GREAT COAL OUTPUT.

Philadelphia, Oct. 24.—The production of anthracite coal in Pennsylvania this year will be the largest in the history of the state. The demand is greater than ever before. The Pennsylvania Company's coal mines are forced to close, being unable to secure cars. The production exceeds fifty-five million tons, which is ten million in excess of last year.

A BIG SHRINKAGE.

Dominion Cotton Co's, Stock Sold at a Low Figure.

Montreal, Oct. 24.—The Dominion Cotton company's stock this morning sold down to 50, the lowest price ever reached. The fear that the company will be no longer able to pay the customary six per cent on common stock has caused the shareholders to throw stock on the market at whatever it would bring.

The company owns nine mills in Montreal, Magog, Halifax, Moncton, Windsor, Ont., Kingston, Brantford and Montmorency. The price today represents shrinkage in value of over a million and a half during the year.

HARVEY STATION.

ROYALTY AT ST. JOHN'S

A Magnificent Display in Honor of the Duke and Duchess of York.

EIGHT HUNDRED FISHING VESSELS IN HARBOR.

Brilliant Illuminations Greet the Royal Couple.

THE ANCIENT COLONY DOES ITSELF INFINITE CREDIT.

St. John's, Nfld., Oct. 23.—The Ophir, with the royal party, arrived shortly after 6 o'clock this morning, accompanied by H. M. S. Crescent, Niobe, Diadem and Tribune. The ship's arrival was not expected until this afternoon.

The city was profusely decorated and over 600 fishing vessels had assembled in these waters, all decorated with bunting. People from the warships say the marine prospect was one of the finest witnessed throughout the tour of the Duke and Duchess, the large gathering of ships making the scene specially animated. The fleet arrived here ahead of time. There is nothing on the programme for today. A heavy rain fall started soon after the arrival of the Duke and Duchess, preventing the royal party from even taking a drive, spoiling the decorations and practically suspending all the festivities.

The Duke this evening will give a dinner to the governor, Sir Cavendish Boyle, and the state dignitaries, on board the Ophir.

The celebration tonight was exceedingly enthusiastic. The weather was clear and the town fairly blazed with illuminations and fireworks. The Ophir, Crescent, Diadem, Niobe, Proserpine and Charybdis were electrically lighted; fifteen sailing steamers, moored in a long line, showed festoons of marine lanterns, while 800 fishing vessels were similarly decorated, making a veritable forest of twinkling lights, spread over the whole harbor.

From the hills surrounding the city 60 bonfires flamed. A thousand torch bearers paraded the city and then massed near the wharf where the Ophir was moored to be inspected by the duke and duchess. Five hundred fishing boats paraded the harbor lighted with lanterns.

The duke and duchess expressed themselves as delighted and said the assemblage of shipping in the port, with the abundant bunting, formed one of the finest displays they had witnessed during the tour.

It is reported that the Diadem grazed a rock while entering the port.

London, Oct. 23.—Cruisers belonging to the Channel squadron will be stationed, 100 miles apart, down the channel and out to sea to send, by wireless telegraphy, the message of the first greeting of the Duke of Cornwall and York to King Edward and Queen Alexandra.

Halifax, Oct. 23.—The Duke of York, on arrival in England, will present to Bandmaster Wright, of the Chatham Marines, an elegant baton, which was engraved here while the Ophir was in port. A number of cigarette cases of silver were also engraved here at his royal highness' order, and are for presentation to officers on the Ophir.

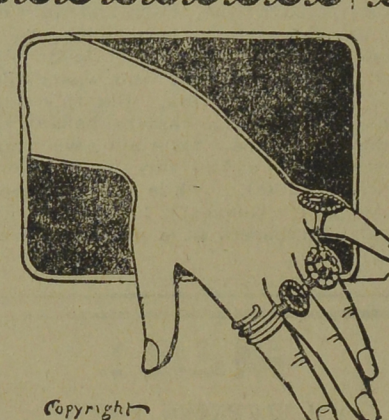

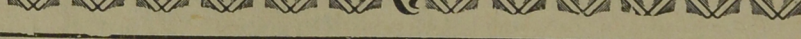
