Winnipeg has Touch of Smallpox.

PATIENT ON TRAIN FROM WEST TO OTTAWA — ALL PASSENGERS QUARANTINED.

Salvation Army Girl Carried Plague to Annapolis.

ONE NEW CASE AT ST. JOHN.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

Ottawa, Dec. 12.—A case of smallpox developed on the Winnipeg train from the West last evening. The patient was sent to the hospital and 121 passengers were quarantined at Porter's Island.

Winnipeg, Dec. 12.—Two members of a theatrical company who arrived from the south yesterday had smallpox. The company was quarantined.

Situation at St. John.
(Telegraph Thursday.)

One more case of smallpox was discovered last night. The patient is the one month and 17 days old son of George D. R. Mason, a laborer, at 26 Southwark street. Dr. Morris visited the house last night and pronounced the case smallpox. The infant was vaccinated nine days ago. There are in the family besides the mother and father four other children. All have been vaccinated. Two other families, those of John McMahon, machinist, and H. Moore, carpenter, live in the same house, No. 31 Erin street, and the house in quarantine by the board of health.

Yesterday Mrs. Byron, Mrs. Corbett and Mrs. Stack were removed from their homes to the Isolation Hospital. The house, No. 31 Erin street, and the house in Fairville where Miss Odeil died, and the Gallagher house will be relieved from quarantine today and a couple of other houses will probably be relieved.

A Case at Annapolis.

Annapolis, N. S., Dec. 12.—A case of smallpox has developed here, the patient being a Miss Hebb, a captain in the Salvation army, from Houlton, Me. [She had recently been ill with typhoid fever and was returning to her home in [Bridgewater for a rest and] Gen. route] stayed a week in St. John, where it is supposed she contracted the disease. On arrival here she stayed with some friends and was taken ill, they believing it was a relapse of the fever. On Friday last the medical officer of the board of health diagnosed the case as being smallpox and had the building quarantined.

On Saturday a telephone message was sent to Dr. Reid, of the provincial board of health at Middleton, who arrived Monday and confirmed the opinion of Dr. Withers.

The board of health called a meeting at once and took prompt measures to prevent the spread of the disease and to secure a nurse. Some of the local Salvation army officers had been visiting the sick woman and their quarters were quarantined and the barracks shut up for the present. One of the officers in charge, fearing being quarantined left early Monday morning for Digby and took dinner at a house there, which has since been quarantined and also the officers' quarters there, where she went to stay. The public here are not apprehensive, as the board of health have taken every precaution to prevent contagion.

FOUR LIVES LOST.

But One Survivor of Small Boat Crew From Disabled Steamer.

Halifax, Dec. 11.—Word was received here last night from Sydney that a seaman from a Dominion Coal Company's steamers supposed to be the Ella, reached Main-Adieu today, after a desperate encounter with the waves, and related a sad story of the drowning of four fellow sailors, one of whom is believed to be the first officer of the steamer. Monday afternoon the steamer Ella, bound from Burnt Bay, Newfoundland, for Sydney, in ballast, lost her propeller off Scatarie. Shortly afterwards it was decided to send to Louisburg for assistance. Accordingly a boat with five of a crew, in oilskins left the ship for the shore. A strong northeast gale was blowing and a heavy sea rolling. They struggled ahead for some time, when finally a huge wave broke over the boat and she filled and sank leaving the crew struggling in the water for their lives. All were good

swimmers, but weighed down by their clothes, they sank one by one until there was but a single survivor. He fought a desperate battle for his life and finally reached shore at Main-Adieu.

Later last night two steamers were reported off Low Point. One is believed to be the disabled Ella. Tugs have gone out from North Sydney.

A pilot who reached Sydney last night from the steamer Ella, stated that the captain of that steamer said nothing of five men from his ship being missing. It has since been learned that there is some doubt as to whether the men drowned belong to the Ella or the Alladin. Both vessels are reported to have lost their propellers.

A LAW

In Amendment of a Law to regulate the measurement, (L.S.) inspection, weighing, and sale of certain articles.

BE IT ENACTED by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of Fredericton, as follows:—

1. No person shall sell, or offer or expose for sale in any of the Streets or Squares within this City, any firewood of the description usually called cordwood, or which can be measured by the cord, without having the same first measured by a Surveyor of wood appointed by the City Council under a penalty of two dollars for each offence.

2. It shall be the duty of any Surveyor of wood, on measuring any load of cordwood or other wood measured by him, to furnish the party offering the same for sale, with a certificate signed by him, showing the name of the party offering the load for sale, date of measurement, and quantity of wood contained in the load; the Surveyor in making any survey shall take into consideration and deduct any shortage from crooked or rough wood, short lengths, or refuse.

3. The party offering the wood for sale shall pay the Surveyor for his services, on receiving a certificate of the contents as aforesaid, the sum of five cents for each load, the contents of which may be less than one cord; nothing herein contained however to be construed as interfering with the scale of fees as now established for measuring cordwood by the cord.

4. Every person offering wood for sale by the load shall show and exhibit to any person or intending purchaser before completing the sale, the certificate of the Surveyor of wood hereinbefore provided for, showing the actual contents of the load offered, under a penalty of two dollars for each offence.

5. This law shall come into full force and operation on the 16th day of December, A. D. 1901.

6. Section seventeen of the By-Law passed on the third day of August, A. D. 1886, entitled "A Law to regulate the measurement, weighing, inspection, and sale of certain articles," and so much of said law as is inconsistent with or repugnant to this law, is hereby repealed.
