Yesterday was foreign mission Sunday at St. Paul's Presbyterian church and the pastor Rev. Willard Macdonald devoted the morning sermon to a review of the work during the past year, which had been most encouraging. Missionary hymns were sung, and the annual collection for foreign missions taken up. At the evening service Mrs. O. S. Crockett sang a solo in fine voice and spirit.

Garden Creek Bridge.

The department of Public Works is calling for tenders for the work of rebuilding the Garden Creek bridge on the Woodstock road in the parish of Prince William. Plans and specifications may be seen at the residence of George A.

Strange, Kingclear, and at the Board of Works office. Tenders close at noon on Monday, Nov. 18th. Garden Creek bridge was swept away by the ice freshet of last spring, and was replaced by a temporary structure, which has now about outlived its usefulness.

How the Game is Worked.

The police are keeping a sharp eye on those dealers in tangle-foot, who hold out at St. Marys, and depend on this city for the bulk of their Sunday trade. It is said to be a difficult matter to secure liquor in Fredericton on Sunday now-a-days, but those who "know the ropes," and don't mind a walk over the highway bridge, can usually get their thirst quenched on the other side. One St. Marys' dealer paid a fine in the city police court last week, and it is understood that a complaint will be lodged against another at an early date. The police are determined to make Sunday liquor selling an expensive business for those who engage in it, no matter whether they reside in the city or county.

A Ghastly Discovery.

Some weeks ago Mrs. David McLellan went on a visit to Boston leaving her residence on Main St., St. John, closed, with instructions to her servant Miss Meisener, 42 years old, to remain with friends and not occupy her mistress' residence during the latter's absence. On Sunday morning Mrs. McLellan returned home and on opening her house found the dead body of her servant stretched on the kitchen floor. Miss Meisener had a key to the house, and it is thought she went into it ill and died of heart failure. She had evidently been dead a week.

THE U. N. B. WON.

Defeated St. John in Saturday's Football Game

The Y. M. C. A. football team met another defeat at the hands of the U.N.B. team in the match on the college athletic field on Saturday afternoon. Favorable weather prevailed, and the attendance of spectators was large. The game was keenly contested throughout, although the odds seemed to be in favor of the home team. The superior scrimmage work of the U. N. B. told in their favour, and the St. John forwards did not seem to be in the same class with them. In the first half Thompson, for St. John, scored a try, but Shaw's efforts to convert it into a goal proved a failure.

In the second half DeLong and Patterson each scored a try for the university, but DeLong failed to convert them into goals. The game ended with the score standing 6 to 3 in favor of the U. N. B.

The splendid work of the U. N. B. team was quite a surprise to the spectators, and goes to show what careful training will do. DeLong and Loggie did great work in the forward line and Lenihan and McKenzie held their end up well for the halves. Patterson, one of the quarter-backs, also put up a splendid game.

For the St. John team good work was done by Powers, Malcolm, Markham, Shaw and N. P. McLeod. They were lacking in support, however, from the other players, who seemed to be needing in practise.

James Tibbits acted as referee and none of his decisions were called in question. The touch line judges were Messrs. McLeod and Crandall.

The St. John boys took their departure for home by the Saturday evening train.

Naturally the U. N. B. players are greatly elated over their victory. They have played three games this season with outside teams and only lost one.

There was the usual crop of accidents in connection with the game, but fortunately none of them were of a very serious nature. Davlin, of the U. N. B., received a severe kick, which laid him out for a time, and N. P. McLeod, of the Y. M. C. A., received a blow in the head, from the effects of which he has not yet fully recovered. Gordon, one of the St. John players, dislocated several of the small bones of his left hand.
