

AT MARYSVILLE.

(CONTINUED FROM FIRST PAGE.)

Mr Fraser then proceeded to point out some of the broader questions that ought to be considered by the people of York at the present time. He referred to the marvellous growth of trade under Liberal rule, and suggested that Dr McLeod with all his splendid abilities, chivalry of soul and profound theology, would if he were sent to Ottawa have but little influence on the question of trade. It was bad policy to swap horses when crossing a stream, and he did not think a change would be to the best interests of the people of York. He would not say to the people of York "Vote for the government and you will get something," although that had been a favorite canvass of the Conservatives in times past. He would say however, when such a satisfactory state of things exist as does exist in Canada at present, that it was the duty of the people to support the government. The electors of York had more interest in the election than Mr Gibson had. When times are dull the man who earns but \$300 a year will feel the effect most. It was the people's election if they only knew it. He would ask the workmen before him if they ever knew a time in the history of Canada when there were so many opportunities for employment as has been the case since 1896. (Cheers and cries of "no, no") Then cast your votes for Sandy Gibson on the 28th. (Cheers).

Another reason, said Mr. Fraser, why you should support the Liberals in this contest is that they have given you clean government. He was not going to hold the whole Conservative party responsible for the actions of Sir Hector Langevin, who had been put out of office some years ago and had not been heard from since. His place was taken by Mr Tarte, and during the years that this gentleman had been in office there never had been no cause for an investigation in parliament into one dollar expended by him. Not too bad for a Frenchman who is going to eat you up. (Applause). He (Fraser) had been chairman of the public accounts committee since 1897, and he would say that any member of parliament had the right to have witnesses called before the committee for the purpose of investigating any item of expenditures appearing in the Auditor General's report. A witness could be subpoenaed from any part of Canada—yes, even Dr. McLeod would have to come if wanted by the committee. (Applause). While the committee has this power, it has not been called upon to investigate any charges against Mr. Tarte. The people of Canada should thank God that their money is being honestly spent. If the people of York should by some chance return Dr. McLeod to parliament it would be equivalent to saying that they were dissatisfied with the present good times and wanted their money dishonestly spent. (Applause.)

Another reason why the electors should support Mr. Gibson is that Sir Wilfrid Laurier has been able to unite the people of Canada as no other man could have done it. His speech delivered in England in 1897, coming from a representative of a conquered race, furnished proof to the world that England knew how to colonize. (Applause.) While on this subject he would add that England was the only nation of Europe that did know how to colonize, and her success was largely due to the freedom granted to her subjects, no matter what their race or creed might be. Under British rule, the courts of the land were as open to the swarthy son of Africa, as they were to the son born in Windsor Castle. Mr. Laurier proved to the people of Great Britain that Canadians could think and act for themselves, and the work of our boys in South Africa demonstrated to the world, that when it came to reckoning with Great Britain, the colonies had also to be taken into consideration. (Applause). Mr. Fraser here told of a young man whom he had met on the train returning to St. John from South Africa, with a lieutenant's commission in the British army. He had distinguished himself by drawing maps of the country, and his services had been recognized by the Imperial authorities. He was such a modest youth that when he reached St. John and heard the wild huzzas of twenty thousand people assembled to greet him, he asked that he might be allowed to go home and see his mother. That young man, according to the standard set up, would not do to run the county of York. (Applause).

Mr. Fraser closed with a powerful appeal to the electors to stand by the government which has done so much for Canada by returning Mr. Gibson to Parliament on the 28th. In the name of all that's manly, said he, stamp out by your votes that miserable cry which, if heeded, would make the County of York a laughing stock in the eyes of Canada. I am a bad man when aroused, and I will say right here, that if your vote for Mr. Gibson in Marysville does not surpass

that ever given to a candidate before, you shall not see my face again, except in anger.

Cheers and applause lasting several minutes followed Mr. Fraser's magnificent speech.

A hearty vote of thanks, moved by Walter Reid, and seconded by half a dozen persons, was presented to the speakers of the evening and gracefully acknowledged by Mr. Fraser.

Chairman Rowley briefly returned thanks to the Orangemen of Marysville for postponing their regular lodge meeting, so that the use of the hall could be obtained for the political rally.

"We were only too happy to do it," was the response of a stalwart Orangeman in the audience.

Cheers for the King, Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Mr. Gibson brought to a close one of the most successful political meetings ever held in Marysville.
