at Dawson City.

ONTARIO MAN SHOT DOWN BY
MYSTERIOUS NIGHT
CALLER.

British Lifeboat Capsized by
Enormous Wave

AND ELEVEN OF THE CREW DROWN-
ED.

Storm Most Disastrous in Many Years.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

London, Nov. 14.—A life boat on its way to a distressed vessel near Yarmouth was struck by an immense wave today, and capsized, and eleven out of the crew of fourteen were drowned.

Other casualties are reported. The storm was the most disastrous that has occurred in many years. Snow is falling in all parts of the country.

The complete list of persons who have lost their lives by drowning during storm aggregates 160.

REPORT ONLY TOO TRUE.

Registrar of Yukon Formerly Quebec
M. P. P., Assassinated at Dawson.

Montreal, Nov. 14.—A despatch from Vancouver, says that word was received there that E. Girouard, Registrar of the Yukon, was murdered there Saturday, by a man named Lord.

A message from Victoria says that news of Girouard's death is confirmed.

This despatch says Lord did not do the killing but found the body.

No news has yet been received at Ottawa, as the wires are down.

[Girouard was formerly a member of the Quebec legislature, and had not been at Dawson long. Lord, who in one of the despatches is mentioned as the probable murderer, is also a former Quebec man, residing near Girouard when living in Quebec, and is said to have had a grudge against the latter.]

WILL NOT ALLOW APPEAL.

London, Nov. 14.—The Brussels correspondent of the Times-Standard, the Dutch newspaper organ of Dr. Kuypew, the Netherlands premier, insists that the administrative council of the Hague tribunal is unable to offer its good officer in connection with the Boer appeal for arbitration. The Boers must know perfectly well, says the paper, that their appeal will not be received.

KILLED AT HIS OWN DOOR.

Ottawa, Nov. 14.—At Hawthorne, near here, Frank Marshall was shot down by an unknown man, who knocked at his door during last night.

The bullet passed through his neck, and he cannot recover.

The affair has created great excitement. Marshall was not known to have any bitter enemies.

At regular intervals of about three months the man invariably made the same request, with the same results, always, however, getting a check inclosed. And thus it continued until Mr. Daly's death.

LINCOLN'S LOGIC.

How Old Abe Learned to Tell When
a Thing Is Proved.

A man who heard Abraham Lincoln speak in Norwich, Conn., some time before he was nominated for president, was greatly impressed by the closely knit logic of the speech. Meeting him next day on a train he asked him how he acquired his wonderful logical powers and such acuteness in analysis.

Lincoln replied: "It was my terrible discouragement which did that for me. When I was a young man, I went into an office to study law. I saw that a lawyer's business is largely to prove things. I said to myself, 'Lincoln, when is a thing proved?' That was a poser. What constitutes proof? Not evidence; that was not the point. There may be evidence enough, but wherein consists the proof? I groaned over the question, and finally said to myself, 'Ah, Lincoln, you can't tell.' Then I thought what use is it for me to be in a law office if I can't tell when a thing is proved?"

"So I gave it up and went back home. Soon after I returned to the old log cabin I fell in with a copy of Euclid. I had not the slightest notion of what Euclid was, and I thought I would find out. I therefore began at the beginning, and before spring I had gone through the old Euclid's geometry and could demonstrate every proposition in the book. Then in the spring, when I had got through with it, I said to myself one day, 'Ah, do you know when a thing is proved?' and I answered, 'Yes, sir, I do. Then you may go back to the law shop,' and I went."—Exchange.

ST. JOHN SITUATION.

Two Death from Smallpox
and One New Case
Developed.

CIVIC AUTHORITIES CANNOT GET
DAVENPORT SCHOOL FOR
EPIDEMIC HOSPITAL.

Quarantine Raised from Several
Houses.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

St. John, Nov. 14.—One case of smallpox developed here today, Felix Gallagher of St. Patrick street. The house has been quarantined.

There are two more suspects in the hospital.

The Gilberts refused to sell the Davenport school for epidemic hospital.

Quarantine was raised today from Wilkins' house, Wright street, McCarthy, Wall street, Ketchum and Hannab, Gordon street.

(Telegraph Thursday.)

Two inmates of the epidemic hospital died yesterday afternoon within an hour of each other. Both of those who succumbed were females, one married, the other a child. They are Mrs. Bertha Knapp, aged 24 years, of Sackville, who is survived by three children as well as her husband; and Maggie Sherwood, aged six years, whose widowed mother and two sons live in Indian town.

While inmates of the General Public Hospital, both developed smallpox which was accelerated to a fatal termination by pneumonia from which Mrs. Knapp suffered and tubercular hip disease with which the Sherwood girl was afflicted. The former died at 3 o'clock and the Sherwood child one hour later.

Mrs. Knapp developed the disease on Nov. 8 and the Sherwood girl one day earlier.

One new case was recorded yesterday, the infant of Mrs. Beyea, who died last Saturday. When the mother was stricken the child, who is seven months old, was taken in care by Mrs. Beyea's mother, Mrs. Coy, who herself since became afflicted with the disease.

There is also a suspect, a man named Gallagher, who lives at No. 15 St. Patrick street. Two brothers, Frank and Felix Gallagher, reside at this address and the case now under suspicion is one of them. Two sisters of the men also live in the house.

Dr. Morris reports that two of his patients—these not in the epidemic hospital—are in a critical condition. They are Wm. Alward, 10 Haymarket square, and Miss Odell, at Fairville.

At the General Public Hospital no new suspects are reported and the authorities are hopeful there will be no further spread.

Yesterday on information provided the board of health by physicians, Dr. Morris visited two sick persons living near the corner of Charlotte and Horsfield street, but reported that no symptoms of smallpox were apparent. One of those visited was W. J. Mahoney, the barrister. He is ill only from the effects of vaccination.

A possible suspect is a man named Sprout, who lives in one of the houses under quarantine.

Tuesday night Mrs. Henry Blair mother of the child who developed smallpox on Monday, gave birth to a daughter. The child was vaccinated by Dr. Morris shortly after birth.

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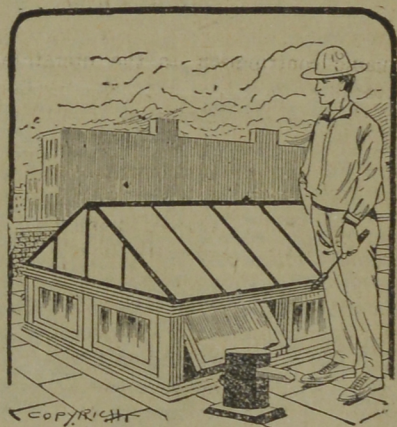
