

MR. HARLEY'S CASE

Prisoner Held at Halifax
by Police Authorities

AND OCCUPIES A CELL IN THE
COUNTY JAIL,

Contradictory Reports of Inten-
tions Towards Him.

PRESENT CONDITION OF MATTER
MAY MEAN

That the Ex-Manager's Friends Will
Put Up Money to Secure
His Release.

The British Bank people both here and at Halifax are very reticent as to the course to be pursued towards Mr. Harley.

After the Herald had gone to press last night a despatch was received at this office from Halifax, saying that Mr. Harley would leave by the train last night in charge of Deputy Sheriff Hawthorn, that he had apparently been abandoned by his Halifax friends who were expected to come to his assistance, and that his prosecution on the charge of embezzlement laid against him in this city would be prosecuted to the end.

This morning, however, it was learned that the Deputy Sheriff with his prisoner did not leave Halifax last night, but that Harley was held there by the authorities. This new phase of the matter was explained somewhat by the following telegram received at a later hour:

"Halifax, Oct. 30.—The Harley case took a surprising turn last night, and the former bank manager will not leave for Fredericton as expected. Deputy Sheriff Hawthorn arrived here yesterday with a warrant which was issued in Fredericton against Harley. Everything was in readiness for the deputy and his prisoner to leave on the Maritime express last night for Fredericton. Shortly before the train left, an order was issued by the bank's solicitor to the police not to hand the prisoner over to the sheriff, and they did not. A capias has been issued against Harley and the Halifax police will hold him on this for the present. He was removed to the county jail this morning. Further developments in the case are awaited with interest."

What the new move at Halifax means is not quite clear. By some it is interpreted as an effort by Mr. Harley's wealthy relatives to secure a respite for him until money can be put up to obtain his discharge. It is known, however, that up to Monday all efforts to induce the ex-manager's Halifax friends to advance the necessary funds to cover his default, had not received any encouragement.

It is now known for certain that Mr. Harley went to Boston from Montreal thence proceeding to Halifax, as he was seen in the first named city by more than one Frederictonian.

It is also stated that Mr. Harley, when arrested at Halifax Saturday night, was on his way to Fredericton to pack up his household effects, preparatory to moving out of the bank building here.

The prosecution it is understood is in the hands of the Bank authorities and was not started by the Fredericton gentleman who put up the money for Harley.

None of the Halifax newspapers make any mention of Mr. Harley's difficulties.

NEW MANAGER APPOINTED.

Mr. J. W. Hamilton to Assume Charge of
the British Bank Here.

SMALLPOX SCARE.

Tenth Case Develops at
St. John.

TWO DEATHS FROM THE DIS-
EASE—ONE AT ST. JOHN
AND ONE IN KING'S
COUNTY.

Rev. John DeSoyres Ministering
to Patients at Epidemic
Hospital.

(Telegraph Wednesday.)

Two more deaths have resulted from smallpox, Lemuel Sprague, of Hatfield's Point Kings Co. died at midnight Monday, and Miss De Bow passed away early this morning, at her home, corner of Delhi street and City road.

Miss De Bow was the first to contract the disease after the sailor, Barton, who died a couple of weeks ago. The death of the young woman was announced to those outside the quarantined house by Rev. John de Soyres, who has been at the death bed since last night about 9 o'clock.

Rev. Mr. de Soyres volunteered and requested the board to allow him to stay at the epidemic hospital with the other patients when his services were ended at the De Bow house, and he was granted a certificate, enabling him to enter the house, and last night, after donning special clothes and receiving precautionary instructions, the rector of St. John's entered the house to sit at the bedside of the dying girl.

Miss De Bow was 26 years of age. She had, as stated, been an invalid, and her weakened condition made her the less able to withstand the attack of smallpox.

Smallpox has appeared with fatal effect in the country, resulting in the death at Hatfield's Point, King's Co, Monday night, of Lemuel Sprague, aged 60 years, a farmer and a life-long resident of the place.

Indications are that Mr. Sprague contracted the disease in St. John, where he remained a day and night, about three weeks ago, putting up for the night at the home of E. V. Wetmore, a short distance from the epidemic hospital. The local physician, it is stated, treated him for black measles.

Amongst those who were at Hatfield's Point during the progress of the case was Miss Vail, of 121 Brussels street. It is not known how long she had been visiting in the locality, but it is believed that she, being an acquaintance of Mr. Sprague's family, visited him during his illness. As soon as smallpox became manifest and the houses were put in quarantine, Miss Vail made preparations to return to her home, and boarded the Bellisle boat and reached St. John yesterday noon.

The family of D. L. Noble, Haymarket square, received their first intimation of Mr. Sprague's death from Miss Vail, but whether she visited other families in the city is not known. Last night the board of health was notified of Miss Vail's return and they have taken the usual precautionary measures.

According to Miss Vail, there was free intercourse between the Sprague and neighboring houses, for the patient was widely known and esteemed. She stated that the quarantine at Hatfield's Point was strict and general, but has apparently given no explanation of her departure from the district for St. John.

About noon yesterday Mrs. R. J. Wilkins, 104 Wright street, was reported stricken with the disease. Dr. Morris visited the house and found the patient suffering from a mild attack of smallpox. The board of health decided to immediately place the house in quarantine and later, it was decided to remove Mrs. Wilkins to the epidemic hospital. A guard was placed on the house.

The Wilkins home is about 1,000 yards to the northward of the epidemic hospital on about the highest part of Wright street.

Physicians were worked almost to their limit yesterday meeting the demands for vaccination. The scare has proved a boom to the business of the professional men, as indicated by the fact that one doctor vaccinated over 70 persons yesterday, the fee being \$1 each. Last night little if any vaccine could be obtained at the druggists, and most physicians had exhausted their supply.
