THE LATE MR. WALLACE M. P.

Hon. Clarke Wallace M. P. whose death is announced, was a fighting politician whose strong words in his public addresses made many critics and enemies, but he enjoyed to a large degree the confidence and admiration of many in his own party, and especially in the Orange order of which he has been the head for many years.

Mr. Wallace was more of a politician than a statesman, and it is doubtful if his career was of advantage towards cementing the unity of the people. Probably he would never have arrived at the place he occupied in the Conservative government had he not led a society which is very strong in Ontario, and has sometimes been called an adjunct of the Conservative party. Mr. Wallace was a representative Orangeman and to hold that body, he was elevated to a place in the government, rather than because he was recognized as a great party leader. This much however is to Mr. Wallace's credit, he administered the customs department with energy and intelligence, and when the Conservative government sought to compel Manitoba to adopt separate schools, he boldly threw up his position and fought the remedial legislators tooth and nail.

Those who admire courtesy of speech in public men and fair treatment of opponents, had much to find fault with in Mr. Wallace, who perhaps to keep his brethren hot and retain his place among them, often employed language in his public addresses that he must have afterwards regretted. However the deceased gentleman had many admirable personal qualities which endeared him to his friends, and Canadians generally will choose to remember these to his advantage rather than the stormy periods of his political career and the strong language he often employed in denouncing his political opponents. Perhaps Mr. Wallace was entirely honest in his opinions; personally he was certainly a man of good character, but there is likely to be less bitterness in parliament because of his absence.

In the social and domestic circles, the deceased gentleman was a faithful friend and an agreeable companion. He was loyal in his personal friendships, and men followed him with enthusiasm, because of his sturdy fighting qualities, and his devotion to what he apparently conceived was his duty.

Parliament will miss Mr. Wallace, his party loses one of its most militant members, and the Orange order its most distinguished champion in Canada. His death will be sincerely regretted by many who had little sympathy with his political course and utterances, and will be very sincerely mourned by those who were close to him in his life.

NO USE FOR THEM NOW.

When Hon. George Foster was in active politics he very assiduously cultivated the Free Baptist people of New Brunswick, he was a regular attendant at their conferences in which he held office continuously for years, and generally occupied a prominent position in the denomination. But things have changed in many respects with Mr. Foster. He is no longer a member of Parliament from this province, he does not even cultivate his farm at Apohaqui, he has ceased to attend the Free Baptist conference, and the office he filled for many years has been conferred on another. Whether the brethren of his church are mourning the loss of Mr. Foster from the

political councils of Canada and his absence from the conference, may not be definitely known, but the fact remains that the clergymen and laymen who were assembled at Marysville gave no outward indication of regret in either case. It may have been an oversight, it may be that some of the brethren had failed to down the impression that Mr. Foster was working the church for political reasons, but at any rate the last official relation existing between the conference and the ex-finance minister was severed without the formality of resolutions of regret. One might have expected that in quitting as an officer of the conference, Mr. Foster would have sent some message of encouragement or greeting to those who did much to elevate him to prominent position in public life, but there was no such communication from the honorable gentleman.

Premier Tweedie, Hon. L. P. Farris, and Hon. A. T. Duon, left last night to attend the agricultural fair at Brunswick Maine, where Mr. Sanborn the noted horse breeder of Poland Springs will make an extensive exhibit of his celebrated French coach horses of which he has 150. Dr. Twitchell the eminent Maine authority on horses believes that Mr. Sanborn's horses would furnish excellent stock getters for New Brunswick, and the visiting members of the government may have an eye on the animals with a view to future importations to improve the standard of horses in this province.

Two hundred British veterans resident in the New England states, are coming to St. John to present an address to the Duke and Duchess of York. The British consul general at Boston, J. E. Bunt, C. B. will accompany the party.

Toronto resembles an armed camp, no less than 12,000 troops having arrived there for Friday's review before the Duke, which will be the greatest military gathering ever seen in Canada.

A LIBERAL VICTORY.

Tory Municipal Candidates Turned Down in Westmorland—Black Eye For Mr. Humphrey, M. P. P.

Moncton, Oct. 9.—The Tories met their Waterloo yesterday, in the Westmorland county elections.

The former council was overwhelmingly Tory, but the new council is overwhelmingly Liberal.

Liberals gained two seats in Moncton parish, one in Westmorland parish, one in Botsford and carried Salisbury and Dorchester.

The council will stand, nine Liberals, one independent Liberal and four Tories.

W. F. Humphrey, M. P. P., worked all day for his candidates in Moncton parish and they were both left.

PROCLAMATION.

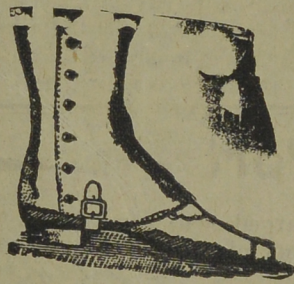

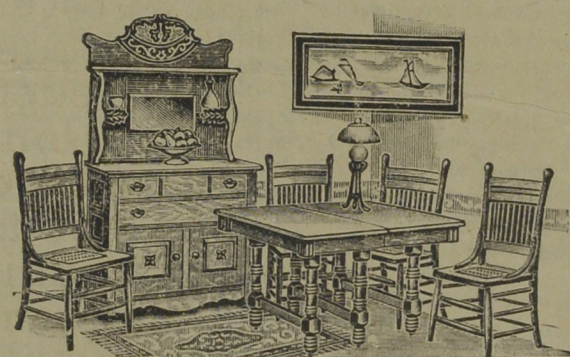
