ANGLICAN CLERGYMAN'S DEATH

Winnipeg, Dec. 6.—Rev. Dean Omeara, one of the best known Anglican clergymen in Canada, died this morning from typhoid fever. [Canon Omeara was a son of the late Canon Omeara, of Port Hope, Ontario, and was 53 years old. He was educated at Toronto University and Huron College, was ordained in 1872, and has been a resident of Winnipeg since 1873.]

THE BLAIR FORTUNE.

Many Applicants for the Property Claimed by a Fredericton Man.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

Montreal, Dec. 6.—On Monday last a statement was published that Marcus Blair, a former Canadian, who lately died in St. Louis, Mo., had left a fortune of some thousand dollars, and relatives were requested to communicate with the detective office. This has been done to a large extent, and Chief Detective Carpenter is getting somewhat embarrassed. He is now turning applicants off with the address of the trustee of the estate, Warren D. Eisenberg, of St. Louis, Mo.

During the past week a dozen inquiries have been received from such points as widely remote as North Adams, Mass., Sherbrooke, Que., Lewiston, Me., and Point aux Trembles, as well as half a dozen from Montreal.

All these claim relationship with Marcus Blair, and speak of him as a brother or cousin, the former being the favorite; while others ask for information. This morning an old man called who told Mr. Carpenter that Marcus Blair was his brother, and he knew that he had enlisted in Philadelphia in 1861, but had not heard of him for thirty or more years. He was given the address of the trustee and went on his way rejoicing, as should his story be true he is the legal heir.

[John Blair, caretaker of the exhibition building, in this city, claims that the

deceased Marcus Blair, was his brother, and that he is entitled to the alleged fortune of \$8,000.]

ROUNDING UP THE BOERS.

Pretoria, Dec. 6.—The largest captures of Boers made in many months occurred yesterday, when three columns secured an aggregate of 250 prisoners. General Bruce Hamilton, near Ermelo, Major Dawkins, in the Waterbury district, and General Methuen in Northwest Transvaal rounded up three laagers with only a few casualties on either side.

Ottawa, Dec. 6.—In a letter dated Pretoria, Oct. 29, received by a prominent militia officer from Lieut Col Steele, the latter states that Maj. Ogilvy has been appointed inspecting Maj. of the B or northern division of the South Africa Contabulary, at a salary of £750 per annum. The rainy season Col. Steele says, has commenced, which makes travel and the transport of supplies very difficult. "I am," the writer goes on to say, "when not on the trek, living in Paul Kruger's house, a pretty comfortable one."

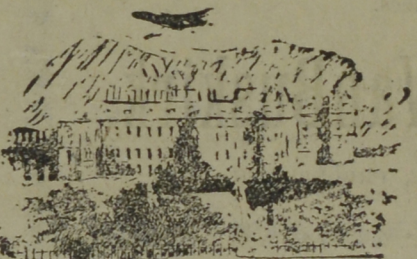

A ROYAL SEAT AGAIN

HOLYROOD PALACE, ANCIENT ABODE OF SCOTTISH SOVEREIGNS.

Has Been in Desuetude for a Period of 200 Years, But King Edward Will Again Put it to Substantial Use—Points in Its Interesting History Told in Brief.

Holyrood Palace, at Edinburgh, which King Edward will use for a royal residence, has not been put to that substantial use for upward of 200 years. It was built as an abbey in 1128 by King David I. of Scotland, and is so interwoven with the history of that country as to be the most interesting place in all Caledonia next to Edinburgh Castle itself. In 1295 James Balliol held a Parliament within its walls. James II. was born in it, married in it and buried in it. The nuptials of Princess Margaret of England were celebrated there in 1503. From that time forward the abbey, which had been constructed into a palace, became the principal seat of the Scottish Sovereigns. Queen Mary lived there upon her return from France in 1561. There, in 1566, Rizzio was torn from her side and stabbed to death on the steps leading from the throneroom. Her son, King James VI., dwelt much in the palace before

his accession to the English throne in 1603. He revisited the palace in 1617. It was garrisoned by Cromwell's troops after the battle of Dunbar. In 1745 it was occupied by Prince Charles Edward, and from 1795 to 1799 it sheltered the Count d'Artois, afterward King Charles X. of France. For years the old palace has been merely a show place, visited by pilgrims from the four ends of the earth, and reverently loved by the Scotch who see in it the glories of a great and brilliant national history. It occupies a pleasant site and has been kept in splendid repair as the years have flown by and the face of the land has changed.

TWO TRANSPORTS

Engaged to Take Third Canadian Contingent to South Africa

ADDITIONAL ALLOTMENT OF MEN TO THE WEST.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Ottawa, Dec. 6.—The Imperial authorities advised the government today that the transports Manhattan and Rance will be sent out to convey the third regiment of Canadian Mounted Rifles to South Africa.

