A Description of the Bridal

A POPULAR YOUNG COUPLE MAR-
RIED AT ST. DUNSTAN'S
CHURCH.

Christ Church Cathedral was the scene of a very pretty wedding at 2.45 o'clock this afternoon, when Miss Mary Partridge, daughter of the Very Rev. Dr. Partridge, Dean of Fredericton, was united in the holy bonds of matrimony to Gilbert Ferrabee, a popular citizen of Montreal. His Lordship Bishop Kingdon performed the ceremony in the presence of a large number of interested spectators, including about fifty invited guests, chiefly immediate friends and relatives of the contracting parties.

The bride who was escorted to the altar and given in marriage by her father, was becomingly attired in a costume of white China silk made over white taffeta silk, and trimmed with white valenciennes insertion. She also wore a white tulle veil sprayed with orange blossoms and carried a shower bouquet of white roses. The bride's dress was the gift of an aunt, who resides in London, England.

The bridesmaids were the two sisters of the bride, the Misses Charlotte and Muriel Partridge. They were very prettily costumed in white organdie over yellow silk, and wore black chiffon hats trimmed with yellow chrysanthemums. Mrs. Partridge, mother of the bride, was costumed in black silk, trimmed with mauve.

The bridegroom was supported by Jasper A. Winslow, of this city, and the ushers were Messrs. C. H. Allen and Douglas Clifton Tabor.

Prof Cadwallader presided at the organ and at the conclusion of the impressive ceremony played the wedding march to the beautiful strains of which the bridal party moved down the aisle and left the church.

The newly wedded couple and guests were immediately driven to the home of the bride's parents on Charlotte street, where a sumptuous luncheon was served.

The bride who is a most estimable young lady and deservedly popular among her acquaintances was the recipient of a host of magnificent wedding presents, the remembrances of friends in Fredericton, Halifax, Montreal and elsewhere.

The bride's travelling costume was a brown tailor made suit with pink silk bodice, and brown hat trimmed with pink.

Mr. and Mrs. Ferrabee left by the four o'clock train this afternoon for their future home in Montreal, followed by the best wishes of a host of friends for their future happiness.

will be escorted to the Barrack Square where the Duke will present medals to South African veterans and review the troops on parade.

Tomorrow evening's events include a reception by the Duke and Duchesses at the exhibition building, a magnificent display of fireworks, and a general illumination of the city.

The Duke and Duchess with members of their suite will occupy Caverhill Hall, residence of R. Keltie Jones, and Lord and Lady Minto will be the guests at the Macnutt residence, where Governor and Mrs McClellan will be the hosts.

A large number of Fredericton people have already arrived for the reception.

The I C R are making elaborate preparations for the carrying and accommodation of the royal party. Every detail has been minutely arranged, and nothing in the way of care and expense has been spared to guarantee the conduct of the country's guests with the same success that has characterized every movement since they first set foot in Canada. All freight traffic in and out for Thursday and Friday will be suspended, and every effort will be concentrated on the running of the royal trains and the many specials which will bring the throngs of excursionists to the city. At 8.30 tonight the royal train leaves Chaudiere Junction, Quebec, arriving in St. John promptly at 2 p.m. standard tomorrow. One half hour ahead of it all through will run the vice-regal train of eleven cars conveying their excellencies the Governor General and Lady Minto, members of the dominion government, and members of the royal suite, sixteen servants, twenty members of the press and others. Ahead of the vice-regal train will run a pilot engine to ensure the safety of the line, and following the royal cars will come the auxiliary train with the equipage of the party.
