

HALLIDAY DOUGLAS.

THE NEW PROFESSOR OF KNOX COLLEGE WELCOMED TO CANADA.

A Man of Culture and a Polished, Effective Speaker, Who Will Be a Valuable Acquisition to the Presbyterian Church of Canada—Has Resonant and Well Modulated Voice.

That the faculty of Knox College has obtained a valuable acquisition and the Presbyterian Church of Canada has been materially benefited by the appointment of Prof. Halliday Douglas, M. A., to the chair of apologetics, homiletics and pastoral theology was the verdict of the large congregation which witnessed the formal induction of that gentleman at Knox College one afternoon during the first week of October this year.

Prof. Douglas is a man of culture and a polished and effective speaker. His voice is resonant and well modulated, and his style of delivery is deliberate, forceful, impressive and dignified. On that occasion, the Moderator, after devotional exercises, formally inducted Prof. Douglas into the chair of apologetics, homiletics and pastoral theology.

Rev. Dr. Warren, Moderator of the General Assembly, in the name of the Presbytery of Toronto and of the whole Presbyterian Church in Canada, extended to Prof. Douglas a most cordial welcome to the Presbyterian Church in Canada and to the Dominion. Prof. Douglas, he said, came with the highest commendation from brethren in the old land, in whose judgment they had long confided. Dr. Warren impressed upon Prof. Douglas the necessity of making himself familiar with the conditions of the church in Canada in order that he might be able to instruct the students under his charge. He felt sure, also, the professor would feel it incumbent upon himself to take an interest in the general work of and keep in close touch with the church.

Prof. Douglas, who was listened to with the closest attention, made a most favorable impression. He expressed his gratification at the kind words of welcome which had been uttered and said he knew before

leaving the old land that Canada was a great country, and that he would find the church of his fathers taking a full share in the religious and moral life of the Dominion, but it was another thing to come into the churches and observe the earnestness, the variety and magnitude of Christian activity which he had witnessed. Owing to the conditions which existed the Presbyterian Church might perhaps have been excused had there been a lowering of the standard of ministerial training; yet he found they had not sent men to their life work unprepared. He spoke of the necessity of a trained and educated man as preacher, teacher, shepherd and guide of souls, and appealed to the Presbyterian people to send from their homes to the colleges men inspired by faith, love and zeal for the work of the ministry.

Touching upon the branch of the work entrusted to him, he said the word "apologetics" was not a particularly happy one. It might have

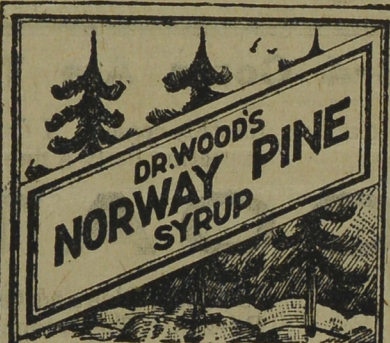

He called the chair of "philosophy of religion and evidences of Christianity," for the term implied to some that there was something to apologize for. The best apology for Christianity was to set it forth as it is in all its simplicity and power, in the glory of its divine work and saving grace. The task of apologetics is in reality evangelization; it is to make faith simple, to remove factitious stumbling blocks from the path and set forth God in His mercy and Christ in His power to save.

Prof. Halliday Douglas is a graduate in arts of the University of Edinburgh, and took his theological course in the Free Church College at Edinburgh. He was for three years pastor of the Presbyterian Church at Huntley, Aberdeenshire, and for the past eight years was pastor of the Presbyterian Church in Cambridge, England. During his ministry in Cambridge he was identified with the work at Westminster Presbyterian College in that city. He is a son of Dr. Halliday Douglas, Edinburgh, and a brother of Mr. Charles McKinnon Douglas, M. P., for Northwest Lanarkshire, who was for seven years lecturer in moral philosophy in Edinburgh University.

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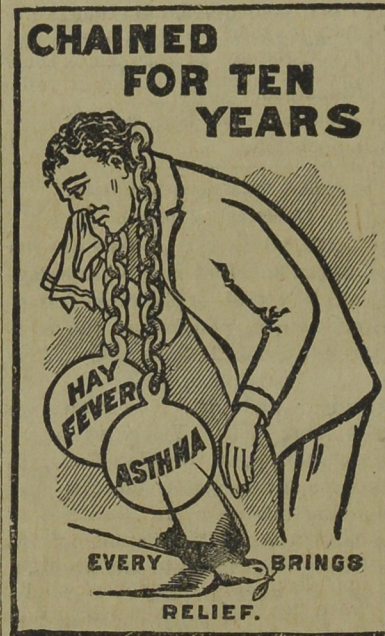
