NOTES OF THE NEWS.

Interesting Occurrences
Paraphrased for Herald Readers

FROM LATE DESPATCHES AND EXCHANGES.

"The Nova Scotia elections were almost no-Tory-ous."—Montreal Herald.

An epidemic of typhoid has broken out in Stratford, Ont., between twenty and thirty cases being at present reported.

W. P. Webb, pressman of the Ottawa Citizen, had his left arm crushed to a jelly between the cylinders of a press Monday. It had to be amputated.

The morning Post of Hamilton has ceased to exist. Several thousand dollars have been sunk in the enterprise which had an existence of about sixteen months.

A Jackson, Co., negro stole a chicken, and, being arraigned before the judge, and asked: "Are you the defendant?" "No, sah," the darky replied, "I've got a lawyer to do de defendin.' 'E's de man what stole de article."

The steamer Hattie K., plying between Elk Rapids and Eastport, sank Sunday in Torch Lake, Michigan. The crew, consisting of two men and Captain Fred Smith and his sixteen-year-old son, are missing.

The Ontario Dairyman's Association intend shipping some further exhibits to the Pan-American, this week. So far the Association has carried off the highest honors. The judging for butter takes place October 15 and cheese October 17th.

A despatch from Dundee, Natal, to the London Times says that the Boer loss totaled over six hundred in the attacks on Fort Italia and Prospect. The Boers informed the prisoners that they expected to find the Fort Italia garrison only 10 strong. The burghers lost more men than in any previous action this year.

The number of deaths from consumption during the past week in Montreal, was unusually large, twenty in all. Other chest diseases claimed seven additional victims. Infantile debility was the occasion of thirty-two deaths, typhoid fever six and whooping cough two. The total death rate was 110;—Catholics, 91; Protestants, 15; Jews, 4.

Dr. Danford Thomas, the coroner for Central London, states that every year he holds 180 inquests on children who have been suffocated by sleeping with their parents. He is convinced there is throughout the country a great sacrifice of life from this cause alone. In Germany such cases do not occur, because every child from the day of its birth is put to sleep in a wooden box by the side of the bed.

A Glasgow correspondent of the Central News, London, says one difficulty with which the new Scotch syndicate sees in challenging for the American cup, is the fact that Mr. Watson has declared that he will not design another challenger. There is plenty of money ready to build a new boat if Sir Thomas Lipton does not challenge again. It is hinted in some circles that Emperor William has his eye on the cup. Mr. Watson designs all the Kaiser's yachts.

On Sunday the body of Patrick Dewar, an employe of the Merrittton Cotton Mills, was discovered on the rocks near the base of the Cantilever bridge at Niagara Falls, where it is supposed to have lain for about twelve hours. A deep gash was found in the back of the head. Dewar left Merrittton on Saturday morning to join friends at the Pan-American, but on their return they said they had not seen him there. No tangible reason can be given for Mr. Dewar's death. The body fell some eighty feet clear. He leaves one little daughter at Merrittton and an aged widowed mother, of whom he was the only support. He was about 26 years of age.

Senator Depew has confirmed the report of his engagement to Miss May Palmer, daughter of Henry Palmer. The young woman is 23 years of age and the Senator is 57. Miss Palmer is related to several New York families. She has spent much of her time abroad. Her mother was one of the three Herman sisters of New Orleans who were famous for their beauty. Miss Palmer's grandfather, John Palmer, founded and was the first president of the Merchants Bank

of N. Y. He died about thirty years ago and left a large fortune. Miss Palmer's family went abroad soon after her paternal grandfather's death. Senator Depew's first wife died in 1893. He has one son, Chauncey M. Depew, jr., who is about 25 years old.

