

WILD MAN WITH APPETITE.

Bristol's Terror Ate Pan of Hen (Feed and 28 Hot Biscuits for Lunch.

About two weeks ago, says the Bangor News, the family of Eugene Chapman, living a couple of miles north of Bristol Mills, heard strange cries issuing from the woods not far from their home, and the story was at once abroad that a wild beast of some sort was at large in that section. Many a joke was cracked thereat. Others heard similar sounds which, it was claimed, must be from a wildcat. They sounded like the mournful wail of a person in distress.

But not until Tuesday was anything seen to satisfy the public that these sounds were other than creations of vivid imagination.

A family occupy the Crooker place next to Mr. Chapman's. The woman of the house at the above place was returning from the barn, Tuesday, when on nearing the house she saw some one inside. Upon closer inspection she saw a wild looking, unkempt, ragged man. Peeping in at the window the lady saw him ravenously devouring the food on the stove for her flock of biddies. The woman's first impulse was to call the neighbors, but not wishing to leave the house at the mercy of the intruder, she secured a better position and watched the strange object.

After the man had somewhat appeased his appetite with that kind of fodder, he next tackled a pile of twenty-eight newly baked biscuits, and after making way with the whole lot left the house by a rear door and disappeared in the near by woods.

There are all sorts of theories concerning the man—that he is demented, a fugitive from the law, or a tramp, but what is of more concern is how to be rid of him? No one knows just where he is hiding in the woods and until he is gone, nobody feels like roaming in the gloaming.

AN AWFUL EXPERIENCE.

Fell From an Express Train and Dragged Possibly to Death.

Sydney, Nov. 1.—Suffering from agonizing injuries which rendered him powerless to move hand or foot and with his clothes in tatters, John McKenzie laid alongside the I. C. R. track a quarter of a mile from Shenacadie from early last night until seven o'clock this morning.

Thursday morning at Halifax McKenzie purchased a ticket for Sydney and boarded the mail train. When a short distance from Grand Narrows and less than a quarter of a mile from Shenacadie siding, McKenzie opened the door of the first-class car and stood on the platform. He had hardly been there a minute, when a sudden jolt threw him from the platform. His coat, however, in some unaccountable way clung to the car, and he was dragged for more than a hundred yards before he wrenched himself free. The train was travelling at a high rate of speed at the time, and the little outcry that McKenzie could make was unheard and the train sped on in the darkness, leaving McKenzie suffering excruciating agony alongside of the track.

Next morning he was found by section men and carried to a nearby house, where he was cared for until the arrival of the mail train that night. He was brought to Sydney and taken in an ambulance to the Dominion Iron and Steel Company's Hospital. Medical aid was summoned and for the first time McKenzie's wounds were dressed. His recovery is doubtful. McKenzie belongs to Pictou.

Westmorland Oil Wells.

Moncton, N. B., Nov. 2.—The New Brunswick Oil & Petroleum Company, presently doing operations for oil at St. Joseph's College, struck another flow of oil yesterday, in well No. 7. The oil was found in about the same quality as in the other wells, and the promoters are greatly encouraged. Oil has been struck in four of the seven wells sunk. All wells are in close proximity to each other and in each oil has been struck at about the same level. The boring will be continued during the fall and winter.

DRUMMED OUT OF REGIMENT.

Member of Royal Canadians at Halifax Dismissed for Heinous Crime.

A sensation was caused in military circles at Halifax, Thursday, when a man named Bigelow was drummed out of the Royal Canadian regiment for a heinous offence. The man came there from Toronto as head carter for the officers' mess. He was considered a model employee, and although not a regular member of the regiment was in a way looked upon as one of them. Having been employed in a Toronto club he knew his business well and gave general satisfaction. On Wednesday one of the sentries on duty at the barracks reported that Bigelow had been guilty of the grossest indecency and an investigation was ordered. A number of witnesses gave evidence against Bigelow, who was promptly discharged and proceedings may be taken against him in the civil courts. The circulation of liquor among the sentries was also traced to the man.

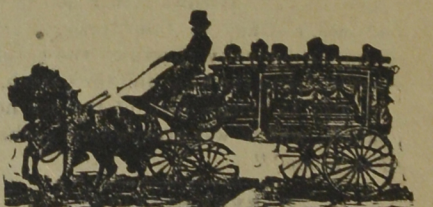
