A FRIEND OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

The province of New Brunswick has no better friend among the American people than Mr. Frederick Irland, a member of the reportorial staff of the House of Representatives at Washington. Mr. Irland is known far and wide as a keen sportsman, and for the last ten years has been almost an annual visitor to the wilds of New Brunswick in search of game. Being a man of rare gifts as a writer he has been in the habit of giving expression to his views regarding New Brunswick through the columns of the leading magazines of the United States, and his widely read and entertaining articles have done much to make this province known to the sportsmen and tourists of the continent. His latest contribution is an illustrated article which appeared in the last number of Collier's Magazine, a high class journal with an army of readers. In it he describes a cruise on the Southwest Miramichi made by him in the spring of 1901 in company with Henry Braithwaite, the famous hunter and guide of this city. We quote his introductory remarks:

"The little railroad train, half passenger and half freight, creeps up the valley of the Nashwaak, crosses the ancient Indian portage, and feels its way down the watershed of the Miramichi. Five miles from the railroad is the last farmhouse, and five miles from the farm house you may see fresh moose tracks every day in the year, if you will go and look. That is in the province of New Brunswick, where of an evening they talk of the prospects of this year's cut of spruce, the fall run of salmon, and the heinousness of the Scott Act relating to the sale of spirituous liquors. It is a country in which it is worth one's while to live, and perhaps this is the reason why the days of its dwellers are long in the land."

Some people have the impression that our big game is rapidly diminishing in this province, and are likely to follow in the wake of the American buffalo at no distant day. Mr. Irland, however, who might be accepted as an authority on the subject, holds the opposite view. Here is what he says:

"Perhaps 99 people in a hundred, throughout the United States really believe the moose has gone the way of the Irish Elk; and I suppose there are Americans who could not identify a caribou if they saw one. In central New Brunswick there are thousands of them; and these beautiful reindeer, now that the Indians are nearly extinct, are increasing like the moose."

Mr. Henry Braithwaite has been Mr. Irland's companion on many a trip to the wilds of the Miramichi, and Mr. Irland's opinion of Braithwaite as a guide is only surpassed by Mr. Braithwaite's opinion of Mr. Irland as a sportsman. In the article referred to, the Washington sportsman pays the veteran guide the following well deserved tribute:

"It will take a book, some day, to tell about these people of the woodland's edge, the farmers who are born canoe men, who are half lumbermen, half fishermen, and whole men of the type that the forest breeds. But they all award the front place to my friend Henry. He it is who knows the ins and outs of the New Brunswick forest as no other surveyor, prospector or guide knows it. There are men living who remember when Braithwaite was the foreman of a great lumber company. That was when he was young. He found that in some way the company store always had him in debt at the end of the year. So one day he paid \$125 for an English express rifle, bought a lot of traps, and took to the woods on his own account, where his axe, his surveyor's chain, his wood craft and his wit have made him the king of all the Miramichi men."

Much has been written of the beauty of our forests during the autumn months,

and hear is what Mr. Irland has to say on the subject:

"If you have never seen the forests of New Brunswick in the fall then you do not know what autumn splendors are. There is a brilliancy to the foliage that I have never beheld elsewhere. Little as most Americans know it, this secluded old Province is a land of surpassing beauty, nine-tenths virgin woods, a lovely tangle of lakes, river highways, mountains and thickets. And to sportsmen it is the most accessible big-game country on this continent. Even little boys in New Brunswick know what moose look like, for they see them when out looking for the cows."

WHOLESALE MURDER.

At Toronto, Rev. Dr. Langtry, one of the most prominent Anglican clergymen in the city, in the course of his sermon last Sunday night, said:

"I am thinking of the wholesale murders that are being perpetrated by wives who ought to be mothers, moving, many of them, in the highest ranks of society. The vital statistics leave no doubt that this crime is being committed on an enormous scale, and if not arrested will end in the destruction of the Anglo-Saxon race and the substitution of another for that of which we are proud. You may depend upon it that in families where there are no children, where there are only one or two children in nine cases out of ten there has been murder and the mothers that ought to have been will be arraigned on the Judgment Day as murderers, and their husbands in many cases as accomplices. Something must be done to stop this enormous iniquity, which is the outgrowth of what is called an educated age. For the sake of selfish ease and to escape the care and toil of guiding her children many women are robbing themselves of the truest joys of earth. Drying up the sweetest natural affections, and preparing a desolate, unloving old age for themselves."
