THE ENEMY'S SMALL COMFORT.

Our Conservative friends have so little to comfort themselves with politically these days, that they seize on every little point that seems to promise satisfaction. The alleged friction between Lord Minto and his advisers, the personal quarrel between Mr. Tarte and Mayor Prefontaine, of Montreal, and the rivalry between Premier Farquharson and Mr. Hazard for the Liberal nomination in Queens, P. E. Island, have furnished texts for whole volumes of Conservative editorials during the past few days.

Unhappily for the vendors of sensationalism the story of trouble between the governor general and his cabinet is authoritatively denied by no less a person than Mr. Tarte, who generally knows what is going on in cabinet circles, and Major Maude who is very close to Lord Minto, corroborates what Mr. Tarte says.

With regard to the disagreement of the Minister of Public Works with the Montreal Mayor in matters relating to harbor improvements at Montreal, our Conservative friends will find it difficult to elevate such a personal difference into a party or national question. Mr. Tarte may be depended upon to defend Canadian interests as against purely local and personal considerations, and the country is giving itself no uneasiness at the pugnacious attitude of Mr. Prefontaine, whose ambition appears to be to supplant Mr. Tarte in the federal ministry.

It is rather a compliment to the strength of the Liberal party in Sir Louis Davies' old constituency that two such popular men as Premier Farquharson and Mr. Hazard are struggling for the nomination for Parliament. No doubt the Liberal convention will be able to choose between the claims of the two gentlemen, and whoever is chosen will probably be able to count on the support of a united party, and a triumphant return to the House of Commons.

The Conservatives of Canada are to be commiserated on having such unsatisfactory material for the manufacture of party capital against the government, which is governing the country with a zeal, discretion, and success, that pleases the people and excites the envy of its opponents.

THE GALANT SEVENTY FIRST.

The people of Fredericton and York will have reason to feel a pride in the appearance of the 71st regiment which goes to St John to take part in the reception to the royal party. Through the foresight of Col Loggie, the commanding officer, and the promptness of the militia department, the men will all be rigged out in new serges, including the band, and that popular organization will go to St John, some thirty strong, with new music, and ready in all respects to take its place with the best bands that will be on parade. The regiment, thanks to the generosity of the York county council, has a new stand of colors, which it will carry into the presence of royalty. The regiment will also obtain prominence for the number of South African heroes it will furnish when the Duke distributes the medals, so that altogether York can be congratulated on the fact that in some features of the royal reception it will be well represented.

The efficiency and presentable appearance of the 71st are mostly due to Col. Loggie, who takes great pride in his command and is ever ready to do anything within his power to forward its interests.

It seems that St. John people are becoming rattled at the very approach of royalty, and the Telegraph considers the matter sufficiently serious to devote a leading article to it. Our contemporary observes that "There is no occasion for everybody in St. John to get so excited that they don't know what they are doing. There is no occasion for anyone in New Brunswick to become nervous or excited." We can assure the Telegraph that nobody up this way is getting excited or nervous, but of course in a rural community like St. John our contemporary's admonitions may be necessary.

It seems that after, all the people who were presented to the Duke and Duchess at Toronto were permitted the honor of shaking hands with Their Royal Highnesses, and the same proceeding will no doubt obtain at St. John.

BOWLED THEM OVER.

British Military Captain Who is an Ex-Champion Boxer, Did Up Three Boers.

London, Oct. 15.—Captain H. C. B. Phillips, the ex English amateur heavy-weight boxer, and commanding the 13th (Shropshire) Company, Imperial Yeomanry, attached to Lord Methuen's force in the Western Transvaal, was the hero of an exciting incident.

He was going his rounds visiting the sentries on the outskirts of the camp, when he was suddenly confronted by three Boers, two of whom were armed. They made him prisoner, and proceeded to divest him of his personal property. He declined to remove his spurs. Two of the Boers stepped down to unfasten the straps, Captain Phillips being covered with the rifle of the third man.

No sooner, however, had the two men got into the kneeling position than Capt. Phillips, with two well-directed blows, bowled them both over, and, seizing the Mauser of one, which had been incautiously laid on the ground, told the Boer who was covering him with a tremendous blow on the side of the head with the butt end, giving him his quietus.

Captain Phillips then secured the two Boer prisoners, and marched them into camp.

A Special Train Thursday.

The general officer commanding the troops at St John, has asked for a passenger extra from St John to Fredericton, to leave at 11 p. m., after the illuminations of Thursday, October 17th, and in order to accomplish this and give the people of Fredericton and those at stations between St John and Fredericton a chance to spend Thursday in St. John, and yet lose only one day from their homes. The CPR has decided to run a passenger extra train to leave St John at 11 p. m., standard on Thursday next and run through to Fredericton making all intermediate stops where there are passengers to be set down. This train should make the run in about two hours.—d21.
