HOPEFUL ST. JOHN.

The people of St. John are very much pleased over the prospects of increased business in that city during the coming winter, and their elation arises from the fact that a strong local company has been organized to reopen and run the Parks cotton mills, giving employment to some seven hundred people, and that the winter export business is to assume proportions never before experienced in the history of the port. The new cotton mills company is composed of such public spirited, well to do citizens as James F. Robertson, James Manchester, Geo. W. Jones, W. H. Thorne, and A. H. Hanington, and the enterprise is bound to go with gentlemen like them at the back of it. The closing of the mills a year ago was a great blow to industrial St. John, and their reopening will bring joy to many homes. It is expected that the wage distribution will be fully two thousand dollars a week.

There is a perfect rush in improving the St. John terminal facilities to handle the export business this winter. The C. P. R. with its characteristic energy, is expending a large amount in this direction, and the loading and unloading of the big steamers of five lines that will make their terminus in the sister city, will employ a big force of men.

In a general way business is apparently in a fair condition in that city, and while there may be some grumbling, the outlook is indeed hopeful and encouraging.

People in all parts of the province will rejoice if St. John forges ahead as a result of the pleasing business outlook. That city furnishes a valuable market for the rest of New Brunswick, and while all the outside towns and villages buy large quantities of goods from St. John merchants, they also sell much to the mercantile classes in the commercial capital, and thus the dealings are mutually profitable.

BRETHREN AT VARIANCE.

Mr. Monk M. P. who poses as Conservative leader in Quebec, and who is a much overestimated man, is getting some hard knocks from that old Conservative organ, the Montreal Gazette. Our esteemed contemporary, which represents the most respectable element of its party, observes that "there has come in a temporary prominence in the Conservative party of Quebec a lot of short-sighted little minded individuals, lacking in everything that makes for breadth and wholesomeness in public life. They do not see that in their efforts they are playing into the hands of the enemy. No voter who is misguided by them, if he had reflective power at all, would think of helping them with his ballot."

The steady support Tory organs who delight in attacking Mr. Tarte, will now find it necessary to defend Mr. Monk against the Gazette's attacks. Evidently what is left of the Conservative party in Quebec, is in a very bad way. The factions are getting at each other in lively shape, and while the enemy's quarrels proceed, the Liberals have carried three seats for the Quebec legislature, not a Tory candidate putting in an appearance in any of the constituencies.

THE LATE MR. McMILLAN, EX-M. P.

Among the members of the last Canadian Parliament, few outside the immediate ministerial circle and the opposition leaders were more conspicuous than Mr. John McMillan, whose death is announced at Seaford, Ont.

Mr. McMillan, who was a native of

Scotland, farmed very extensively and in Parliament was one of the chief speakers on agriculture topics. He was earnest and forcible, spoke in broad Scotch and was always sure of an attentive hearing. He represented South Huron, but was defeated last November, by a small majority. Mr. McMillan was 77 years of age and had been a resident of Canada for 58 years.

WANT TO RUN THE TOWN.

Out at Des Moines, Iowa, they had an autumn carnival, and it is alleged visitors painted the city red, self respecting citizens being much distracted by the orgies that prevailed. The clergymen took the matter up, and have made a proposal to take the city government out of the hands of the Mayor and council and run it for a week, their action partly arising from the Mayor's exultation over the Rev. Mr. Hooker's refusal to accept the office of policeman which the Mayor offered after the declaration that the preachers of the town, if they had the authority, could clear it of all vice.

The preachers propose to appoint a Mayor, Board of Aldermen, Chief of Police, and an entirely new police force, and then, with the regularly elected officers indorsing all their actions, to conduct the city on Christian principles.

Mr. John Palmer, whose tannery products have a continental reputation, has a pay roll in his enterprises that is not equalled by any other industry in the city. One hundred and forty hands, the great majority of them representing skilled labor, work for Mr. Palmer and spend their money here. The city is greatly indebted to Mr. Palmer's enterprise in establishing and conducting such an important industry.

The Truro Sun, Conservative organ in Colchester, N. S., understands that Mr. Charles Prescott Blanchard has been appointed Postmaster of that town, in succession to the late Mr. M. Carly, and commends the selection. Mr. Blanchard is president of the Colchester Liberal Association, and from a party standpoint as well as personal qualifications, is well fitted for the position.

The Duke and Duchess of York this evening will be in the bosom of their family—a nice little family of three boys and a girl, to which they will add the big Newfoundland dog presented to the royal couple at St. John's, and two ponies donated at Capetown. The little ones will have a regular Christmas tree long before the arrival of the regular festive season.

ROUSING MEETINGS.

The Farmers Institutes at Hachies School House and Rogersville.

(Special Correspondence to the Herald.)

The Bathurst Farmers' Institute was a decided success from every point of view. The liveliest discussions on the questions introduced prevailed. Mr. John Kenny in introducing Hon. L. P. Farris expressed the great pleasure of the parish at having him with them.

Mr. Farris was the first speaker and said he had come along to find out the needs of the farmers and to meet these wants as far as he could. He spoke of the pleasing surprise that Gloucester county gave him on this his first visit and outlined the policy of the government in relation to agriculture.

Mr. Raynor spoke on clover culture, and planting and care of the orchard. He believed that they had a good country for both clover and apples, and both might be grown with profit to the producers. Mr. Sharp claimed that the production of pork should be engaged in more than it is. The bacon type of hog is found in the Yorkshires, Tamworths and improved Berkshire.

The success of the Rogersville Farmers' Institute was largely due to the efforts of Father Richard, the president of the society. Both afternoon and evening sessions were well attended and the following subjects were dealt with by Messrs. Raynor and Sharp: dairy farming, pork production, clover culture and poultry raising.
