

SUPREME COURT.

A Number of Judgments
Handed Down This
Morning.FOURTEEN SUCCESSFUL CANDI-
DATES FOR ATTORNEY.J. J. Fraser Winslow of this City
Among the Number.THE OATH ADMINISTERED BY THE
CLERK OF THE COURT.

The supreme court met at eleven o'clock this morning pursuant to adjournment, with the Chief Justice Tuck and all the other justices in attendance, except Justice Barker. Among the barristers present were: A. H. Hanington K. C. St John, T. C. Allen, K. C. clerk of the court, Geo. W. Allen K. C., M. P. P. J. Howe Dickson K. C. Havelock Coy, J. W. McCready, T. J. Carter, R. W. McLellan, J. T. Sharkey, O. S. Crockett, of this city and M. McMonagle K. C. of St. Stephen.

The following candidates for attorney, having passed the required examination, were presented by J. D. Phinney, K. C. and duly sworn in, T. Carleton Allen administering the oath:

Jack H. A. Lee Fairweather, Frank A. Sutton, John James Fraser Winslow, James T. Sherren, Frederick R. Taylor, Clements C. Allen, Henry A. Allison, J. Francis Kerr, T. Carleton Ketchum, James R. H. Simms, E. S. Ritchie, O. A. Baldwin, Harold H. Parlee, Barton L. Gerow.

In moving that the candidates be sworn in, Mr. Phinney stated that the council of the Barristers' Society in their report had specially mentioned Messrs. Fairweather, Sutton and Sherren, who had passed a highly creditable examination. Messrs. Ritchie, Baldwin, Parlee and Gerow, are graduates of the Kings College law school, and did not have to undergo the barristers' society exam.

The following judgments were delivered by the court:

Copp vs Bannister—Judge Hanington directed to refuse the order for a review.

Temperance and General Life Insurance Co. vs William Crawford Ingraham—Judge Gregory directed to refuse the order for a review of the case.

The King vs Sisk—Rule absolute to set aside the attachment and taxation of costs. The ground on which this judgment was based was that the defendant's attorney neglected to take out his certificate.

Steeves vs Dryden—Appeal allowed with costs with directions to the judge below to enter a verdict for the defendant.

Trustees of school district No. 5, Parish of Drummond, Victoria county, and C. E. Watson (defendants) appellants and Geo. Watson (plaintiff) respondent—Appeal allowed with costs with instructions to court below to enter a verdict for the defendants.

Ford vs Stewart—Judgment for defendant on demurrer.

Warman appellant and Christie respondent—appeal dismissed with costs.

Experte Vanderbilt, et al—motion to quash refused.

The court is sitting again this afternoon finishing up the business of the term.

REVISED CENSUS FIGURES.

Ontario Gains 13,000 and Quebec 9,000

Ottawa, Nov. 15.—There are still a few scattered census returns to come in for Ontario and Quebec, but the figures received since the issue of the first bulletin made a considerable addition to the population figures of these provinces.

The population of Ontario now stands in the census books at 2,180,550. This is an increase of 13,000 over the figures in the first bulletin. Of this increase about 11,000 is from the districts of Algoma and Nipissing. The figures for these districts were approximated in the first bulletin. The totals for these districts are:

Nipissing	17,970	36,552

Totals.....55,320 100,221

Thus the population of these districts has nearly doubled in the past decade. Part of the additions to the districts comes from the portion of Northern Ontario extending along the Albany River. These figures were obtained by Archdeacon Vincent who had charge of the Keewatin district to the north.

The population of Quebec now stands at 1,629,925. This is a little over 9,000 more than the figures in the first census bulletin. The additions are chiefly from

parts of Gaspé, the northern regions of Quebec and along the north shore of the St. Lawrence eastward from the Saguenay. They also include the figures of Anticosti.
