The funeral of the late Norman Bradley took place from his home at Gibson this afternoon and was attended by a number of sympathizing friends. Services were conducted by Rev Mr Robinson and interment was made in the rural cemetery.

Death at Burt's Corner.

James H. Jones, a well known resident of Burt's Corner, died at that place on Thursday, aged 76 years. He is survived by a widow and four daughters. The funeral took place this morning with Undertaker R. B. Adams in charge of the arrangements.

Smoking Concert.

The non-commissioned officers and men of the R.C.R.I. held a smoking concert at the drill hall last evening. There was a large attendance, but on account of the lamented death of Lt.-Col. McLearn the excellent program prepared for the occasion had to be cut short.

WILL BE MISSED.

Lamented Death of Dr. McLearn, Surgeon Lieut.-Col. of the R. C. R. I.

PASSED AWAY AT 8.30 O'CLOCK LAST EVENING.

The Sad Event Has Cast a Gloom Over the City.

HEART TROUBLE THE CAUSE OF HIS DEMISE—SKETCH OF HIS CAREER.

The death occurred at his home on Queen street at 8.30 o'clock last evening, of Dr Robert McLearn, surgeon lieutenant colonel to the Royal Regiment of Canadian Infantry. He had been a sufferer from heart trouble for some years, and had a serious attack about ten days ago which compelled him to give up work. For a time his condition was quite serious but he rallied somewhat, and it was thought during the early part of the week that he would recover. He had a bad attack on Thursday, however, and it became quite evident to his physicians and friends that the end was only a question of hours. The painful announcement last evening that he had passed away, though not entirely unexpected, was received by his numerous friends and the public generally with feelings of genuine sorrow and regret.

The deceased gentleman was a native of Tatamagouche, Colchester County, N. S., being a son of Mr. and Mrs. James McLearn, now resident at Halifax. He took a course in medicine at the Halifax Medical College and afterwards at the University of New York, and commenced practice early in the eighties at Newcastle, N.B. where he also conducted a drug store. He acquired the practice of Dr. Patterson and removed to this city in 1885 and has since made his home here. He built up an extensive practice, and was one of the best known and most popular medical practitioners in the neighborhood.

The late Dr McLearn has been identified with the military for a number of years, first as assistant surgeon to the 8th Princess Louise Huzzars, and latterly as medical officer to the R. C. R. I., which appointment he received in June 1893, in succession to the late lamented Dr Brown. He received the rank of Surgeon Major on appointment, and a few months later was made Honorary Surgeon Lieut. Col. of the regiment. He discharged his important duties in an eminently satisfactory manner, his genial disposition and many excellent qualities winning for him the esteem by the officers and men of the corps. On several occasions he acted as principal medical officer to the militia assembled for drill at Sussex and Aldershot, and had host of friends among the militiamen who will learn of his death with much regret.

The deceased was very popular in social circles, and his death will be mourned by a large circle of warm friends. He was in his 47th year and is survived by a widow, a daughter of the late Hon. A. A. Davidson, of Newcastle, and one son, James, a boy of ten years. In addition to his aged parents, he is also survived by two brothers and one sister, the latter being the wife of Lt.-Col. Charles J. McDonald, post office inspector for Nova Scotia. In religion Dr McLearn was a Presbyterian and he belonged to the Independent Order of Foresters. To the bereaved widow and relatives The Herald extends heartfelt sympathy, which will be shared by the whole community.

The funeral will take place on Monday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock, with services at his late residence. The remains will be interred in the rural cemetery with military honors. No 4 Company of the R. C. R. I., will compose the firing party, and Capt. Lister will probably be in command. John G. Adams has charge of the arrangements.
