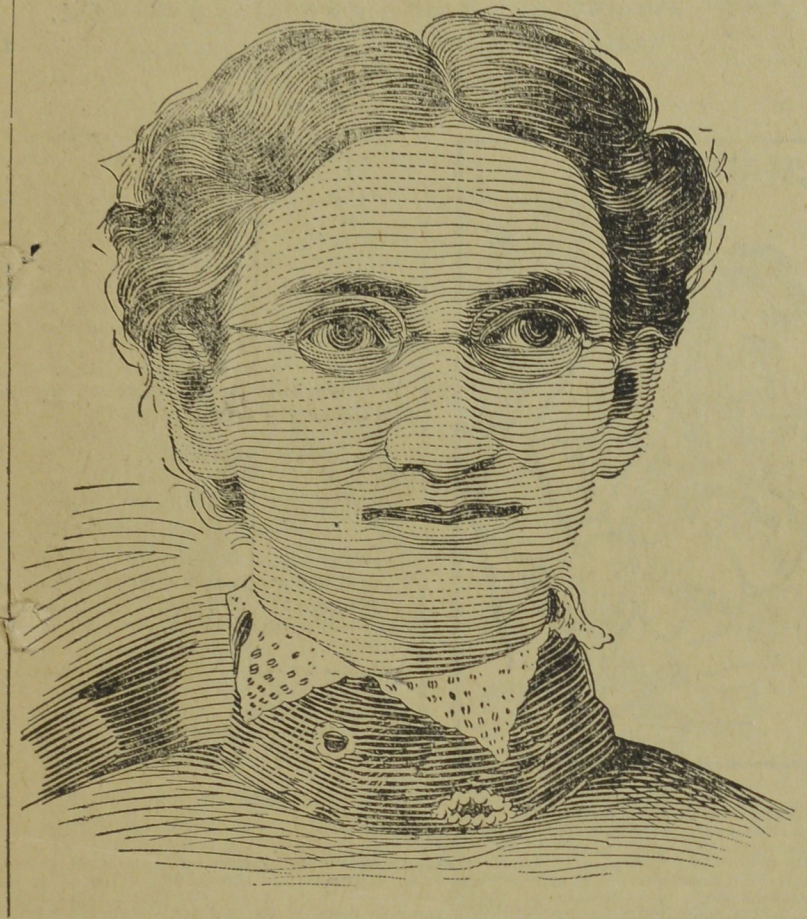

fitting reference to the day being celebrated and referred in glowing terms to the Scottish people and their achievements for the good of mankind. He invited all to drink heartily to the toast.

The singing of "Scots Wha Hae" in a spirited manner by a quartette composed of Messrs. V. Boyle, H. Fradsham, Frank Foster and J. A. Lawlor followed and was most enthusiastically received. For an encore they sang a comic ditty which made a great hit.

A toast to the Dominion Parliament and Provincial Legislature was proposed to by Dr. Davidson of the U. N. B. In the course of his remarks he paid a well deserved tribute to the fathers of responsible government, and regretted that greater appreciation of their services was not manifested at the present day. He also regretted that the growth of Canada had not been more rapid, but he was not without hope for the future. He would couple the toast with the names of Senator Ellis and R. D. Wilmot M. P.

The toast was very heartily received, and the company joined in singing "For They're Jolly Good Fellows."

Senator Ellis, in reply to the toast, expressed pleasure at being present to help celebrate the 76th anniversary of the society. If the parliamentary institutions of the country were not useful at the present time, he hoped that they would become so in the future. Considering the peculiar nature of Canada the various parliaments had conducted themselves well, and the general advance of the country, he believed, was due to the excellent manner in which our parliamentary affairs had been conducted. He had sat in Parliament for years and was satisfied that it was the disposition of the men on both sides of politics to advance the interests of the country and do what was right. He referred to the senate as rather a restful place but it has its duties to perform. If he had his way he would reform the senate,

lakes were just as blue as those of Scotland. Dr. Ellis' well conceived address was listened to with the closest attention, and he was heartily applauded.

R. D. Wilmot, M. P., was received with applause. He was glad to be present to assist in doing honor to Scotland's patron saint. He was not a Scotchman, but the grandson of a Scotchman, and was second to none in paying his tribute to that great race of people. Scotchmen always make their mark wherever they go, and are a credit to any country. He was not a prominent member of Parliament, but kept his ears and eyes open, and always endeavored to vote in the interests of the people who sent him there. He agreed with Senator Ellis that Canada was a difficult country to govern, and a conciliatory spirit was necessary. The French are a patriotic people, but rather excitable, and their minds were easy to work upon. This country never would prosper by working on feelings of race and religion. He noticed of late years that there was a kindlier feeling displayed in debate in parliament than was formerly the case. This was due to the influence of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Mr. Borden, the conservative leader. He had found that men whom he had been accustomed to hear hard things of usually turned out to be the most agreeable of men. It was necessary to cultivate a feeling of unselfishness or parliament would be without happiness. In conclusion he returned thanks for the attentive hearing given him.

Frank L. Cooper, being called upon by the chairman sang "The Maple Leaf Forever," in his usual finished style. This was followed by a selection from the quartette.

A toast to "Our Educational Institutions" [was proposed by Capt. H. F. McLeod.] He spoke very highly of our educational institutions, and did not think the people of Canada had any reason to be ashamed of them. One great feature of educational institutions, which was particularly gratifying to him, was that their advantages had been brought within reach of the humblest in the land.

Chancellor Harrison, in replying to the toast, expressed his pleasure at being present. He referred to what had been done by Andrew Carnegie for the universities of Scotland, and also acknowledged the indebtedness which our university owed to St. Andrews society for a valuable scholarship. He was glad to notice a number of old graduates of U. N. B. present, though it was a reminder to him that he was getting along in years. He made reference to the new science building, and acknowledged the financial assistance to defray the cost of its construction which had been received from the local legislature, the city of Fredericton and
