

ROYALTY AT ST. JOHN

the mayor and then presented him to the duchess. Then the chief magistrate of the city presented the aldermen, who shook hands with their royal highnesses and bowed low. Hon R W Ritchie and James F Robertson were also presented as representatives of the citizens' committee.

Mayor Daniel, with the Duchess at his side, led the way to the dais, situated near the entrance of the building. The duke's suite immediately followed. The duke took up his position on the right, or western side of the dais, remaining standing with the duchess on his left.

As soon as the party settled in position, the school children, each with a flag waving, sang the national anthem and three patriotic verses of My Own Canadian Home. Three cheers from the children followed, but most of the scholars forgot to cheer for they were too much wrapt up looking at the future king and queen of the empire.

The St. John civic address was read by Mayor Daniel and afterwards handed to the Duke. Two other addresses were then read, that of the city of Fredericton and of the British societies from Boston. The address of Fredericton was read by Mayor Crockett, who was accompanied by City Clerk Beckwith and Alds. Everett and Moore. Other addresses were presented from Moncton, Chatham, Newcastle, Woodstock, Grand Falls, and the municipalities of St. John, Carleton, York, Albert, Sunbury, Victoria, Northumberland and Kings, but none of them were read.

The Duke's Speech.

When the presentation of addresses was concluded, the duke was handed his type written reply by his secretary. In a clear, loud voice which could be heard a considerable distance from the platform, his highness spoke.

Gentlemen: The duchess and I sincerely thank the people of New Brunswick, who, through the addresses which have now been presented, offer us a hearty welcome to the province.

I am gratified to receive their endorsement of those loyal sentiments to the throne and person of my dear father, the king, which have characterized the generous receptions accorded to us during our long journey through His Majesty's domains. I shall not neglect to transmit to him these assurances as also your tender expressions of sorrow for the loss of our late beloved queen, for whom the whole nation mourns, and for the further bereavement recently sustained by our family.

Your forefathers, the founders of the city, gave proof of their loyalty to the king and attachment to British institutions by heavy privations and hardships, patiently borne. The same sentiments animated their descendants at the present day. They have emulated the example of their ancestors by devotion to their sovereign—by services gladly rendered and lives nobly sacrificed to uphold the principles of freedom and justice.

I am glad to find from the kind words of the address from the British societies and residents of Boston that though they have transferred their homes to a foreign land their hearts still beat in sympathy for the aspirations and ideals of the empire of their birth.

I rejoice to learn that the people of different origins in this province are living together under happy conditions, united under the old flag, vying with each other in fealty to the crown and in upholding those liberties which are the birthright of British citizens.

We regret that time does not admit of extending our journey to the provincial capital and to other parts of the province and to acknowledge personally the kind and sympathetic greetings which have been so generally extended to us by its inhabitants.

Three resounding cheers were given when the speech finished.

Presentation of the colors to the British Naval and army men from Boston concluded the ceremony, which consumed less than 25 minutes. Lieut. Collins handed the colors to the duke, who presented them to Lieut. Colonel Graham, who knelt while he received the silk flag. Their Royal Highnesses immediately repaired to the Barracks square.

The ceremony on the barracks square was witnessed by an enormous crowd of spectators who had obtained admission by ticket. There were about 1500 troops on parade, the regiments being the 3rd R. C. A., the 62nd, 71st, 73rd and 74th regiments. His Royal Highness, clad in the uniform of a Colonel of the Dublin Fusiliers, was received with a Royal salute, the massed bands playing the National Anthem.

New colors were presented to the Fusiliers by the Duchess of Cornwall, Bishop Kingdon conducting the consecration ceremony. Afterwards a sword of honor was presented to Capt F O Jones, of St John,

and the South African medals were distributed by the Duke.

On account of the lateness of the hour the military review had to be cut short, greatly to the disappointment of the spectators. The Royal party left the grounds by the Carmathen street gate at six o'clock.

Upon arriving at Caverhill Hall, the Royal residence, the Duchess was met by a committee of ladies and presented with a set of furs and case. The presentation was made by Mrs. McClellan, on behalf of the women of St. John and gracefully acknowledged.

The Reception.

The most brilliant function of a day ever to be remembered was the evening reception to the Duke and Duchess of York. The exhibition building, the handsome decorations which have been already described, was transformed into a veritable fairy scene of gorgeous beauty by the glimmer of the lights and the splendid apparel, in its varied richness of the youth, beauty, culture and dignity gathered to do honor to the royal guests. As early as 7.30 the carriages began to arrive with their precious freightage of fair women and their escorts, and the ladies and gentlemen to be presented as they were driven up, passed on through the main entrance to the various dressing rooms.

When all had assembled there was presented a scene of brilliancy and splendor unequalled in the history of St John. The assemblage was fairly representative, in every sense, of the best that New Brunswick could offer in greeting to its future ruler, and one and all had come to make obeisance to those whom they delighted to honor. It was a picturesque grouping of varied interests united in a common purpose, and the dignity of the occasion was enhanced by the beauty and chivalry from all corners of the province.

Their Royal Highnesses took their place on the dais with Prince Alexander and their excellencies the Earl and Countess of Minto on the left and one or two others in attendance. Miss Grenfell, the Hon Mrs Derek Keppel, Lady Mary Lygon and Mrs Maude hovered in the background, while various men of note, too, watched the presentation from a vantage point in the rear of the royal party.

Each guest as he was presented entered the platform on the Duke's right, handed his card to Commander Fausset, who passed them to Hon Derek Keppel, he to Capt Bell, A D C, and he to Major Maude, who announced the name. Their Royal Highnesses grasped every hand and greeted each successive guest with a cordial smile, the one presented then passing on, saluting the Governor General and Lady Minto and Lieut Governor and Mrs McClellan with a bow, and passing around the opposite side of the platform mingled again with the crowd.

It was nearly midnight when the brilliant function came to an end.

The display of fireworks on the harbor during the evening was the finest ever seen in St. John. The street illuminations were something grand.

OFF FOR HALIFAX.

The Royal Tourists Say Good Bye to St. John.

St. John, Oct. 18—The Royal party took their departure from that city at noon for Halifax. There was a great crowd of people at the railway station and they were given an enthusiastic send off. The 3rd R. C. A. 62nd Fusiliers and 57 officers and men from the 8th Hussars, who acted as an escort to the Duke and Duchess, will leave for Halifax this evening by special trains.
