EXCITING GAME.

Fredericton and Mount
Allison Play a Draw
at Football.ONE OF THE BEST EXHIBITIONS
EVER SEEN HERE.Home Team Failed to Win
From Want of Practice.MOUNT ALLISON BOYS DECLINED
TO REMAIN OVER FOR
ANOTHER GO.

The Mount Allison and Fredericton football teams met yesterday on the college field in a hotly contested game which ended with no score on either side. The Mount Allison team lined up the same as the day before, with the exception of McFadden taking the place of Shanklin in the forwards. The home team lined up as follows:

Forwards—Babbitt, Sweeney, DeLong, Smith, McCorquindale, Slade, Wandlass, Walker.

Halves—Dever, McLellan, McLeod, Tibbitts.

Quarters—Sadler, Murray.

Full back—Babbitt.

The ball was kicked off by Mount Allison and was returned by the city, a series of scrimmages followed near the centre of the field, neither side gaining. The Mount Allison forwards by fast dribbling succeeded in working the ball up to the city 15 yard line, but were unable to follow this advantage up by a score owing to the strong defence put up by the city. A splendid punt by McLeod sent the ball to Mt. A's 26 yard line, and the Sackville boys again succeeded in dribbling down to Fredericton's goal compelling them to touch for safety.

After the kick off at 25 yards a punt by Church and a splendid run by Bigelow brought the ball again into the city's territory. The whistle blew for half time with the ball in a scrimmage near the centre of the field.

In the second half Mount Allison was kept on the defensive, and at no time was Fredericton's goal in danger. Only the strong punting and cool work of Powell, Mount Allison's full back, kept the city from scoring. Near the end of the half, a splendid tackle by Rice prevented Tibbitts from making a try. The game ended with the ball at Mount Allison's ten yard line and Fredericton trying hard to score.

The Fredericton forwards were more successful in stopping Mount Allison's dribbling than those of the U. N. B. Sweeney, DeLong, Slade and Walker played well. Sadler played a good game at quarter, and in the half line Tibbitts and McLeod were especially strong, the latter's punting being a feature of the game.

Curtis, Vroom and Day played a good game for Mount Allison. Wright and Bowes put up a sharp game at quarter. Bigelow retained his reputation of the day before, and Powell at full back, made some splendid kicks.

G C Archibald refereed in a satisfactory manner, while Homer Lane and H F McLeod performed the antics of touch judges.

The Mount Allison boys left for home by the eight o'clock train last evening, and were given a rousing send off. The city team tried hard to induce the visitors to remain over and play them another game this afternoon but to no purpose. The Mount Allison boys had all the football they wanted for this week, and declined all offers made to them.
