A Correction.

The account of an accident in a Maine lumber mill, published in yesterday's Herald, made the wrong man the victim. The unfortunate person was James W. Haney, son of the late Wm Haney of Ormococt.

Train Delayed.

The special train from St John to this city, advertised to leave at eleven o'clock standard, did not get away until after twelve. There was some hitch in connection with shipping the horses belonging to officers of the 71st regiment and this caused the delay.

Aged Lady's Death.

Miss Elizabeth Collie, an aged lady who made her home with sister, Mrs. Darlington, on Charlotte street, died on Wednesday aged 77 years. The funeral took place this afternoon to the rural cemetery, Rev. J. H. McDonald officiating. George W. Adams had charge of the arrangements.

The Stranded Lumber.

Lumbermen who have logs stranded along the river between this city and Seven Islands are becoming very uneasy over them. The season is now well advanced and if a big rise of water doesn't come soon it will be impossible to get the logs into the booms before the river closes, and if left in the river or along the shores they are liable to go out with the ice in the spring. There has been a rise of water of about eighteen inches up river during the last few days, but a strong gale of wind has retarded driving operations.

An Honor for Fredericton.

Of the large number of addresses presented to the Duke of York at St. John yesterday from the towns and municipalities of the province, only three were read to His Royal Highness, and Fredericton's was one of the three. This honor accorded to our city was the result of the efforts put forth by Mayor Crockett, who some time ago wrote to Major Maude, the Governor General's secretary, pointing out that Fredericton was one of the first cities to extend an invitation to the Royal couple and asked permission to read an address to the Duke. The result of the correspondence was not made known until the proceedings commenced in the exhibition building yesterday afternoon, when Major Maude announced that the address from Fredericton was to be read.

OUR SOLDIER BOYS.

Landed in Fredericton in the Midst of a
Heavy Rainstorm.

The 71st York Regiment, which took part in the military review at St. John in honor of the Duke and Duchess of York, embarked for home at one o'clock this morning and landed here at four in the midst of a pouring rain storm. The men were worn out after their hard work of the past 24 hours and lost no time getting to their homes and places of abode. While all enjoyed their visit to St. John very much, they do not hesitate to say that the military part of the show yesterday was a great disappointment. There was practically no review, and the men, thanks to Major Maude, did not even have an opportunity of seeing the royal procession as it passed through the streets. Both officers and men of the regiment during their stay were quartered in one of the exhibition buildings, the officers occupying a separate apartment.

The 71st was undoubtedly the finest rural regiment taking part in the review, and much favorable comment on the fine physique and general appearance of the men was elicited from the spectators.

The two border companies did not leave St. John until this morning.

The same train which carried the 71st to Fredericton, also brought between three and four hundred tired excursionists who had assisted in welcoming the royal visitors to the winter port.

SUDDEN DEATH

Of Thomas H. Hall of St John, From
Heart Disease.

The death occurred suddenly at half past three o'clock Thursday afternoon of Thomas H. Hall, a prominent King street business man, at his residence, Orange street. Although Mr Hall has been in failing health for the last few weeks, it was not thought that the end would come so soon. Yesterday morning, however, it was felt that he had but a few hours to live.

Mr. Hall was born in Nova Scotia in 1837, and when but young went to Eastport, Maine. From there, in his twenty-second year, he came to this city, and has resided here ever since. At first he was employed with the firms of Magee Brothers and Lansdowne and Mackin, but in 1861 he went into business for himself as a book-seller. This was his fortieth year in active business for himself.

He was prominent in the work of the Baptist denomination here and was one of the foremost men in the New Brunswick Baptist Convention. He was connected with the Leinster street church and for many years was one of the directors of the choir.

He married a daughter of Charles H. Estabrook, who survives him, along with their sons, Charles W. Hall of Fredericton, Frank, Kendall and Thomas of New York, Walter of Sydney, and their daughters, Mrs J. L. Masters of Wilmington, Del., Mrs A B Carr of Sydney, Mrs Dr Renner of South Framingham, Mass., and Miss Hazel of St. John. [M. S. Hall of Fredericton is a brother of the deceased gentleman.]

Sad News Received by a Fredericton
Family.

Policeman George Rideout received a telegram from Minneapolis, yesterday, announcing the death of his father-in-law Charles P. True, a former resident of this city. No particulars were given, but it is supposed that his death was quite sudden as relatives here had no intimation of his illness. The deceased was a native of Lincoln, Sanbury county, but resided for some time in this city prior to going west about three years ago. He leaves a widow, who resides here, and one daughter, Mrs George Rideout, and three sons, Clark of Minneapolis, and Harry and Frank of this city. Howard True and Mrs Henry Mitchell of Lincoln, are brother and sister of the deceased, and another sister, Mrs Palmer, lives in Carleton county. The remains will arrive here by the western train on Tuesday, and be taken to Lincoln for interment.

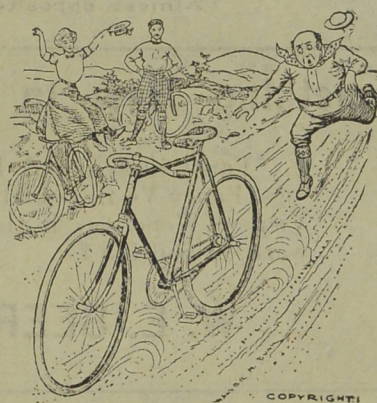
