

DUKE'S TRIUMPHS.

Enthusiastic Receptions Meet the Royal Party

IN THEIR HURRIED TOUR THROUGH THE GARDEN OF ONTARIO.

Sunday Will Be Spent at Niagara on the Lake.

SUP. POTTINGER WILL HAVE CHARGE OF ROYAL TRAIN ON I. C. R.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

London, Ont. Oct. 12.—The royal special reached here at noon where an hour was spent previous to the departure for Niagara on the lake where Sunday will be spent.

The departure was made from Toronto at sharp nine o'clock amid booming of cannon, blowing whistles and the cheering of a great multitude.

At Brampton, where the first stop was made the Duchess was presented with a magnificent floral offering.

Short stops were made at Guelph, Berlin and Stratford.

The receptions were very enthusiastic. Montreal, Oct. 12.—D. Pottinger, general manager of the I. C. R., will take charge of the royal train at Chaudiere Junction, Quebec, and look after the royal guests while they are travelling over the government lines.

Toronto, Oct. 12.—The Duke, just before leaving the military parade grounds yesterday, expressed to General O'Grady-Haly his deep admiration for the splendid turnout and steadiness of the men. Several members of the Duke's staff said the parade was the finest of the whole tour. After dinner the crops broke camp and by midnight nearly all had entrained for home.

At the conclusion of the review, which lasted fully an hour beyond scheduled time, the royal party returned to Government House for luncheon. The streets were lined with cavalry and artillery, which had participated in the review.

After luncheon the royal party started for Toronto, University and en route made a couple of stops. At the entrance of Queen's park they witnessed an exhibition of drill by the fire brigade. In Queen's park the Duke and Alexander Muir, author of The Maple Leaf, planted a maple tree. At the university an address of welcome was read by Sir William Meredith and the degree of LL.D. was conferred on his royal highness. The evening was devoted to a state dinner at parliament buildings and a public reception, at which over 2,000 people were presented.

The royal party left at 9 o'clock this morning for a flying trip to Niagara Fall and Western Ontario.

Toronto, Oct. 12.—With the exception of Melbourne, the review of Canadian troops at the exhibition ground yesterday, is pronounced to be the finest military display witnessed during the Royal tour throughout the colonies. But even as against Melbourne the quality of the Canadian troops who passed the Duke today was so high that the war correspondents unanimously declare that the palm must be awarded to Canada. Melbourne put fifteen thousand troops into the field and the number who passed the Duke on the Exhibition Grounds yesterday was eleven thousand. But Melbourne had five thousand cadets in the field, and here all were trained volunteers and militiamen.

DEATH OF REV. J. W. CLARKE.

Well Known Free Baptist Clergyman Passed Away at Woodstock.

Woodstock, Oct. 12.—The death occurred here this morning, after a short illness from typhoid fever, of Rev. J. Wesley Clarke, pastor of the Woodstock Free Baptist church, and one of the best known and most popular clergymen in the province. He was a native of Hampstead, Queens county, and was ordained to the ministry about eighteen years ago. His first charge was in St. John (North End), and he was afterwards transferred to Traceys Mills, Carleton County. After a successful pastorate of several years in that place

he accepted a call to the church at Norton, Kings county, and from there he went to Waterloo Street Baptist church, St. John. He has been in charge of the church at Woodstock about a year, and was very popular among all classes of people.

The deceased gentleman was 45 years of age, and is survived by a sorrowing widow, a sister of the Vanwart Bros., the well known St. John grocers, and two daughters.

The funeral services will take place at four o'clock tomorrow afternoon, and the remains will be taken to St. John on Monday for interment.

[The deceased clergyman was well and favorably known in Fredericton, and his death will be learned of with much regret, especially by members of the Free Baptist denomination. He was a brother of Mrs. Reid Slipp of Hampstead, and an uncle of Ald. A. R. Slipp of this city.]

THE LATE CLARKE WALLACE.

His Remains Interred at Woodbridge with Imposing Ceremony.

Woodbridge, Ont., Oct. 12.—The funeral of the late Hon. Clarke which took place this afternoon and was one of the largest ever seen in Canada.

The funeral services were conducted by the Orange Order throughout, the chief part of the service being assigned to Rev. Wm. Walsh, of Brampton, grand chaplain of British America; Rev. H. C. Dixon, of Toronto, grand chaplain of Ontario; and Dr. T. S. Sproule, M. P., of Markdale, deputy grand master, who by the death of Mr. Wallace becomes, according to the constitution, grand master of British America. The remains were removed from Mr. Wallace's late residence to Christ Church, and thence to the grave, services being held at all three places by the Order.

SOUTH AFRICAN WAR.

A Rebel Leader Executed—General French Makes a Capture.

INCENDIARY FIRE.

P. E. Island Farmer Loses His Home, Barns and all Their Valuable Contents

AND HE AND HIS FAMILY NARROWLY ESCAPED WITH THEIR LIVES.

He is Scott Act Prosecutor and May Have Incurred Emnity.

Charlottetown, P.E.I.—Robert Jenkins, and his family of sixteen, had a narrow escape with their lives last night, in an incendiary fire, which destroyed his house, two large barns containing five horses, two cows, a hundred hens, all this year's crop, four hundred dollars worth of eggs, farm implements, etc.

The total loss is three thousand and is insured for five hundred.

Mr Jenkins is secretary of the Dairy-men's Association and a prosecutor under the Scott Act.

Detectives will deal with the matter.

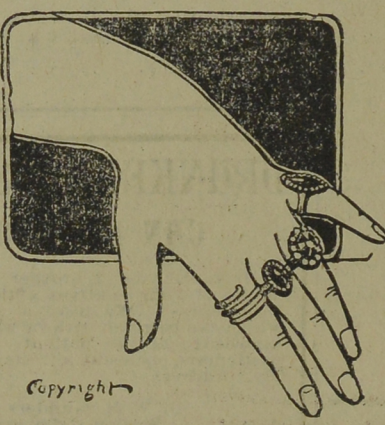
