THE CITY VOTE.

Mr. Gibson had a majority of the city votes in the last election, but he should do a great deal better tomorrow. The men of Fredericton are familiar with the causes that brought on this election, and a large number of Mr. McLeod's former supporters have protested vigorously against the persecution of Mr. Gibson. These gentlemen today are supporting the Liberal candidate, not because they are converts to Liberalism, but because they do not believe in the species of warfare that has been waged against Mr. Gibson. Many of them were leaders in the Conservative party, and we take it that the same reasons that influenced them to withdraw their support from Mr. McLeod will induce scores of electors in the rank and file to follow a similar course.

Men love fair play whether in love, war or politics, and it is felt that Mr. Gibson has been wrongly treated by Mr. McLeod and his followers. The way to give practical effect to this feeling is to go promptly to the polls tomorrow and record your vote for Mr. Gibson. He has made a straightforward appeal to you. He and his friends have made no back door canvasses; they have said nothing on the public platform and whispered nothing in the ears of the electors that will not bear the fierce blaze of noonday. Mr. Gibson wants your votes that he may resume his seat in Parliament of which he was unjustly deprived.

Electors of Fredericton, rally to Mr. Gibson's support and give him such a rousing majority that the protest filers will be given to understand that York wants to see fair play and will have it.

VOTE FOR MR. GIBSON—TEN GOOD REASONS.

The York election campaign is practically over, and all that remains is for the voters to go to the polls tomorrow and register their preference as between the parties and the candidates.

(1) If you believe in the government and its policy you will cast your ballot for Mr. Gibson.

(2) If you are a Conservative, but disbelieve in the campaign methods of Mr. McLeod, you will vote for Mr. Gibson.

(3) If you believe in discouraging protests, you will not vote for Mr. McLeod.

(4) If you study the best interests of the constituency you will vote for Mr. Gibson.

(5) If you disbelieve in raising the race and religion cry you will vote for Mr. Gibson.

(6) If you want to do what you can to bring the Canada Eastern Railway under government control, you will vote for Mr. Gibson.

(7) If you want to protest against the use of small personal canvasses, abuse and misrepresentation, you will vote for Mr. Gibson.

(8) If you desire to record your approval of the government's policy that

has assisted Canada to prosperity, which was never before enjoyed, you will vote for Mr. Gibson.

(9) If you are an ardent Imperialist, a lover of British connection, you will vote for Mr. Gibson who represents Sir Wilfrid Laurier, a man that has done more to cement the unity of the Empire than all other Canadian public men rolled into one.

(10) If you want this constituency to keep in touch with the government of the day, and not linger in the cool shades of opposition, you will vote for Mr. Gibson.

The Laurier government gave the Motherland the preferential tariff by which the duties on British goods imported into Canada are reduced one third. The Laurier government also sent Canadian contingents to fight Britain's battles in South Africa, and secured from Parliament in a single session \$2,000,000 to pay the cost thereof, besides paying \$1,000 a day for the Canadian soldiers in garrison at Halifax. When Mr. McLeod and his friends accuse Laurier of disloyalty, point them to these facts.

The Moncton Times has read Mr. James S. Neill out of the Conservative party because he declines to support Mr. McLeod. And yet Mr. Neill is a great deal better Conservative than the Times. During the eighteen years rule of the Conservative party Mr. Neill never asked and never received any consideration for his support. The Times, during the same period, was subsidized to the extent of \$12,000 a year.

St Andrews Beacon: Dr McLeod has done more to destroy the Conservative party in York than any other man, excepting, perhaps, Mr. Foster. He has dragged his clerical robes into the mire as well, and richly deserves the rebuke that he will receive at the hands of the people of York county on Saturday next.

Mr. McLeod makes his chief appeal to prohibitionists, and yet five years ago, when prohibition conventions in York and Kings pressed him to accept a nomination, he absolutely declined, declaring that he did not think politics the proper field for a minister of the Gospel. Electors of York, take him at his word.

Vote for Gibson who is one of the proprietors in the greatest of York's industries, which gives employment to 1,500 people, and annually distributes half a million dollars among the working men and women of York county.

Business men of Fredericton don't want the Canada Eastern swallowed up by an outside corporation. Vote for Gibson and assist in the plan to make the road a part of the Intercolonial.

The public accounts of Canada for the year ending June 30th, 1901, show a surplus of \$5,648,335. There has never been a deficit since the Liberals came into power five years ago.

Every man entitled to vote should exercise that right tomorrow, and you can best serve this constituency by depositing your ballot for Mr. Gibson.

Laurier restored peace in Canada by settling the Manitoba school agitation. Give Mr. Gibson a vote and approve of Laurier's course.

The majority of the preachers of Fredericton are opposed to Mr. McLeod's candidature.

Vote for Gibson and enter your protest against the importation of fire-eaters like Fred M. Sprout, into this constituency.

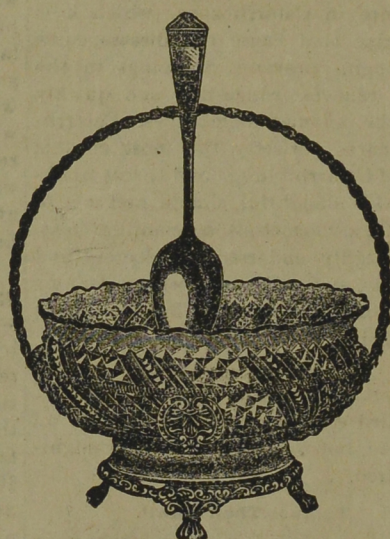
