

PROF. HAND KILLED.

Explosion of Fireworks at Hamilton.

Hamilton, Oct. 11.—Prof. William Hand, the well known manufacturer of fireworks, was fatally injured this afternoon in an explosion of powder at his factory on King street west. He was engaged in one of the small buildings in connection with the works at the time, and his body, face and hands were severely burned. He was taken to St. Joseph's Hospital, Dr. James White having been called to attend to his injuries. The firemen soon extinguished the blaze in the building. Prof. Hand died shortly after 10 o'clock tonight. He was over 60 years of age, and left a widow and family. His son, Mr. Thomas W. Hand, is the head of the T. W. Hand Fireworks Company, which the deceased founded in this city many years ago. This is the second fatality at the fireworks manufactory, Mr. Walter Teale, a partner of Mr. Thomas W. Hand, having been blown to pieces a couple of years ago.

Edwin Longnecker, aged 21, quarterback on the football team of the Brown Preparatory School, died Sunday night as a result of injuries received in a game last Tuesday. Longnecker, who was preparing to enter Cornell University, was heavily thrown and fractured his spinal column, became paralyzed and an operation was performed on him last Friday. He had a relapse Saturday and died at midnight.

New advances in wireless telegraphy are recorded. The London Daily Telegraph says Marconi has succeeded in transmitting messages through the air for nearly 350 miles, which is almost double the maximum hitherto reported.

An unique event at Brantford, Ont., was the presentation to the Duke by Professor Bell, father of Prof. A. Melville Bell, inventor of the telephone, of a complete souvenir telephone set, enclosed in a solid silver case.

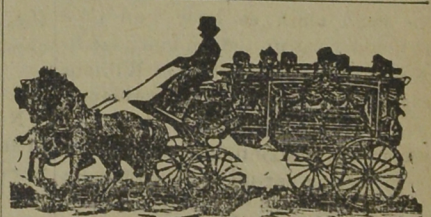
