HARVEY STATION.

tural hall last evening and organiz-
ed a farmers' institute in con-
nection with Manners Sutton Agricul-
tural society. Robert Little occupied
the chair. Mr. Tompkins spoke on
farming and gave much valuable infor-
mation on the preparation of the soil and
rotation of crops. Mr. Mitchell spoke
on dairying, and was also much appre-
ciated. A number of farmers expressed
themselves as highly satisfied with the
meeting.

SIX SMALLPOX CASES.

Serious Condition of Affairs at St. John.

The smallpox outbreak in St. John,
says the Telegraph, seems to be develop-
ing, although an epidemic may not be
imminent, precautionary preventatives
are in order. Friday four new cases
came to light, making a total of six. Like
the previous cases, those discovered Fri-
day are in the vicinity of the epidemic
hospital, where the first victim was con-
fined, and died two weeks ago.

Two of those who have contracted the
disease are female nurses at the General
Hospital, Miss Munro and Miss Morris,
who belong in the vicinity of Amherst,
N. S.

The other cases are: Mrs. James Bel-
yea, who lives with her husband and five
children in cramped quarters in the rear
of the corner of Waterloo street and Hay-
market square, and the 16 year-old son of
Hugh Parker, who lives at 35 Marsh
street. This family comprises nine per-
sons.

The board of health physician, who has
examined the cases, pronounces them all
of a mild type.

The hospital nurses who have contract-
ed the disease had been ill for a few days
with the symptoms of la grippe until Fri-
day morning, when smallpox was sus-
pected. Later in the day the cases were
diagnosed as smallpox and removed to
the epidemic hospital.

In consequence of the outbreak the
hospital commissioners, at the suggestion
of the board of health, have placed the
institution under quarantine. The wards
and nurses' departments have been fumig-
ated and all inmates vaccinated. For
the present no patients except any in an
emergency will be admitted.

A King's Birthday Dinner.

ceived yesterday by the Prime Minister,

dinner is 7.30.

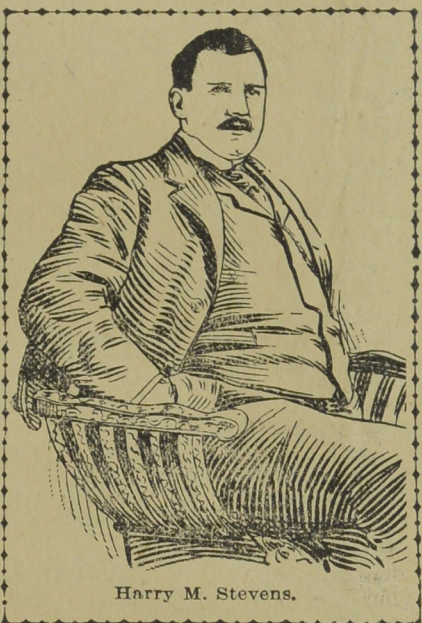
