FROM LATE DESPATCHS AND EXCHANGES.

The accounts of the Pan-American Exposition show a deficit of \$4,000,000.

It is reported that Trooper Collins, orderly to Gen. Pole-Carew, was carried away by a lion at Koomati Valley and killed.

Caleb Powers, ex-Secretary of State of Kentucky, has been convicted a second time of being an accessory to the murder of Governor Goebel, and sentenced to life imprisonment.

Statistics collected in Germany showed that more than 50 per cent of the cases of consumption could be traced to the habitual breathing of dust tainted with injurious substances.

President Roosevelt was forty-three years old Sunday. According to the custom in the family, the event was celebrated with a dinner, in which the children participated.

The King Alfred, the largest cruiser in the world, was successfully launched at Barrow-in-Furness, Monday morning. The King Alfred cost £1,011,750 and she will have a speed of twenty-three knots.

John H Macdonald, of Grand Narrows C. B., while driving with a Miss McDougall, fell dead in his wagon. The lady drove to the glebe house, a quarter of a mile away, with the dead body. Heart failure was the cause.

The annual field sports of McMaster University, Toronto, were held Saturday. A. E. Hayden, who tied with Dalgleish, of Victoria, a week ago, at a height of 9 feet 8 inches, broke all Canadian College vaulting records by clearing 9 feet 11 inches.

J. B. Evans, better known as "Topeka Joe," the famous postoffice robber, who escaped jail at Toledo, Ohio, recently, has been located in the woods near Sarnia, Ont., and a posse of men is on his track. There is a heavy reward for his capture.

Lord Minto unveiled a brass tablet in the Church of St. Bartholomew at New Edinburgh, erected to the memory of Cuthbert T. Thomas, Fred J. Living and William S. Brady, members of D Company, Royal Canadian Regiment, who fell at Paardeberg.

A Johannesburg despatch says that two surrendered Boers last week were sent to the police post at Dwaarsvlei to point out where a Maxim had been buried by the enemy. The search was successful, and the Maxim, together with a quantity of foodstuffs, was unearthed.

The Conservatives of West York, Ont., will meet in convention at Weston on Saturday, 9th November, to select a candidate for the Commons, in succession to the late Hon. N. Clarke Wallace. It is understood that Mr. Thos. F. Wallace, brother of the deceased member, will be the choice.

It has leaked out that while the Duke of York was at Halifax he received several threatening letters. They were written in the States, but said an attempt would be made on his life at Halifax. It is said they gave the Duke little or no concern, but his staff were considerably worked up over them, and precautions were doubled.

WANTS SELF-GOVERNMENT.

Premier Haultain Pleads Cause of the Territories Before Ministers.

Ottawa, Oct. 28.—The conference between the Northwest delegates, Messrs Haultain and Sifton, and the Dominion Government, over the status of the Northwest Territories, took place Saturday afternoon in the Premier's office, and lasted for about two hours. There were present, representing the Dominion Cabinet, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Sir Richard Cartwright, Hon Clifford Sifton, Hon W S Fielding, Hon J J Tarte, and Hon R W Scott. The whole question was gone into very fully.

Premier Haultain was the first speaker to present the case for the Territories. He pointed out that the time had arrived when the Dominion should take up seriously the question of extending to the Territories full Provincial powers. This would be the only permanent remedy because, as long as the Territories were depending upon the financial assistance extended to them from Ottawa, which is given now as a matter of grace, no matter how well disposed the Dominion Government was, and he recognized that the Dominion was well disposed, still, so long as this continued, it would be very difficult to secure suitable financial recognition. He spoke of the people of the West being well fitted for self-government. That was generally recognized. As it was at present, the Legislature had pretty well exhausted all the powers given to it in an effort to keep up with the growth and development of the country. The foundations for self-government had been well laid. He pointed out the position the Legislature had taken upon this question, and which was embodied in an address to His Excellency the Governor-General, stating that the time had arrived when Provincial autonomy should be extended to the Territories, and asking for a conference, which was now being given, to permit the whole question being discussed. While Mr. Haultain's speech was along these lines, he was particularly strong in his argument for the urgent need of an increase in the financial grant at once, so as to permit of the Territorial Government meeting, to some extent, the increased requirements which the rapid development of the country demanded. Mr. L. A. Sifton strongly supported the view taken by his colleague.

It was evident from the numerous questions asked by the members of the Dominion Government present that they were not only deeply interested in the subject, but that they had been looking into the latest phases of it. The Northwest delegates were ready to answer all the questions put to them, and when the whole matter had been gone into fully in this way, the Premier asked the delegation to submit their case in writing, when an answer would be forwarded as soon as the whole Cabinet had time to look into it. He promised the delegates that their views would receive the most careful consideration.

Mr. Haultain and Mr. A. L. Sifton will prepare the document before leaving Ottawa, and will hand it in to the Government. The delegation appear to be very well satisfied with the result of the conference, which was, of course, held with closed doors.

FARMERS' INSTITUTE MEETING.

Successful Gatherings and Discussion at Napan and Campbellton.

