

THE YARMOUTH MURDER:

Mystery Surrounding the Killing of Nathan Kaplan.

Yarmouth, N. S. Oct. 9.—Early yesterday morning news reached here that a Jew had been shot somewhere down shore. Earlier rumors gave out that the victim was a Jew pedlar who had been shot by a man to whom he was trying to sell goods, but later advices from Barrington and Clark's Harbor give the following particulars, though meagre:

The victim of the tragedy is Nathan Kaplan and he is a brother of I. H. Kaplan, of the Yarmouth firm of I. H. Kaplan & Co. He has been doing business in Clarke's Harbor for some time.

The murderer is supposed to have entered his place about 8.30 Monday evening.

Persons in the Seaview Hotel, adjoining his store, heard a pistol shot about that time, but paid no particular attention to it as it is not an unusual sound on Cape Island, where almost every one is accustomed to firearms.

Shortly after the shot had rung out, a Jew rushed excitedly into the hotel announcing that Nathan Kaplan had been shot. At once Kaplan's store became the great centre of attraction to the inhabitants of Clarke's Harbor. Those first on the spot found Kaplan dead with a bullet hole through his head, just behind the ear.

From the position of the wound death must have resulted almost immediately. Dr. Brown was called, but his services were not required.

Suspicion has fallen upon a young man in the village, a Jew, with whom it is supposed Kaplan had a quarrel, and he will in all probability be placed under arrest at once.

When Kaplan was discovered in a dying condition, the lights were in his store and the door was wide open. No one had been noticed about the premises and nothing was disturbed. He had kept store there about two years and had no enemies in the place. As yet there is no evidence pertaining to the murderer.

Nathan Kaplan was a Russian Jew, about 37 years of age. He leaves a widow and eight children, only one of whom, Morris, aged 15, clerk in I. H. Kaplan & Co.'s store here, being in this country, the rest being all in Russia.

After being in session all day the inquest on the body of the murdered Jew was adjourned until this morning. A number of witnesses were examined, but nothing was adduced throwing the least light on the mystery by which the case is surrounded.

The village of Clarke's Harbor, the scene of the tragedy, is one of the most thriving and prosperous fishing communities on the Nova Scotia coast. It has now a population of about 1,300 people, all dependent upon the fisheries for support. The harbor is a couple of miles inside Cape Sable Light, which is on the extreme southwesterly point of Nova Scotia.

THE STOLEN MISSIONARY.

The proposed ransom of Miss Stone the American missionary captured by Bulgarian brigands and held for a \$100,000 payment, is exciting great interest among the Christian churches of the United States, especially in Boston, and nearly the whole amount of the necessary funds has been subscribed. The state department at Washington is also taking steps to aid in the recovery of Miss Stone, and President Roosevelt himself is earnest in assisting in the enterprise. Fear is expressed however that if the brigands secure their price they will go regularly into the business of missionary stealing.

Evidently the brigands are very foxy individuals, as they have declared that any effort to recover possession of the missionary by force of arms will result in her death, and this threat has aroused the people raising the ransom to a high pitch of enthusiasm and excitement.

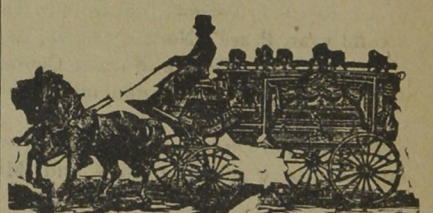
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
