BOY'S SAD DEATH.

Stealing Away from Home Young Luther Watson Went After Partridge.

HIS LIFELESS BODY FOUND NEAR A CHURCH.

His Gun Was Accidentally Discharged the Shot Entering the Neck and Chin.

Truro, Oct. 16.—A sad end came yesterday to the ambitions of a young country lad, whose more frequently expressed desire this autumn was to be a good shot and hunter of renown. With a shot gun and ammunition he started out from his father's house to look for partridges. No one was at home when he closed the doors of the house and stole away into the woods eagerly beating the bush for the birds.

His name was Luther Watson, age fourteen, son of Jeffrey Watson, of Harmony, six miles distant from Truro. When his parents returned home the lad was missed, also the gun.

Fearing harm had come to the boy, because he had not been much accustomed to the use of weapons in the woods, a search was made. The search failed and night fell without sign from the brave little hunter.

Then the countryside was aroused and up to a late hour this evening half a hundred men and boys scoured the wood, shouting and calling his name.

At last the search ended with the discovery of the boy's remains in a wood in the rear of the Harmony Church, his gun beside him.

By accident it is supposed the gun was discharged, the shot entering his neck and chin, causing hemorrhage, which doubtless quickly ended his life.

A peculiar accident which resulted in the death by drowning of Seaman Starks of Yarmouth and the narrow escape from a similar fate of his companion, John Davis, occurred in the bay near Yarmouth, Maine, Wednesday afternoon. Starks and Davis started from Yarmouth late Wednesday afternoon to sail down the bay. They had gone only a short distance when the jib halyards became unrove. To repair the trouble, Davis, who weighs 170 pounds, started to climb to the top of the mast. He had almost reached the top when the little craft capsize and sank, carrying Starks down with her. His body did not rise. Davis succeeded in getting clear from the capsize boat and was rescued a short time later in an exhausted condition. Starks was 28 years of age and unmarried.

The coroner's jury at Victoria, B. NOTES OF THE NEWS.

Interesting Occurrences Paragraphed for Herald Readers

FROM LATE DESPATCHES AND EXCHANGES.

There are now 909 lepers and 164 clean persons at the Molokai leper settlements in Hawaii.

The post office at Moodus, Conn., was entered by burglars Tuesday night, and money and \$4,000 worth of stamps were taken.

Wesley Roberts lost his life in Murray river, P. E. I., Wednesday. He shot some birds and in swimming out to secure them he was taken with cramps and drowned.

The rector of Ottawa University, Rev Dr. Constantineau, has resigned owing to ill-health, and will be succeeded by the Rev. Father Emery, of Holy Angels' College, Buffalo, N. Y.

Within a week about 28,000 barrels of apples from the Annapolis valley have been shipped at the railway terminus for England, the lot being divided between two steamers, the Furness liner Evangeline, taking 21,000 barrels, while the Grecian took about 7,000 barrels.

A bridge now being constructed over the deep valley of the Petrusse River in Luxemburg will be the longest stone arch in the world. The span will be 275 feet between the piers. This greatly exceeds the Cabin John arch on the Washington viaduct, which has a 220-foot span, and has formerly held the record in stone and construction.

A GIANT HUMILITY

Characterizes the Forms of Prayer Used in the British House of Commons—Curious Information.

In the British House of Commons the other day an Irish member asked the leader of the House who was responsible for the form of prayer read in the House. Mr. Balfour was unable to satisfy the hon. member's curiosity at the moment. But the researches of the editor of "Hansard" have produced an answer and incidentally supplied some interesting information. The first reference to prayer in the journals of the House is in 1603, but Sir Simon D. Ewes, in his journal of Queen Elizabeth's Parliament, writing of the Parliament of 1577, says: "It hath been the custom of these later Protestant Parliaments for the Speaker to compose a prayer, to be read by him every morning during the session; accordingly the Speaker made and read the following: 'We most entirely beseech Thee, that pardoning all our sins in the blood of Thy Son Jesus Christ, it would please Thee by the brightness of Thy Spirit to expel darkness and vanity from our minds, and partiality from our speeches, and grant unto us such wisdom and integrity of heart as becometh the servants of Jesus Christ. The subjects of a gracious Prince and members of this honorable House, let us not, Oh Lord, who are met together for the public good of the whole land, be more careless and remiss than we are in our own private causes.'" The prayer alluded to in the entry in the Commons journal of 1603 beseeches the Almighty, "because our hearts by nature are not fit for good cogitations, create a new heart and renew a right spirit in us, remove far from us all vainglorious Humour of commanding our own wit, all covetous Humour of advancing our private profit, all envious Humour of disgracing other men's gifts, all malicious Humour of hurting any man's person; and, finally, all forward Humour of opposing ourselves against just, needful and Godly things by whosoever propounded." There is a giant humility and directness about some of these exercises which might recommend them to some disatant legislative bodies with which we are familiar.
