

MONTREAL EXECUTION.

Laplaire Paid the Penalty of Murder.

WENT TO THE SCAFFOLD WITH UNFLINCHING COURAGE.

His Crime a Particularly Brutal One.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Montreal, Dec. 13.—Laplaire, the man who shot Madame Lefevre of St Cune-gonde, a suburb of Montreal, was executed in the jail yard at 8.09 this morning.

Radcliffe did the job very successfully, the man being pronounced dead seven minutes after the trap was sprung. His neck was instantly broken.

Lellaine was courageous to the last and went to the scaffold without flinching.

The murder for which he was hanged was particularly brutal.

Laplaire who boarded with Madame Lefevre was in love with her, and being enraged at her for imaginary attentions to her boarders, shot her in the back while she was engaged in domestic duties.

SOUTH AFRICAN WAR.

London, Dec. 19.—The correspondent of the Daily Mail at Brussels says in despatch that by a proclamation dated Nov. 15, General Botha ordered the execution of all burghers enrolled with the British forces as scouts who fell into the hands of the Boers. The correspondent adds that 15 such burghers have already been shot.

London, Dec. 12.—The war office has issued a statement dealing with the Boer treatment of Col. Benson's wounded at Brakenlaagte, which is a result of a special investigation of the matter instituted by Lord Kitchener.

The statement sets forth that 18 officers and men of Col Benson's command were kindly and even carefully treated by the Boers, while the remaining 75 men who were examined testified that they witnessed and suffered atrocities worse than those which followed the Vlakfontein disaster. These latter said that unarmed and wounded men lying around the guns were killed at close range, and that the survivors of the engagement suffered torture, being robbed and stripped of their clothing in spite of their wounds and broken limbs.

Lord Kitchener says that evidently the Boer leaders are no longer able to repress murder and outrage on the part of their subordinates.

London, Dec. 13.—Under a Pretoria date the Times publishes a telegram that the concentration under DeWet remains in the Lindley district. His attention seems to be occupied by the line of block-houses now building from Kroonstadt to Lindley. Steyn probably accompanies DeWet. Kritzinger is still in the Orange River colony. Wessels is now near Philippolis with 200 men.

MARRIED WOMEN IN A DUEL.

A quarrel growing out of jealousy is the explanation offered of a shooting affray between the wives of two of the best known farmers of Ithaca, N. Y., recently.

This is the belief of the neighbors who attracted by the sound of a pistol shot, hurried to a lonely spot on Cayuga lake and found Mrs. Charles Dreamer bleeding from a wound in her hand and Mrs. Arthur Higgins standing

nearby, pistol in hand. The women were badly scared, but refused to say anything about the affair. A second pistol lay on the sand nearby.

Mrs. Arthur Higgins is 25 years old, and pretty. She lives with her husband near the Ludlowville station, on the Lehigh Valley railroad. Mr. and Mrs. Dreamer live in South Lausung. Mr. Dreamer often visited at the Higgins home.

Yesterday morning Mrs Dreamer drove to the Higgins place, and the two women went away as if by appointment. Twenty minutes later the shot was heard, and Constable Van Auker was one of the first to arrive. He found the two women glaring at each other, and both panting. Only one weapon had been discharged.

The constable took both women home to their husbands.

St. John Smallpox Situation.

One death, no cases or suspects was the report at the board of health yesterday. The death was that of Mrs May Boone, of Brindley street, who died at the isolation hospital about 2.30 yesterday afternoon. One son survives her.

All patients under Dr. Morris' care are reported doing well. Yesterday morning Mr. Patterson, of the West End, was removed to the isolation hospital and during the afternoon Mr. Munford, of Simonds street, and Mr. Cullen, of St. James street, were taken to this hospital. Nine patients were allowed to leave the General Public Hospital Wednesday. There are only 12 patients there now.

Halifax, Dec. 13.—The body of an immense sperm whale over 130 feet in length floated ashore at Cow Bay yesterday. Fishermen and farmers of the locality are rejoicing over their good luck and expect to make considerable money from the sale of oil and bones.

Marie, Ont., Dec. 13.—It is authoritatively stated that plans for the big ship building plant to be located here by English capitalists, headed by Sir Christopher Furness, are now prepared and a site chosen. The plans call for the largest plant on the great lakes, and of sufficient size to allow the building of four lake carriers of the largest type at the same time.
