CELEBRATED ASSASSIN'S DEATH.

London Anarchists Treated Czolgosz as a Hero.

London, Oct. 30.—Anarchist clubs of this city celebrated the electrocution of Czolgosz by dances in honour of "his noble death."

Various groups met at different meeting places and every mention of the assassin's name was lustily cheered. The police dispersed some of the groups.

The increased activity of Anarchists is causing some concern in Scotland yard.

BIG GUN EXPLODED.

Leavenworth, Kansas, Oct. 30.—By an explosion of a Colt's automatic firing gun at Fort Leavenworth today Captain Charles T. Menoher and five men of the 28th Battery of Field Artillery were wounded, three severely. The gun, a new one, was being tested and was allowed to become too hot, and when a shell came into the breech, it exploded, tearing out the breech fragments of which struck and injured the men.

HEAVY DEATH RECORD.

Sixty-two Men Lost During Season From Gloucester Fishing Fleet.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

Gloucester, Mass., Oct. 30.—The fishing season of 1900-1901 is now practically over, and the tribute in loss of life and property, which the ocean yearly demands of this fishing port, can be approximately made. Sixty-two men sacrificed in the pursuit of

their calling and nine vessels lost, three of them with their entire crews, comprise the casualties. The year's losses are heavier than last year which was the smallest in 23 years. The sixty-two men left 17 widows and 35 children. This makes the average loss for the past 24 years of 95 men each year. The nine vessels lost had a registered tonnage of 617 tons valued at \$67,000 and on which there was an insurance of \$52,843.

SOUTH AFRICAN STRUGGLE.

Kitchener Wires About Heavy Fighting With Boers.

London, Oct. 30.—A despatch from Lord Kitchener, dated Pretoria, Monday, October 28, says he has received reports of important fighting on October 24, near Great Marco River, when De La Rey and Kempt attacked a British force and were only repulsed after severe fighting, leaving forty dead on the field, including Commandant Omstirheysen. The British lost 28 men killed and had 55 wounded. The Boers carried off eight British wagons. The republicans appear to have paid special attention to the guns, as 37 gunners and drivers were killed or wounded.

Lord Kitchener mentions a number of minor affairs and says this week's "bag" consisted of 74 Boers killed, 16 wounded and 355 made prisoners. In addition 45 Boers surrendered, and the British captured 471 rifles, 75,950 rounds of ammunition, 216 wagons, 530 horses and 8,000 head of cattle.

VERDICT FOR \$3,500

Carleton Jury Awards That Amount to a Doctor Against C. P. R.

Woodstock, Oct. 30.—The case of Dr. Clarence Kirkpatrick against the C. P. R. engaged the attention of the circuit court on Saturday, Monday and Tuesday.

Dr. Kirkpatrick claimed \$5,000 damages for injuries received in the accident on June 20th, 1900, when the train went through the Grand Falls bridge.

The doctor was returning to Woodstock from Edmundston on the day of the accident. He received a cut on the head, his hips and right side were also injured and he was afflicted since with nervous thoma. The company, by its lawyer, admitted that the bridge was unsafe and that the company was liable for damages, but the amount was altogether too large for the injuries sustained.

The jury returned a verdict in favor of Dr. Kirkpatrick of \$3,500.

Dr. A. A. Stockton, K. C., St. John, and Chas. Cullen, represented the plaintiff and for the defendant there were H. H. McLean, K. C., St. John, A. B. Connell, K. C., and John W. Wetmore.

SLAUGHTER OF HORSES.

Buffalo Bill Loses Part of His Wild West Show.

Charlotte, N. C., Oct. 30.—One hundred and ten of the ring horses of Buffalo Bill's wild west show, were crushed to death in a railway wreck near Lexington early yesterday a.m. Among them was "Old Pap," Col. Cody's favorite saddle horse. "Old Eagles," the star ring horse, was killed and his mangled body fell on top of one of the wrecked engines. The mules which drew the Deadwood coach were also killed. Col. Cody spent yesterday at the scene of the wreck and is heart-broken over the slaughter. He says his loss is \$60,000.

The accident was the result of a head-on collision between a fast southbound freight train and the second section of the show train, and was due to a misunderstanding of orders. Several train hands were injured. The wild west show left Charlotte at midnight for Danville, Va., where it was to have made its last stand of the season. At Danville the show was to have been disbanded and the animals were to have been sent to Bridgeport, Conn., to go into winter quarters.

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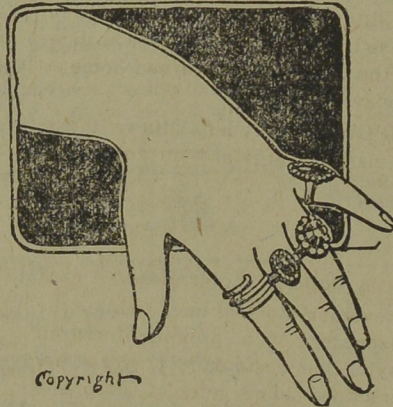
