLeod doesn't on Saturday publicly repudiate that article, you should hold him responsible for it, just as if he had written it himself. (Great cheering.)

Don't you want to run the election on higher ground than that? A man that is great doesn't need to say so himself. He regretted that when there were so many broad questions to put before the electors—questions that effect every individual, every county, and every province as part of this mighty empire, that we should have to come down to miserable, petty work of that kind (cheers).

Touching upon the race cry, which is being made to do duty in this campaign by Dr McLeod and his friends, Mr Fraser stated that these men seemed to have the idea that the French in Canada were going to eat us up. That was there idea at the last election. Have any of you been slaughtered? Anybody shot? Whose head has been cut off? That to his mind was the meanest kind of an argument. There are French in both New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, but we Britishers have been able to hold our own so far. The French people number one third of the population of Canada. Your ancestors and my ancestors licked the stuffing out of the best general that France ever produced, and I as a descendant am not going to let it be said without a protest that one third of a Frenchman can lick me or that one third of a Frenchman has more brains than I have. (Great cheering.) But these men would have unsuspecting people believe that an army of Frenchmen were coming down here upon us unoffending Britons. I wonder

if the Tories of Fredericton would like to have it said that one third of their number could lick them? Oh think of being swooped out of existence in that way. Oh, brave souls, you are fit for your leader's following and the following is fit for the leaders. (Applause and laughter.)

He took the ground that when a kind Creator had permitted the French people to come and inhabit our land, that it was not our duty to try and put them down. If they are not our equals already, it is our duty to make them better citizens. You do not help your neighbor by knocking him down with a bludgeon, but by leading him to higher and better ideas. Do you think a campaign such as has been inaugurated here is the right kind of a campaign to be carried on in the British Empire, the greatest of all Empires?

Mr. Fraser here referred to the service which the French soldiers of Canada had rendered the empire in South Africa, and asked if it was fair and right for Dr. McLeod or any other man to endeavour to turn the English speaking people against the men who were helping to build up our nation. When Canada was threatened from enemies without, the French people gallantly did their duty and on one occasion the people of Quebec actually saved Canada. He would call upon his hearers to characterize as scandalous this stirring up strife in this Canada of ours.
