FROM LATE DESPATCHES AND EXCHANGES.

Manager Johnson, of the Postal Telegraph Company, his son, and a negro driver, were killed three miles from Newton, Mass., Monday by a falling tree. They had gone to repair a telegraph line, when a tree fell across the road, crushing them to death.

At Kokomo, Ind., Mrs Annie P Rindge is suing for a divorce and \$10,000 alimony. She alleges that her husband a rich man, virtually made a prisoner of her on his cattle ranch out West, and compelled her to work like a cowboy.

William R Carnahan of Findlay, O., has filed a petition in bankruptcy—liabilities \$95,600, assets \$9,000. He says that he owes \$33,000 to the lawyers employed by him in a litigation with fire insurance companies after his dry goods store burned down.

It is now proposed to corral the Boers by partitioning the Transvaal with chains of block-houses, 600 or 700 yards apart, connected by barbed wire entanglements. This will lead to the pro-Boer clumps in Detroit and Chicago saying that John Bull wants the earth and a barbed wire fence round it.

Recently a public school teacher wrote the sentence, "Them boys are sliding down hill," and requested some one in the school to "correct and why." One bright youngster held up his hand, and, on being asked, said: "Correction—Those boys are sliding down hill. Why—Because they can't slide up."

Because a pert telephone girl in Seattle refused to connect a subscriber with the fire department when he wanted to give notice of a fire, a loss of \$60,000 was incurred, and now the telephone company is being sued for damages by the person thus served and by the insurance company which suffered the loss.

Grand Councillor Austin, of the Royal Templars, is issuing a call to every local council of the order throughout Ontario to appoint immediately a committee on electoral action for the purpose of calling a local prohibition convention and the organization of the prohibition vote of their respective municipalities.

Private McKinnon, Royal Canadian Regiment, Halifax, died Tuesday morning of pneumonia. He belonged to London, Ont., and was 23 years of age. He was a man of magnificent physique, weighing 180 pounds. He was regarded as the strong man of the regimental tug-of-war team, of which he was the most enthusiastic member.

At a meeting of the Town Council of North Sydney, C. B., a resolution was passed granting the Nova Scotia Steel and Iron Company the sum of thirty thousand dollars as a cash bonus, and a further sum of twenty thousand dollars when the company shall commence the manufacture of steel in the town. Exemption from taxation for a period of twenty years was also granted.

When a M.C.R. freight train was passing under the overhead bridge at Hagersville, some boys, who had evidently seen a wild west show, tried to lasso Conductor J W Campbell, who had his head out of the cupola. Fortunately they missed their mark or there would have been a dead conductor. However, a pane of glass was broken, and Detective Heenan is on the trail of the embryo cowboys.

Mrs. Jane L. Stanford on Monday executed and delivered to the board of trustees of the Leland Stanford University two deeds of grant and one deed of gift. One of the deeds of grant covers the university campus of about 9,000 acres. The other deed of grant covers the Stanford residence, which eventually is to be used for educational purposes. Mrs Stanford has now given the equivalent of over \$25,000,000 to the university.

Lieutenant-Colonel the Hon H. C. Legge, one of King Edward's equerries, is a man of medium height, soldierly looking, fair moustached, and possessed of the happy knack of making himself agreeable to all and sundry. He was one of the late Queen's equerries, and has many

amusing tales to tell of his experiences at the court. On one occasions a provincial Mayor, who was about to be knighted, was so overcome by nervousness that when he knelt down he rolled upon the floor, and remained there, looking for all the world like an overturned sheep, while Her late Majesty was hard put to it to keep her countenance.

A story is current that a few days ago Emperor William, learning that two youthful lieutenants of the First Foot Guards intended to disregard his anti-duelling ordinance, hastened in Mufti to the Guards Barracks at Potsdam, and he assembled the officers, and detaching the offending lieutenants, energetically harangued them. He is represented as saying that he was determined to impose his will, and if his duelling decree was disobeyed, he would unrelentingly dismiss the offenders, even if one of them was the son of his best friend, and the other's father one of the greatest of German generals. The Emperor concluded by dressing down the lieutenants who were excused only on the ground of their youth.

A \$10,000,000 GIFT.

Andrew Carnegie's Latest Effort
to Rid Himself of His
Wealth.

NEW UNIVERSITY WILL BE IN WASHINGTON.

The United States Government
Asked to Act as Trustees.

Washington, D. C., December 11.—The Washington Post, confirming the reported offer of Mr. Andrew Carnegie to give a large sum of money for education, will say:—"President Roosevelt has received a letter from Andrew Carnegie containing the latter's offer to make a donation of \$10,000,000 to the United States. The letter will be referred to Congress by the President in a special message.

