TWO EFFECTIVE SPEECHES.

Hon. D. C. Fraser, M. P., and Mr. E. M. Macdonald, M. P. P., more than sustained their reputations as attractive and effective political speakers in their addresses at the opera house Tuesday night, and they must have convinced their hearers, if any such conviction was necessary, that the best thing the electors of York can do in this election is to reelect to Parliament, Mr. Gibson, the candidate of the Liberal party.

Both Mr. Fraser and Mr. Macdonald adopted a dignified, lofty tone of argument, their utterances were entirely free from clap trap and side issues, which often mar political addresses. They spoke from conscientious conviction, with the facts strong in their support, and carried the audience with them. Mr. Macdonald had spoken here before and the people were prepared for an eloquent effort, and they were not disappointed. Mr. Fraser was an entire stranger, but he was not long in getting in touch with his audience, and he delivered one of the most eloquent, well considered, effective political speeches ever heard in this part of the country. Mr. Fraser is a giant on the platform oratorically, as well as physically, and it is not too much to say that he simply delighted the meeting, and presented the Liberal case from many standpoints in a calm, dispassionate and convincing manner.

And if the audience was pleased with the speakers, the latter had every reason to feel gratified at the splendid hearing extended to them, the hearty unstinted applause, and earnest attention from the opening to the close of the meeting.

Hon. F. P. Thompson, who admirably discharged the duties of chairman, got in a few effective blows at Mr. McLeod's candidature in introducing the speakers, and has seldom been seen in better form. Indeed the meeting throughout was a most successful feature to Mr. Gibson's campaign, and will have its full effect in the contest.

A MILITARY RUMOR.

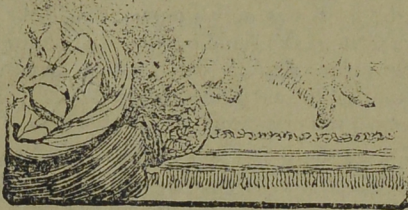

Toronto, Dec. 18.—The strike of employees of factories here will soon be over, the employees having agreed to a number of concessions.

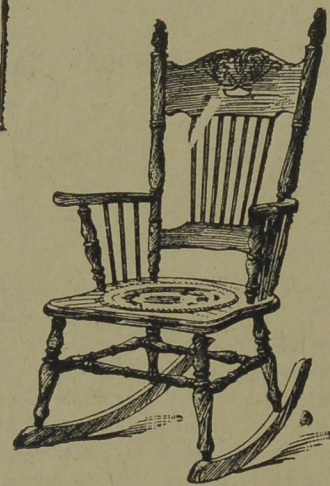
