NOTES OF THE NEWS.

Interesting Occurrences

FROM LATE DESPATCHES AND EXCHANGES.

The Transvaal's gold output for October last was 32,393 ounces.

An anti-Roberts demonstration occurred at Aldershot on Saturday.

A Chicago firm has bought the Pan-American building for \$92,000 and will remove the material.

Miss Maria A. Keenleyside of London, Ont., was fatally burned by a lamp breaking while she was carrying it.

Arthur Lynch, the newly elected member of Parliament for Galway, who is living in Paris, has been informed that if he comes to England he will be tried forthwith for treason.

The death occurred at Halifax, Sunday of Mrs. McKay, wife of Rev. J. D. McKay, pastor of Coburg Road Presbyterian church in that city. She died suddenly at Stellarton, where she had gone for a few days' rest. Mr. McKay, before going to Halifax, was stationed at Dorchester. He has been married only two years.

No official invitation to send a military contingent to the Coronation ceremonies has been received as yet. It is learned that Canada probably will send one should the other colonies do so, but that it will be a matter of Imperial invitation and arrangement and the proposition would have to be submitted to Parliament.

A Paris despatch to the New York Sun says that at the International Court of Arbitration at The Hague last Wednesday the Russian representative, while agreeing with his colleagues as to the incompetence of the court, added: "The Government of Russia expresses its deepest regret that this struggle has not been submitted to arbitration."

GUARDING THE ROYAL FAMILY.

Traffic Suspended in London, When Announced that the King is to Use the Road.

London, November 26.—The transportation of royalty on English railroads involves an almost complete temporary disorganization of established schedules, the issuing of a new set of rules for the direction of train operation and strict care in guarding the dignitaries from personal injury. Among others, the following instructions are the most interesting:

"No train, engine or vehicle must enter upon or cross the main line at any point for at least 30 minutes before the time named in the time table for the passing of the royal train and all shunting operations on the lines adjoining the main line must be suspended for the same period.

"Should any down trains be out of time, they must be shunted into sidings at such stations as will insure their being at a stand 30 minutes before the royal train is due to pass them.

"No trains or light engines, except passenger trains, must be allowed to travel between any two stations on the opposite line from which the royal train is travelling for 20 minutes before the royal train is due to pass.

"No train, engine or vehicle having to proceed upon the main line must be allowed to enter upon the block section next to the junction for at least 30 minutes before the royal train is due to pass the junction, nor until it has passed the signal box in advance of the junction, in terms of instructions; and no train, engine or vehicle having to cross the main line, must be allowed to enter upon the block section next to the junction for at least 30 minutes before the royal train is due, nor until it has passed the junction.

"Drivers of such trains as are standing in sidings or on adjoining lines waiting for the passing of the royal train must prevent their engines from emitting smoke, or making a noise by blowing off steam, when the royal train is passing.

"The brakemen of all trains brought to a stand upon the lines adjoining that upon which the royal train is travelling, will be held responsible for carefully examining the loading of their trains, directly they come to a stand, to see that nothing is projecting.

"Station masters, signalmen and others in charge of level crossings must lock their gates, and not allow any vehicle of any kind to cross the line for at least 30 minutes before the royal train is due, nor until it has passed."

A REMARKABLE SERMON.

The British Denounced in President Roosevelt's Church by the Chaplain of the Transvaal Volksraad.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 25.—There was delivered in President Roosevelt's church, last evening, the most remarkable tirade against the British. The sermon was preached by Rev. Herman Vanbroek Hovsen, chaplain of the Transvaal Volksraad, who might have been expected to preach such a sermon, but the wonder is that he was invited to preach at all in a church where the President of the United States worships.

"The British army is hiding behind the skirts of our women and children," this preacher said, "and we have nothing left now to fight for except the independence of our country."

"May their hearts not turn to money and dollars," he said of American people in his prayer. "May they see that which is right and not look with favor upon the action murdering our women and children."

MONUMENT TO COLONEL BENSON.

One of the Best Generals in the British Army.

HE WAS FAMOUS FOR NIGHT MARCHES.

His Column Captured More of the Enemy Than Any Other British Force.

London, Nov. 26.—It has been decided to erect a monument in Northumberland to the memory of the late Colonel G. E. Benson, killed while in command of his column in the recent engagement at Brakenlaagte, South Africa, which cost the British 12 officers and 60 men killed. Col. Benson belonged to the Royal Artillery, and had seen a good deal of service, mostly in the Sudan. He was present at the battle of Hasheen, where he was slightly wounded, and at the destruction of Tamsi. In 1895 he went to Ashanti under Sir Francis Scott, and in the following year, to Dongola, with General Kitchener as brigade-major of the mounted corps. His latest official rank was that of staff officer in the Rustenburg command.

