THE LATE N. F. DAVIN.

An announcement of the tragic death of Nicholas Flood Davin, the well known Conservative politician and journalist of the west, will be found in another column. Mr. Davin was a native of Limerick, Ireland, being a son of Nicholas Flood Davin, of the family of the Right Hon. Henry Flood. He was educated at Queen's University, Ireland, and was called to the English bar in 1868. He practised law in London for a time and was a war correspondent for a London paper during the Franco-German war. He removed to Toronto in 1872, and to Regina in 1883 where he has since resided. He fought as a volunteer in the Northwest rebellion of 1885, and was elected to parliament for West Assiniboia in 1887, holding the seat until the general elections of last year when he suffered defeat. Mr. Davin was a prolific writer and a witty and entertaining speaker.

Toronto Telegram: Public ownership of the telegraph lines to the Yukon has already reduced the toll. The scale of prices fixed experimentally yielded a revenue which exceeded the estimate, and Hon. J. Israel Tarte cut down the rates. Private ownership of such a line would have kept up the rates and taxed the business all it would bear. The failures of public ownership are largely dwelt upon, but perhaps the people pay more in dollars and cents for the successes of private ownership than they would have to pay for the failures of public ownership.

The Montreal Herald prints side by side two advertisements for help. One is for "an honest Protestant servant for five in family; no washing or ironing; wages \$14." The other is for a teacher for the Protestant school, with first-class elementary diploma; salary \$15 per month for eight months. It will thus be seen that by getting a first-class diploma you can earn \$1 a month more than the honest Protestant servant; but the latter has her board thrown in, so that on the whole it is better not to waste time on earning the diploma.

Educational bodies in some of the larger cities of the United States have been advocating shorter hours for young children. Two or three hours a day ought to be quite sufficient for children, say, under nine years of age. The kindergarten classes are usually held in the morning hours only. After spending a year or so in this easy way, the child is suddenly transferred to a class in which it has two sessions a day, and five or six hours of confinement.

Lord Roseberry is said to be engaged upon a history of the Stanhope family, with which he is connected through his mother. She, it may be recalled was the daughter of the fourth Earl of Stanhope. A young Edinburgh lawyer by the way, is about to publish a novel, in which Lord Roseberry figures as the chief character.

Hon Geo Foster, who has positively retired from politics once a month since general elections, is now talked of as the West York candidate. Hon Geo will have to say it all over again.—Montreal Herald.

A GREAT FAILURE.

Was the Military Part of
the St. John Celebration.

IN HONOR OF THE DUKE AND
DUCHESS OF YORK.

Where the Redoubtable Major
Mude Came In.

VERY FEW MILITIAMEN GOT A GOOD
GLIMPSE OF THE ROYAL PAIR.

Those from this locality who took part in the military function at St. John on Thursday in honor of the Duke and Duchess of York, only have one opinion to express in regard to it—that it was a dismal failure from beginning to end. There was no march past or inspection by the Duke, the parade through the principal streets was abandoned, and the troops were not even allowed to line the streets during the passage of the Royal procession, though it was mainly for this duty that they were mobilized.

The four regiments detailed for street lining duty, marched with bands playing from the barracks square shortly after one o'clock and took up the positions allotted them, and fixed bayonets. When the Governor General's train, which was over an hour behind time, arrived, the redoubtable Major Mude, at once ordered the troops to return to the barracks green and prepare for the review. A good many are of the opinion that Col McLean, the brigade commander, would have been justified in disobeying the order, but the gallant colonel, in the interests of harmony, no doubt, thought it best to submit. The troops were accordingly reformed, and reluctantly marched back to the exhibition grounds. Here the five regiments, composing the force, were quickly formed up in line of quarter columns for the review, and had to remain in that position for more than an hour before the Royal visitors appeared—a portion of which time could very well have been spent on the streets. Naturally, the men became very impatient as also did the great crowd of spectators, who thronged the grand stand and nearly every foot of space outside the enclosure occupied by the military. It was nearly sun down when the Duke and his brilliant staff made their appearance, but there was ample time for the review had it been called on immediately, which was not done. The consecration of colors for the 62nd, a ceremony which might have been omitted from the program altogether considering the lateness of the hour, came first and consumed so much time that the patience of the waiting thousands, who could see or hear nothing of what was going on, became completely exhausted. A determined effort was made to keep back the crowd while the Duke was presenting the South African medals, but it proved a tough job. A company of the 71st with fixed bayonets charged the crowd at one point and drove them back, but at other points the wire fence was broken down and people swarmed over the parade ground.

When the presentation of medals had been completed the Royal visitors left the square, and the remainder of the program was cancelled.

The troops by this time were both tired and disgusted, and after being dismissed lost no time in getting away from the parade ground. They had the honor of presenting arms to the Duke, but only the men in the front companies were able to get a good view of him. In this latter respect they were as well off as nine tenths of the spectators.

It was certainly a most unsatisfactory performance all through, from the standpoint of both military and spectators, and it is not easy to place the blame. No doubt, had the Royal train been on time, matters would have gone along much smoother, but still too much time was taken up in consecrating colors for St John's citizen soldiers.

Fadettes in Montreal.

The Fadettes captivated the audience before the first number of the programme was finished. Of the programme, too much cannot be said in praise. It was well chosen, admirably executed and thoroughly enjoyed. The clever conductor, Mrs. Nichols, was generous with encores, and the result was that the audience heard several numbers not on the programme, and of a brilliant, popular nature that they did not expect.—Montreal Daily Star.—d.
