## BIG GAME HUNTERS.

### Many Parties Have Had Success in the Miramichi Woods.

(Newcastle Advocate.)

Many of the sportsmen already mentioned by the Advocate have returned from their trips and without an exception they have all succeeded in getting their allotment of game and all have expressed themselves as delighted with their trips. Cautious and willing guides and cooks, a nice country and an hospitable people all go toward making the Miramichi an ideal country for a big game hunt. In fact some have been so far carried away by the splendors of our scenery and big game as to express their intention of coming again next season and the celebrated Brooklyn artist, Carol Runjos, has made arrangements to spend all next summer and fall in this country. He recently returned from a trip on the North Branch of the Renous with guide David Maudeville, and succeeded in shooting a moose. He also got a large number of bird skins to mount and a large number of wild game pictures taken in life in their natural haunts. He also painted a number of pictures which were perfect representations of big game in their native wilds. During his trip he saw twenty-one moose and in conversation with an Advocate reporter said he had gathered enough material to keep him busy at his studio until next May.

H A Pitman and Wm B Long, who spent a few days at Tabusintac, shot forty-two birds. They were delighted with their trip and speak well of the people. They were the guests of Mrs McEachern.

Commissioner Robinson last week called on Messrs Hillis and Harrington who are hunting at Clearwater. Mr Hillis had his moose and they have seen a number of others so that Mr Harrington expects to get his shortly. Carol Bersing and Geo McKay are their guides.

Capt. E. R. Mandsley, the Imperial Remount officer, who recently spent a few weeks at Whitney Brook, succeeded in getting what is generally conceded to be the prettiest moose head ever seen here. It had a spread of 58 inches with twenty-

nine points, all perfect and evenly balanced. Edward White was his guide and Allan Matchett his cook. Capt. Mandsley was delighted with his trip and gave Mr. White a flattering recommendation as to his abilities as a guide, which we have not a doubt that Mr. White merited.

Messrs. Edwin Holmes and E. A. Slack of Brookline, Mass., had a fine trip and were the most successful party that returned up to date. They were in the Bauld Mountain county with guides Arthur Pringley and Sydney Thomas and succeeded in shooting two moose, two caribou, one moose head had a spread of sixty-two and a half inches and the other a spread of fifty-two inches. The deer head was also a magnificent specimen. To say that these gentlemen were delighted with their trip is only mildly expressing their sentiments. Mr. Holmes said that from the large number of young bulls they had seen he was convinced that our game was being well looked after. Their party saw fully ninety big game animals and succeeded in getting a number of fine photographs of big game.

Messrs H. K. McKirkland and Edwin McKesson of New York who were hunting on the north branch of the Little Southwest with guides John Wamboldt and Geo. Shultz arrived in town Monday night with a moose and caribou each and a deer head. These gentlemen were here last year but were unsuccessful. They saw twenty nine moose and seven caribou and were highly pleased with their trip.

## TO HAVE NEW TRIAL

### Roland Molineux Will Have a Chance For His Life.

### HIS APPEAL DECIDED BY THE SUPREME COURT.

### A Memorable Murder Case to be Re-opened.

Albany, Oct. 16.—The Court of Appeals yesterday granted Roland B Molineux a new trial.

Molineux was convicted of the murder of Katherine J. Adams, in New York city, and sentenced to be electrocuted. The court granted a new trial on a prevailing opinion written by Judge Kerner, of Rochester, his principal ground being that the lower court erred in admitting evidence as to another alleged crime, the death of Barnett, and thus merged two issues.

Justices Parker, Haight and Gray did not believe that the Barnett evidence should be kept entirely out of the case.

Judges Werner, Bartlett, Vann and O'Brien concurred in the prevailing opinion, and for the expunging of the Barnett testimony.

The court gave out a condensed statement of the reasons for granting the new trial. They say:

"Every member of the Court of Appeals agrees for the reversal of the judgment of conviction of Molineux on the ground that the trial court erred in receiving in evidence the declarations of Barnett made to Doctors Phillips and Douglass, that he had received Kutnow powders through the mail.

"All agree that since the amendment of section 2 of chapter 36, of the laws of 1880, by chapter 555, of the laws of 1888, genuine writings may be received in evidence as standards of comparison, with a disputed writing, although such writing may not be the issue on trial, but simply a fact relevant and material to that issue. That the genuineness of such writings must be established to the satisfaction of the court by common law evidence, and when that is done hand-writing experts may compare the disputed writings with the genuine writings and give their opinion thereon, but they cannot select and establish the standards of comparison and then compare them with the disputed writings."

"All writings proved to the satisfaction of the court by preponderance of evidence in civil cases, and beyond a reasonable doubt in criminal cases. (1) by witnesses who saw the paper written or to whom it had been acknowledged; (2) by witnesses familiar with the handwriting of the person charged to be the writer and who are able to testify from their familiarity to a belief respecting its genuineness; (3) where the writing is shown to have been recognized and acquiesced in by the person supposed to have written it, or adopted and acted upon by him in his business transactions or other concerns, may under the statute be compared with the disputed writing by witnesses. But the court should refuse to receive in evidence solely for the purpose of comparison any writing otherwise prejudicial to a defendant.—Judge Werner writing to the principal opinion.

The only subject about which the members of the court differ in their opinions relates to the testimony introduced tending to show that Molineux caused the death of Barnett, by the same method as that used in taking the life of Mrs Adams.

Four of the members of the court, O'Brien, Bartlett, Vann, and Werner, J. J., agree that the evidence should not have been received, and the reason for it is stated in the opinion written by O'Brien and Werner, J. J., the other three judges, Parker, C. J., and Gray and Haight, J. J., hold that that evidence in the Barnett case pointing toward Molineux tends to identify him as the person who killed Mrs. Adams, while attempting to take the life of Cornish, by means of that rare poison, known as cyanide of mercury, the Chief Judge and Judge Gray, writing opinions to that effect.

## SHOT THE WHIRLPOOL.

### A Chicagoan Made the Trip in a Small Boat.

Niagara Falls, N. Y., Oct. 16.—Peter Nissen, of Chicago, successfully navigated the Whirlpool rapids on Saturday afternoon in a 21-foot cigar-shaped boat called the "Fool Killer." Nissen has been taking soundings in the river below the falls, and has secured valuable data.

Today's trip through the Whirlpool rapids was witnessed by 15,000 people. Nissen left the Canadian shore from a point near the falls, at two o'clock. After crouching about in the still water for two hours he floated into the rapids, the "Fool-Killer" passed through the rapids in four minutes. Nissen attempted to take soundings in the rapids, but the force of the water broke his cable.