Colonel Benson had established a great reputation for surprising the Boers by night marches. A correspondent of the Times gave a description of Colonel Benson's work. In his expeditions in the Eastern Transvaal the colonel was assisted by the ever alert Colonel Woods-Sampson, chief of the intelligence. Since the formation of this column, about the middle of April last, the following captures stand to the credit of Colonel Benson:—

Fifteen Boers killed, 315 prisoners of war (10 wounded), 276 surrenders, 12 foreigners (prisoners of war), 504 rifles, 502 wagons, 207 Cape carts, 67,400 rounds small arm ammunition, 12,859 oxen, 250 mules, 1,772 horses, about 80,000 sheep, 447 women, and 1,412 children.

For six weeks the force operated in the Carolina-Ermelo district, making eight night marches varying from 22 to 35 miles each, the result being 103 prisoners of war.

Colonel Benson added the Times' correspondent, always accompanied the force in these night raids, and his presence not a little tended to keep up the spirits of the men.

SOME GOOD ADVICE.

How Gunning Accidents May Be Avoided

(Forest and Stream.)

Our greater population and consequently our more closely settled country with its much lessened game sections, and the great multiplications of hunters year by year, impose greater standards of skill and care on the part of the users of guns afield. Where the life and limb of others are involved, he who uses the rifle or shotgun should be a master or it. When society may not require that he must have a license from the proper authorities as a guarantee of his fitness to handle the gun, as it does in respect to the engineer, pilot, druggist, etc., to follow their vocation, there is nonetheless the same underlying obligation to observe the rights of the public. If the novice does not heed this obligation, it is only a question of time when he too must have a license which is a guarantee to the public that he is a safe man when gun in hand he wanders about when men, women and children also have a right to wander about, and therewith to live in peace and safety.

Before getting into a wagon it is no more than common prudence and foresight to remove the shells from one's gun. It also is but the task of a moment. If the horses should run away, if the wagon should break down, if the shooter should slip and fall in getting in or out, there is no possibility of death from the discharge of his gun. If the same precaution is observed when crossing a fence, there again can be no "accident" from the gun. If one keeps one's gun pointed in the air or entirely away from the person of others, even if the gun should be discharged when in hand, there again could be no accident. If the gun is placed against a tree, the cartridges being first withdrawn, then, if the dog knocks it over, or if it falls down

from any cause, there can be no accident. If the shooter takes care to know absolutely what kind of animal is moving, he cannot by mistake shoot a man for a deer. It is quite as easy to think that a deer is a man as it is to think that a man is a deer. Wait till you know definitely, then you will not afterward have to tell what you thought, with the added knowledge that a man does not remotely look like a deer, and that all regrets can not restore a life. In short, the matter of "accident" may depend on the matter of care and foresight more than on the unforeseen. Think about these things; and think about them before, and not after.

LADY AUDREY BULLER.

Says Her Husband Knows the Truth is Sure to Triumph.

London, November 26.—Lady Audrey Buller has sent a reply to a letter of sympathy from Mrs. Ashworth, of the Old Hall, Thackley, Bradford, who wrote that General Buller took the most difficult task in Natal, and that she for one thought that no one but Sir Redvers could have relieved Ladysmith under the circumstances. Lady Audrey replied: "Thank you very much indeed for your very kind, nice letter. \$750 FOR BROKEN PROMISE.

The Prospective Groom Was the Plaintiff in a Coaticook Case.

Coaticook, Que., Nov. 26.—An unusual breach of promise case, with the fair maiden as the defendant, was heard here by Judge Mulvena last week. In Valliere vs. Salvis, the defendant admitted having conditionally promised to wed the plaintiff, but pleaded that he was in the habit of drinking, and that she had accepted him on condition that he would obtain a certificate from his parish priest that he was a well-behaved young man. He had never produced that certificate, and that was her reason for refusing to marry him. The amount of damages was laid for \$47, and in that claim was \$4 for publishing the banns, \$8.50 for the wedding ring, \$18 for a suit of clothes, and the balance for travelling expenses on several trips to the home of the bride elect. The judge, in rendering judgment, referred to the fact that it was rather unusual for such a case to come before the court, but the law was the same for one sex as the other. The item for the suit of clothes and the travelling expenses was rejected by the court, as they could not be classed as damages. The items for the publication of the banns and the ring were allowed, but the court valued the ring at \$5, and allowed the plaintiff \$3.50 thereon, thus assessing the total claim for damages at \$7.50.

The proposition made by some good ladies in Toronto of importing colored help from Barbadoes in order to overcome the servant girl problem has evidently travelled a long distance, and is treated seriously. The Imperial Government has communicated with one of the departments at Ottawa, asking what basis there is for the statement that domestics from Barbadoes were required, and stating that information on the subject would be welcomed by that colony.