The Chatham and Nelson Farmers' Institute was held at Napan in the Johnson school house. A splendid rally of the farmers were out and the most successful meeting of the series so far was held. Besides the visiting delegates, Messrs. Raynor and Sharp, Hon. Mr. Farris was present and spoke of what his department had in hand to do for the department. Among other things he said they were intending to import some good horses into the province. John O'Brien, M. P. P., also addressed the meeting and spoke very highly of the good work Mr. Farris was doing for the farming industry of the Province. Mr J F Tilley, Provincial Dairy Supt, who had been in the neighborhood canvassing in behalf of the creamery there established, addressed the meeting very acceptably on Dairying. Mr Raynor took up Selecting and Cross Breeding of Animals and Cultivation of the Soil, and Mr Sharp discussed

Pork Production. Mr Alex Dickson, Mr Searle, Mr Geo A Fisher and others enlivened the discussions.

At Campbellton Saturday evening, only a fair meeting of the Farmer's Institute was held. One of the chief events of the evening was the presenting the Hon. Mr Farris with an address read by the chairman. It gave him a welcome to the town and vicinity and also referred to the good work he was carrying on for the farmers of the Province. He replied in fitting terms and referred to the establishment of Farmer's Institutes in the province and the proposal of the government to import some good horses in the near future.

A few farmers were present and a few town people. Among the latter were Mr. McAllister, ex M. P., and Mr. Taylor, the sec'y. The question of Cultivation of the Soil was discussed by T. G. Raynor and F. E. Sharp spoke on Pork Production. The January meeting will be held at Flat Lands.

DROWNED IN MOOSEHEAD LAKE.

Canoe Capsized and Charles Dudley and Louis Duffy Went to the Bottom—Companions Saved Themselves.

Greenville, Me., Oct. 29.—By the overturning of a canoe in Moosehead lake here, late last night, two young men were drowned and two others narrowly escaped with their lives. The dead are Charles Dudley, aged 16, and Louis Duffy, 20, both of Bangor.

Dudley and Duffy were employed in the Veneer mill here, and boarded near the lake shore. Last night about 11 o'clock, with two companions, they started for a canoe sail on the lake. The little craft had gone only a few rods from the shore, when it struck a floating buoy and capsized, throwing the occupants into the icy waters. One of the men swam to the steamer Katabadin, which was anchored near, and another succeeded in reaching the shore, but Dudley and Duffy sank and were drowned. Search for the bodies was begun at once, but up to this afternoon had not been recovered.

Woman Interrupted Rev. Geo. W. King.

WORCESTER PASTOR WAS EXPLAINING PRINCIPLE OF APOSTOLIC SUCCESSION.

Excitement in Trinity Temple Methodist Church.

Worcester, Mass., Oct. 29.—While Rev. George W. King was explaining to an audience last night at the Trinity temple Methodist church the principle of apostolic succession as held by the Episcopal church, he was interrupted by a woman dressed in black, who rose to her feet and evidently intended to take issue with some of his statements.

At a point of his discourse Dr. King said, "Not long ago the English church appealed to the pope of Rome to decide whether it had the apostolic succession. The pope decided that the Episcopal church could not rightfully lay claim to it. If you want to you can take all the time you need and study up this matter."

It was here that the woman interrupted. Her first words were:

"I am a stranger here in this church." Then she went on to say, as far as her words could be made out, that the Episcopal church still maintains the apostolic succession.

Dr. King attempted to proceed with his address, but did not succeed at first.

The woman spoke in a low voice and what she said was somewhat incoherent, but her intent was plain enough.

Dr. King finally asked her to wait until the conclusion of the service to make any further criticisms or explanations and proceeded with his address.

The strange woman was then persuaded to resume her seat. The episode created considerable excitement for the time.

SERMON WITH A SHAVE.

Detroit Barber Combines Religion With His Business.

Detroit, Oct. 29.—Probably the most unique feature of Clinton, Mich., is Will Katner, the preaching barber. Clinton is a pretty Lenawee county village of about 1,000 inhabitants. Its chief industry is a large wool-n mill.

In spite of his religious zeal Katner seldom goes to church, though he teaches a Sunday school class. His life is religion, pure and simple, he lives by the word, as he styles it, and as snares get into the wheat field of the church it is impossible for him to feel at home there.

As you wander along Clinton's principal and only business street your attention will probably be attracted by a bicycle rack and a barber pole. The barber pole is the conventional striped affair, but the rack bears in glaring colors this startling question: "Sinner, where are you going?" or words to that effect. Your first instinct is to enter the barber shop and find out.

Unless Mr. Katner is at work, you will inevitably see him pouring over a bible.

"It is my life," he says to the puzzled city visitor, who is accustomed to hear horse talk from his home barber. "My life is the bible, and yet I do not live, out the spirit within me."

Then, if you give Mr. Katner the least opening you will be shaved to the accompaniment of as fervid a sermon as was ever delivered at a camp meeting.

You will not find the Police Gazette or any of the sporting papers in Mr. Katner's shop. There are no pictures of pugilists or actresses on the walls. If you smoke a cigar while he is shaving you he will mildly protest. Instead of circulars advertising infallible hair restorers and dandruff cures, you will find a box containing religious tracts, which the proprietor will surely offer you if you are a stranger.
