Houghton, Esq.:

"It is with high satisfaction I am enabled to state that from all parties interested in the colony I am continually complimented with the display made in the Canadian Division."

"Her Majesty the Queen, accompanied by Prince Albert, the Princes of Prussia and the Netherlands, spent more than half an hour yesterday morning in the Division. This third visit was made at a very early hour. . . . The sleighs, minerals, cereals, produce, furniture and fire engines were minutely examined by Her Majesty and the Prince. It is, I believe, their intention to visit each department in this manner, but Canada has been the first to receive that honor."—From The Globe of May 31, 1851.

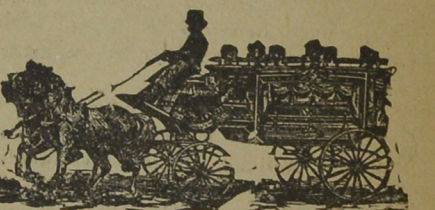