A tragedy was enacted at Carbondale, Ill., on Saturday, at a time when the streets were crowded with people. John C. Brown was shot by Rev. Jos. McGammish, dying forty minutes later. The two men had been bitter enemies for nearly a year, owing to Brown being jealous of the relations between his wife and the minister. During the early morning hours Brown told several citizens that he would kill McGammish before sundown. The word reached the minister and he armed himself. McGammish had gone into a store to transact some business, and Brown seeing him, went to him with an open knife. He opened a quarrel and raised his hand to strike McGammish, when the latter drew a revolver and fired, the ball passing through Brown's lung. Brown leaves a wife and one child.

Toronto, Ont. October 7.—The Toronto Garrison had the largest church parade in its history on Sunday. There were 2,238 men on the parade statement, including all the recently organized corps, such as Mounted Rifles, Engineers, Army Medical and Bearer Companies. The students at the universities have gone in for volunteering this fall, and hundreds of them were on parade. The Queen's Own had the largest number of the infantry corps, 681 men marching in the new uniform in which the crack corps will go before the Duke. In his sermon Rev. H. Grasset Baldwin, chaplain of the Grenadiers eulogized Lord Kitchener, and expressed the opinion that he would have had greater success in South Africa if he had not kept Christianity out of the Sudan. The action of Lord Kitchener in forbidding Christian teaching in Khartoum was all the more remarkable because the college there bore the name of Gordon.

SUNDAY SCHOOL WORK.

Annual Report of the Executive Committee

SUBMITTED AT THE PROVINCIAL CONVENTION TUESDAY AFTERNOON.

Following is the full text of the report of the executive, submitted at the N. B. Sunday School Association convention on Tuesday afternoon:

MR. PRESIDENT AND FELLOW WORKERS:

Your Committee, entrusted a year ago with important interests affecting childhood and youth, extend to you cordial greetings in this first Convention of the twentieth century. For the third time since our organization in 1884, we meet in this city; and in York county which in many respects is a banner county. When one year ago the invitation was extended we felt it to be a most fitting place in which to open the conventions of the century; and your committee have united with the workers in this city to make the convention in every way worthy of this important opportunity.

In reviewing the past we gratefully say, "Hitherto hath the Lord helped us." Meetings of the executive have been held with regularity once a quarter. Several sub-committees have been constituted and have met from time to time as the needs of any department of the work have demanded. Our plans of work have been more efficient than ever before, yet because of lack of funds we have not been able to make all the advances that were planned. According to appointment our treasurer, E. R. Machum, attended the Northumberland county convention, Rev. A. M. Hubby that of Westmorland, and Rev. George Steel that of Kings county. The sending of a member of the executive to each county convention was one of our new plans, and has been successful as far as it has been carried out. As a means of strengthening the hand of the Field Secretary and as a bond between the executive and the counties the plan is full of promise. While our meetings have been well attended by members resident in the city of St. John the vice-presidents of York and Kings alone have been present from outside counties. Each meeting of the committee ought to be attended by the county officer or an accredited substitute.

Our new department of temperance under the name of the Sunday school temperance army has met an encouraging reception. Already an officer has been appointed in each county to further its interests by placing it on parish convention programmes and thus eventually getting it established in each school.

The Sunday school advocate as a means of information about the work, an interchange between the workers of province, county and parish has served a most excellent purpose. The suggestions contained in its columns are of a most helpful kind, and it deserves and needs greater patronage by officers and teachers, and it ought to be earnestly pushed in every county and parish meeting.

FINANCE

The carrying of a debt, and also providing for current expenses has taxed the finance committee.

This should not be in a work of such far reaching importance and blessing. Sufficient money ought to be provided without difficulty to meet current expenses—and it will be when all our schools appreciate the magnitude of the work. There is no school so poor but that it could contribute five cents per member annually. This would give us \$2,500 a year from the schools alone, and enable us to extend our work in many directions.

We continue to recommend to superintendents of schools the easy method of helping by placing the slips and the envelopes in the hands of the scholars. Some of our foremost schools have made a greater success in the use of these during the past year than ever before, because of the clear explanation given by superintendents and teachers to the scholars who gave and collected the small offerings. We believe that county officers are seeing more and more the wisdom of this course.