Ottawa, Dec. 5.—Hon. Dr. Borden received a cable last night from the imperial government stating that two British war transports will be sent to convey the Canadian Mounted Infantry to South Africa. They are the British troop ships Manhattan and Rance. The former has accommodation for 17 officers, 450 men and 520 horses; the Rance, 20 officer, 450 men and 200 horses.

The quota of men to be taken from the Northwest for the Mounted Infantry has been increased from 80 to 130.

Instructions have now been given out that the Canadian Mounted Infantry will mobilize at Halifax and not at Ottawa as originally intended.

Halifax, Dec. 6.—Hon. J. W. Longley, chairman of the exhibition commission, yesterday received a telegram from Hon. Dr. Borden, asking use of the exhibition grounds, buildings and stables for the third contingent.

A LAW

In Amendment of a Law to regulate the measurement, (L.S.) inspection, weighing, and sale of certain articles.

BE IT ENACTED by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of Fredericton, as follows:—

1. No person shall sell, or offer or expose for sale in any of the Streets or Squares within this City, any firewood of the description usually called cordwood, or which can be measured by the cord, without having the same first measured by a Surveyor of wood appointed by the City Council under a penalty of two dollars for each offence.

2. It shall be the duty of any Surveyor of wood, on measuring any load of cordwood or other wood measured by him, to furnish the party offering the same for sale, with a certificate signed by him, showing the name of the party offering the load for sale, date of measurement, and quantity of wood contained in the load; the Surveyor in making any survey shall take into consideration and deduct any shortage from crooked or rough wood, short lengths, or refuse.

3. The party offering the wood for sale shall pay the Surveyor for his services, on receiving a certificate of the contents as aforesaid, the sum of five cents for each load, the contents of which may be less than one cord; nothing herein contained however to be construed as interfering with the scale of fees as now established for measuring cordwood by the cord.

4. Every person offering wood for sale by the load shall show and exhibit to any person or intending purchaser before completing the sale, the certificate of the Surveyor of wood hereinbefore provided for, showing the actual contents of the load offered, under a penalty of two dollars for each offence.

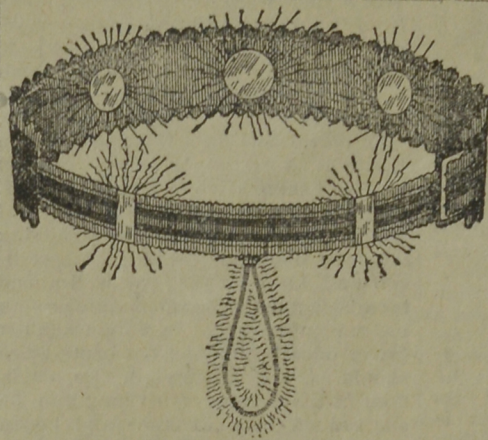
5. This law shall come into full force and operation on the 16th day of December, A. D. 1901.

6. Section seventeen of the Bye-Law passed on the third day of August, A. D. 1884, entitled "A Law to regulate the measurement, weighing, inspection, and sale of certain articles," and so much of said law as is inconsistent with or repugnant to this law, is hereby repealed.

Passed and enacted this third day of December, A. D. 1901.

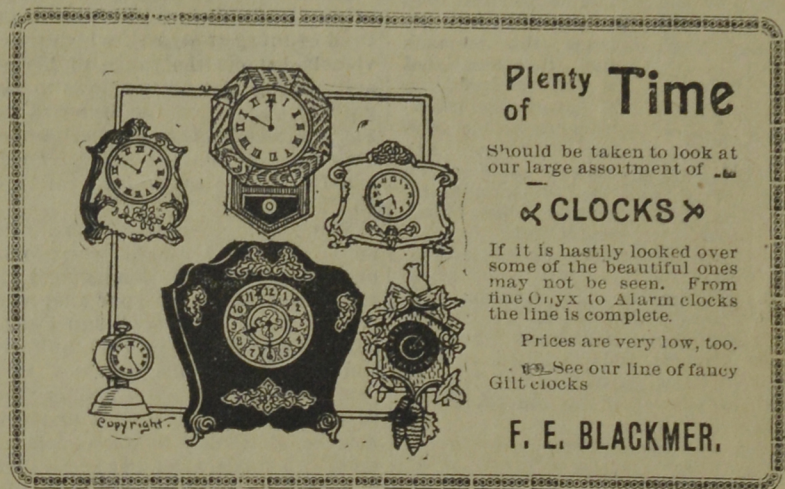
