

MARYLAND HILL BLAZE.

Fire Completely Wiped
out the Residence
and Barns of

JOHN JOHNSON WITH NEARLY
ALL THEIR CONTENTS.

Inmates Barely Escaped With
Their Lives.

FLAMES CAUGHT FROM FURNACE
PIPE.

The city was awakened shortly after two o'clock this morning by an alarm of fire sent in from box 25, and firemen and citizens who responded to the call found a brightly burning beacon on Maryland hill, which shed its illumination all over the city. It was the home of Mr. and Mrs. John Johnson in flames, and the roar and crackling of the fire as it licked up its prey could be distinctly heard on the streets. The fire soon spread to the outbuildings and barns and all were soon levelled to the ground, with nearly all of their contents.

Before Mr. Johnson retired for the night he threw a couple of logs into the furnace and closed it up, and the presumption is that the flames originated from the furnace pipe. At 2 o'clock Mr. and Mrs. Johnson were awakened by the smell of smoke and the crackling of flames, and throwing open their bedroom door were nearly suffocated. They had time to only partially dress and escape from the burning building without saving anything, even Mrs. Johnson's jewelry being sacrificed. Mr. Johnson was able however, to get his horse and carriages out of the barn, and these were practically the only things saved from the devouring elements.

The only other occupant of the house was the servant, Mrs. Eaton, and she too lost all her personal belongings, including a small sum of money.

The house was very nicely furnished, and the barn, besides the horse and carriages, contained five tons of hay and a quantity of oats which were destroyed.

Mr. Johnson had no insurance on his furniture, but the buildings were covered in the Quebec Company of which R. W. L. Tibbitts is agent, the policy being in favor of the mortgagee, Mrs. Thompson of Portland, Maine.

The property destroyed was formerly owned and occupied by Postmaster Hilyard, but he disposed of it some years ago.

Mr. and Mrs. Johnson intended moving into the city this winter to reside with her daughter, Mrs. Dower, in one of the Lucy houses, Brunswick street, and their movement in that direction has been hastened by this morning's blaze.

Quite a number of people responded to the alarm of fire, but the property being out of the fire limits, no assistance could be rendered by the department, and the onlookers were powerless to save the property which was consumed in a very short time.

Handcuffed Himself.

A young man working for Deputy Sheriff Foster, played a funny trick on himself the other evening. His day's work was done and he was amusing himself in Mr. Foster's office, examining a heavy pair of hand-cuffs. He placed them on his wrists and closed them, and wondered how he would feel if he were really under arrest. When he attempted to remove them, he found that they would not open, he had locked them on his wrists. He appealed to Mrs. Foster for the key and she had to tell him that Mr. Foster was miles away, up the Tobique, with the keys in his pocket. She got another man to drive the self made prisoner to Woodstock where the High Sheriff, who had a duplicate key, released him. He is now willing to leave the use of hand-cuffs to a man who understands them.—Woodstock Dispatch.

A BANGOR EXPLOSION

Killed Three People and Destroyed
Considerable Property.

Bangor, Me., Oct. 17.—At 3.40 o'clock yesterday afternoon a terrific explosion of gasoline or some other equally powerful explosive occurred on the second floor of the building at 16 Harlow street, in the apartments of Miss Nellie Haney. The explosion completely wrecked the first and second floors and caused a fire in which Miss Haney and Mrs. Mary F. Carrigan were burned to death, and John Barry was frightfully burned, and died at 9.45 tonight in the hospital.

The explosion so wrecked the walls of her apartment that Miss Haney was un-

able to force her way out and expired before the firemen could reach her.

Mrs. Carrigan was employed in the restaurant of Nathaniel Ladd, located on the first floor of the building, as assistant cook, and worked in the kitchen which was located at the rear of Miss Haney's apartment. At the time of the explosion there were in the kitchen besides her, John Barry, the cook, Mrs. Emma Sprague, another assistant, and the cook's wife and Mrs. John Cannon, of Bangor. When the shock came, Mrs. Carrigan made a dash for the attic, thinking to get on the roof, the others started for the stairs leading to the street, but Mr. Barry rushed after his assistant to bring her back, knowing that it was impossible to reach the roof from the attic. He was unable to reach her and the blaze cut him off from again descending to the second floor, and he was finally forced to jump from a third floor window.
