MISS WINSLOW'S MARRIAGE.

Daughter of a Former Woodstock Postmaster Wedded at Montreal.

The marriage took place quietly Wednesday evening at seven o'clock at the church of St. John the Evangelist, Montreal, of Miss Pauline Winslow, youngest daughter of the late Mr. John Coffin Winslow, postmaster of Woodstock, to Mr. Percival H. Sanderson, third son of the late Mr. Charles E. Sanderson.

The ceremony was performed by the Rev. Arthur French in the presence of relatives and intimate friends of the bride and groom. The bride, who wore white silk and chiffon embroidered in silver sequins, tulle veil, caught with orange blossoms, and carried white roses, entered the church with Mr. Doutre, and was given away by her mother. Little Miss Vera Frances Inge, who was maid of honour was in white silk and lace, and carried violets. Mr. Allan C. Rankin was best man, and the ushers were Mr. T. Sanderson and Mr. Stanley B. Clift. Mr. and Mrs. Sanderson have left on a trip to Buffalo and Sault Ste. Marie, and on their return will reside at Montreal. The bride, who is a niece of E. Byron and T. B. Winslow of this city, was the recipient of a number of handsome presents.

DIED OF SMALLPOX.

Maitland Man Succumbs to the Dread Disease at St. John—A Secret Burial.

Joseph Barton, the smallpox patient at the Epidemic Hospital, St. John, died Friday afternoon, and his remains were interred that night with the greatest secrecy. Before being enclosed in a hermetically sealed coffin the body was encased in a sheet saturated with a powerful solution of corrosive sublimate. Ambulance, horse, driver and everything used in connection with the removal of the body underwent rigid treatment with disinfectants afterwards.

Barton was taken from the schooner Myra B. on the evening of September 30th to the hospital, where it was discovered that he had smallpox. The schooner, which was lumber laden for Boston, was put in quarantine, where she remains. Barton was about 30 years old and was a native of Maitland, N. S. He joined the Myra B. on her last trip from Boston, and is supposed to have contracted the disease there.

MILITARY NOTES.

Preparations Being Made for the Review at St. John.

It seems probable now that No. 4 company of the R. C. R. I., which is to furnish the guard over the royal residence, and the 71st regiment which is to take part in the review at St. John, will leave here at nine o'clock on Wednesday. Both corps will take their bands along with them.

The headquarters of military District No. 8, will be transferred to St. John for two days next week, which means that Lt. Col. Danbar, D. O. C., will go down to look after the troops to be assembled there during the royal visit.

At the request of Lt. Col. McLean, the privileges of the Union Club, St. John, have been placed at the disposal of Lt. Col. Loggie and officers of the 71st for two weeks.