The executive committee deem it desirable that the time of holding county conventions be arranged by the executive. This will bring about better results so far as the time and labors of the Field

Secretary are concerned; and also will be the means of saving the funds of the association by lessening the amount spent in travelling expenses. We desire the county delegations to give this matter the earnest consideration so that they may be able to act wisely when the subject comes before the convention.

Believing that the spiritual side of Sunday school work is the all important aim of every true Sunday school worker, we recommend that a week of special prayer, following the regular week of prayer appointed by the Evangelical Alliance, be instituted in the schools, during which special appeals be made to the scholars to bring them to a decision for Christ.

FIELD-SECRETARY.

This important officer has continued to render efficient help to every development of our ever increasing association work. Many are the duties, as editor, field secretary, office secretary, collector and missionary that he is expected to discharge. The amount of work that he accomplishes is truly marvellous. Yet year after year he has sought to keep in closest touch with all Sunday school movements in every part of the province.

If the income of the association were larger some of his duties might be transferred to other hands. A small committee has assisted during the year in planning his work. But the executive trusts that before very long the friends of the association will furnish such means as will afford more substantial relief from some of the many pressing duties that devolve upon him.

THE DUCHESS AT BANFF.

How Her Royal Highness Employed her Time.

WHILE THE DUKE WAS DUCK SHOOTING.

Banff, N. W. T., Oct 7.—The Duchess and her party, after visiting the beauties of Lake Louise and the other lakes in the clouds above Laggan, returned to the hotel last night. They got back earlier than was expected, and no carriage was at the station. Her Royal Highness immediately proposed walking to the hotel, a mile and a half away. Several camera fiends got snaps of the Princess marching up the road staff in hand, but before a great distance had been covered the carriage with its galloping escort of mounted police appeared. Previous to the departure for Laggan the Duchess visited more of the show places of the park, including the sulphur pool and cave, where she signed her name, "Victoria May," in the registers with a gold pen, which Mr. Galletty, the cartaker, had had presented to him in Peterboro' some years ago, but which had never been dipped in ink. Mr. Galletty, at the request of the Princess, broke off a beautiful piece of the frost-like stalactites which are again forming. The original ones, which took centuries to form, were removed by vandal hands before the place was taken over for park purposes. The Duchess inspected some of the sketches of Mr. F. M. Bell-Smith, who has spent the whole summer in the mountains, and selected four of them, one of Vancouver, another at Glacier, a third at Banff, and a fourth on the Cayon of the Frazier.

One of the journalists in stepping from the car in the dark severely sprained his ankle, and Dr. Manby had to be called to examine it. The victim was as much astonished as gratified to be told this evening that the Duchess had sent a message from the hotel to inquire for him.

The Duchess attended St. George's Church last evening. Rev. Canon Dalton preached the sermon. In the afternoon she drove to Devil's Lake and other points of interest.

SLAUGHTER OF DEER.

It is So Great That it Will Shortly Lead to Extirpation in Newfoundland.

"In five years from now there will be no deer in Newfoundland, if they continue slaughtering them at the rate they now are, is the opinion of Mr. Willie Stephen, of Montreal who has just returned from a four months' hunting and fishing tour in the island.

Continuing, Mr. Stephen said that the antlers which were being shipped to the States and brought over on the steamer Bruce, on the trip he came over on, would fill three box cars. These were not being sent for sale or for commercial purposes, but merely as trophies of the sport. If this kind of thing continues deer will soon be as extinct in Newfoundland as buffalo in the Northwest, and Mr. Stephen is strongly of the opinion that the government should adopt strenuous measures to curtail this wholesale slaughter. He does not blame the Americans, who are the chief offenders; they go for sport, and naturally shoot everything that comes along if the government is foolish enough to permit it.
