A DISTINGUISHED JOURNALIST

There are eminent men among the journalists accompanying the royal party in their tour of Canada, and the most prominent among them is Mr William Maxwell, who represents one of the big London papers, The Standard, and has had a busy career travelling around the world writing up great events.

Mr. Maxwell's great achievements in the newspaper line in the past few years are connected with momentous events in the history of the Empire. For example, he accompanied Lord Kitchener in his Sudanese campaign, was present at the battle of Omdurman, and participated in the march to Khartoum, for which he possesses the Khedive's medal and clasp. Immediately after the close of the war he undertook a horse-back ride through the deserts east of the River Jordan, subsequently meeting the Emperor of Germany and accompanying him on his historic tour through Palestine and Syria. He attended the peace conference at The Hague, and proceeded straight from there to South Africa on the outbreak of the war. He was with the besieged in Ladysmith, and on the relief of that place joined Lord Roberts' army and accompanied it from Bloemfontein north to Lydenburg and then to Koomatipoort. He came out at Delagoa Bay, when he saw Kruger, and thence he returned to Pretoria. Returning home, he represented his paper in the work incidental to the death and funeral of the Queen, went almost directly from there to the festivities incidental to the wedding of Queen Wilhelmina of Holland, and returned to describe the enthronement in the House of Lords of King Edward VII. He has now travelled nearly 50,000 miles, visiting the great colonies and recording the greatest royal progress in the history of the world.

Mr. Maxwell has formed a very favorable opinion of Canada, and his letters to his home newspaper should prove a valuable advertisement for this country. In an interview, after extolling the natural beauties of Canada, he observed:

"As we travelled farther and farther into this country of surprises I have felt how little the people at home understand the infinite potentialities of this land, how erroneous are their opinions of its climate. Talk of 'Our Lady of the Snows'—why, we have had Italian skies and the cool breath of the mountains. I wish some of our dwellers in crowded cities could have a vision of the free life of your people, of the space and light and air that breed a hardy, contented race.

Coming from the new Commonwealth of Australia, just entered on that unity which has been yours for nearly half a century; coming from South Africa, where we see two races in the fusing pot of war, I have naturally been struck by the harmony of the two races in Canada. As we have seen in this journey across the continent, Canada is not one but several countries, separated by immense distances, by race, religion, and even by language. Yet you are held firmly together by the bond of federation, by community of interest, and, I hope and believe, by affection for the land that gave birth to your fathers, and by loyalty to that great empire in which your liberties, your individuality and your independence will ever be secure. In Australia we have a homogeneous people. In South Africa we have two peoples originally sprung from a kindred stock. Surely we should not despair

of ultimate harmony there when we see two widely differentiated races uniting to build up great commonwealths in Canada."

AN IMPROBABLE STORY.

The London Daily Chronicle understands that "owing to friction with the ministry, the Earl of Minto is not likely to complete his term as Governor General of Canada. If he resigns the appointment will be offered to Baron De Blaquiere."

If friction exists between Lord Minto and his advisers it has not become apparent in this country although there has been some gossip that the names of some persons recommended for Imperial honors by the federal cabinet were struck out of the list by the Governor General. Whether there is sufficient reason for Lord Minto's recall is a question, but it is just possible that any such interference would be resented by his advisers.

The Chronicle's report that Baron De Blaquiere is to succeed Lord Minto is scarcely credible. While the Baron, who is a Canadian by birth, being a son of the late William De Blaquiere, of Woodstock, Ont., where he was born in 1856, and married a daughter of the late Geo. E. Desbarats, of Montreal, may be a very respectable man, he is not sufficiently famous to receive an important position like the governor generalship of Canada. The British government has given us eminent men, some of them eminent statesmen, or soldiers or diplomats, and it is not reasonable to suppose that the high plane observed in the appointments will be abandoned. The Chronicle's story is probably only imaginative.

The Halifax people who became nervous lest the small pox outbreak would knock out their great military review next week, are now happy. It has been officially decided that the review will take place, and the men to participate will number 10,000, including Nova Scotia and New Brunswick militia, Imperial army representatives and men from the fleet of warships now at Halifax. The New Brunswick corps to participate are the 8th Hussars, 62nd regiment, St. John and Newcastle artillery.

Archie Campbell, ex-M. P., who was defeated by Hon. Clarke Wallace in West York last November, will again be the Liberal candidate in that constituency and it is said will be opposed by Thos. Wallace brother of the late member, and a popular man of large means.

Whish—not a word of politics until the Duke leaves our shores. Then look out for great guns. Eleven Dominion bye elections will loom up between this and Christmas.

The Liberal candidates were elected in Cape Breton Co., last week, by 1683 and 1635 majorities—probably the largest majorities ever given at an election in Nova Scotia.

The Sun is still after Mr Blair's alleged Chinese cook. This is kitchen politics which should be beneath the dignity of a great party organ.

There will be a great exodus of Fredericton people to St John next week, to see the Duke and Duchess.

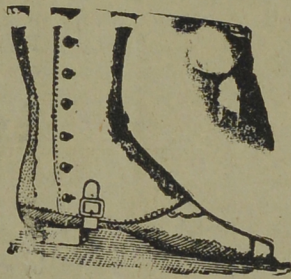
