HOW THEY DIFFER.

The St. John Sun and Mr. Foster are loudly demanding that Canada should pay the cost of the new Canadian contingent, but some of their Conservative friends are not in favor of such an expenditure. Mr. Bergeron, ex-M. P., and ex-Tory leader of Quebec, not only opposes paying the bill, but is against sending a contingent at all, and he is commended by La Journal, the French Tory paper started by Sir Charles Tupper in Montreal. La Journal declares that "Mr. Bergeron, the former Deputy Speaker of the House of Commons and leader for this province, speaks like a prudent man who has made up his mind in opposing the despatch of another contingent." It adds that he shares in another form the views expressed by Mr. Monk to the Club Cartier on the subject of Imperialism and of the contingent.

When the first contingent was proposed Mr. Bergeron spoke with Mr. Foster at a public meeting in St. John and he was then very strong in demanding the despatch of Canadian soldiers to South Africa. The Tory leaders thought then that they had the government in a hole, because Sir Wilfrid Laurier had expressed the opinion that Parliament should be consulted before an enterprise that would cost a couple of million dollars was embarked on by the government. Mr. Bergeron was speaking to an English audience, but he has a different story for French Canadian consumption. He does not want another contingent whether it is authorized by Parliament or not and the French Tory organs back him up in that position.

Perhaps the Sun will enlighten us on the attitude which its Tory allies in Quebec are assuming; let us hear from it on Mr. Monk's anti-Imperial utterances, and Mr. Bergeron's anti-contingent crusade, and let the French translator transfer his services for the moment from La Patrie to La Journal, from Mr. Tarte to Mr. Monk and Mr. Bergeron.

Rough on Fredericton. The Halifax Chronicle says: "There were fifty-eight cases of smallpox in the N. B. capital."—Telegraph.