Mr Carnegie's gift is for the purpose of establishing in Washington a university for higher education. Mr Carnegie proposes that the university, which he is to endow, shall be the greatest institution in the world for the development of higher education. He has consulted President Gilman, of Johns Hopkins University; President Hadley, of Yale; President Eliot of Harvard; former President White of Cornell, and all the leading educators of the country. They heartily endorse his plans.

FOR POST-GRADUATES.

The proposed university will not interfere in the least with the educational institutions already established, but will supplement them, for, according to the present plans, its doors will be open only to those who desire to take up a post-graduate course. Mr. Carnegie also wants the new university to take the lead in original research, so that the United States can eventually stand side by side with Germany, if not excel that nation, in scientific development.

Mr. Carnegie's plan does not propose a national university in the sense that an appropriation will be asked or needed. The Government, is simply to be the trustee of the magnificent endowment. It is probable that a board of regents will be appointed, or it may be that the Government will be represented upon the board of directors, which, it is contemplated, shall consist of men of national reputation.

BEARS ENTIRE EXPENSE.

Mr Carnegie has kept the proposed endowment a secret until he definitely arranged the plans and scope of the new university. Even yet all these details have not been arranged, so that little more than the outline of his gift can be published. It is known, however, that he does not propose to ask from Congress a single foot of land upon which the university buildings will be constructed. The entire expense is to be borne out of his endowment. No site has yet been selected. It will, however, necessarily be very large, as it is proposed to erect a series of magnificent structures.

The amount of money to be given by Mr. Carnegie equals the sum of the present endowment fund of Harvard, and is considerably more than the invested fund of Yale.

With the Catholic University, the Methodist University, and the proposed Carnegie University, Washington, will be the educational centre of the country.

CANADIAN GOODS IN DEMAND.

Our Manufacturers Are Breaking Into
European Markets—Mr. Hemsley's
Experience.

Canada is not only selling goods in competition with Europe in Australia, South America and other open markets, but in Europe itself. This trade is not large, but Canadian bicycle and boot and shoe manufacturers have successfully measured strength with makers of the old land and other branches of manufacture are preparing to follow. The latest evidence of Canadian trade expansion is brought from Europe by Mr. Richard Hemsley of Montreal who has during the last ten years, built up a business in the manufacture of enamelled goods, which ranks with anything of the kind on this or any other continent.

Mr. Hemsley has invaded the European market with his wares before, but never so successfully as on this occasion. Mr. Hemsley said he found trade in

England was dull. The dullness seemed mainly caused by the South African war. Only those factories which were furnishing supplies and munitions of war were really busy. The merchants all agreed on the fact that the war was just and right, but they all were hoping for its end. All were building great hopes on the summer trade and on the fact that the coronation of King Edward VII. would attract large large crowds of visitors. Already extensive preparations were being made for that event.

To sell goods and obtain new ideas were Mr. Hemsley objects and both were attained. Now the largest houses of the old land are selling Canadian made enamelled jewellery. The ready demand for it is a tribute to the art and enterprise of the colony.

A general desire to know more about Canada is observable both in Great Britain and on the continent, and in England there is the most kindly feeling toward everything Canadian. Several good orders which Mr. Hemsley returned with are the direct result of this feeling.

This is Mr. Hemsley's twenty-third trip across the Atlantic.

London, Dec. 11.—Miss Emily Hampton, of Nazeing, was summoned on Friday for keeping a pig in a manner dangerous to health. Boston, Dec. 11.—General Patrick A. Collins, Democrat, was elected mayor of Boston for the next two years by a plurality of 19,325 (unofficial) over Mayor Hart, Republican, yesterday. The Democrats at an early hour this morning had apparently elected nine of the thirteen aldermen and had a large majority of the common council. As four candidates for the school committee received the endorsement of all parties, the fight came on the remaining six places on the board. At an early hour this morning it looked as if the Democrats had certainly captured four of them and the Republicans the other two. The city went for license by a ratio of about five to three.

The London Mail says it understands that the case of Col. Arthur Lynch, who led the Irish contingent serving with the Boers, and who was recently elected to represent Galway in the House of Commons, will be decided by the House in full session.

While Mr. Monk, the Quebec Conservative leader represents Sir Wilfred Laurier as too much of an imperialist, the Toronto Mail and Empire declares that the Premier is indifferent, even hostile to imperialism.

Monday afternoon Moses Ward, while working a threshing machine in Upper Melbou ne, Quebec, got his hand caught in the feeder. His arm was taken off to the elbow and the rest of the limb badly lacerated. The victim is progressing favourably.
