

SLIDE FOR LIFE.

Yale Student Makes His
Escape on Ladder.BIG DORMITORY AT NEW HAVEN
GUTTED BY FLAMES.Loss of Many Thousands of
Dollars Entailed.

New Haven, Conn., Nov. 18.—The Hutchinson, one of the largest and most ornate of the Yale student dormitories of this city, was gutted by fire Saturday at noon, entailing a loss of many thousands of dollars, and creating a terror in the hearts of a great crowd of spectators. Shortly after the firemen reached the scene the dense clouds of smoke which had enveloped the building parted for an instant, and the figure of a man was seen standing on a window sill on the fifth story. He was apparently about to jump, but warned by shouts of thousands, he stood back against the window until, after several futile attempts, an extension ladder was put up to him. He slid part of the way down the ladder into the arms of a fireman who was on the way to rescue him.

When they reached the ground the man was found to be unconscious. At the house of a neighboring physician he was recognized as Eugene Hale Winslow, of Punxsatowney, Penn., an academic sophomore. An hour after his rescue he was still unconscious.

The fire consumed the interior of the great building, destroying practically all the furnishings and personal effects of 200 or more student occupants, few of whom were able to rescue any of their property in the dense smoke that filled the rooms immediately after the blaze was discovered.

The Hutchinson was owned by Frank W. Benedict of this city. Its cost, when constructed a few years ago, was \$200,000. The loss on the building is partially covered by insurance.

AWFUL MINE DISASTER.

Explosion Kills Five Men and Injures
Several More.

Bluefield, W. Va., Nov. 15.—Five dead bodies have been taken from the Baby Mine of the Pocahontas Colliery Company at Pocahontas, Va. Several other persons are unaccounted for and 25 persons have been rescued more or less severely burned.

Early yesterday morning it was discovered that the mine was afire. An alarm was sent in and the fire company responded promptly. Just after the fire fighters had reached the mouth of the mine and were attempting to extinguish the flames, some of the firemen and others having rushed inside of the mine to ascertain the extent of the trouble and to assist miners entombed therein, a terrible explosion occurred and many miners and their friends were more or less injured. It is supposed that the mine caught fire from a defective electric light wire. Five bodies had been recovered up to 6 p. m. It is uncertain if any more are dead but it is known that there are several men, perhaps eight or ten, still in the mine, unless they succeeded in making their escape through the Tug River entrance. Twenty-five persons have been rescued, all burnt, some seriously and perhaps fatally.

PLUM PUDDING FOR SOLDIERS.

The Soldiers' Wives' League Remembers
Canadian Boys on the Velt.

The Montreal boys who are battling for King and Empire in South Africa will not be forgotten at the approaching happy Christmas tide.

On Thursday there was dispatched from Montreal several large packing cases containing all sorts of toothsome delicacies and serviceable articles, from plum duff to chewing-gum, and from flannel underwear to boot-laces. These articles have been sent to the front by the Soldiers' Wives' League, that admirable organization founded at the commencement of the war by Mrs. Hutton, wife of Major-General Hutton, then in command of the Canadian forces.

The League has been ably assisted by Miss Gould of Montreal, who by means of a chain letter, some time ago, secured a considerable sum of money, the balance of which, \$300, has now been utilized in the purchase of plum pudding for all of the 1200 Canadian boys who are "out on active service." To the Montreal boys especially have been sent underclothing, handkerchiefs, socks, note paper, beef tablets, candy, raisins, chewing gum, pipes, boot-laces, and other useful and acceptable articles.

Sir William McDonald has contributed 200 pounds of tobacco, 4 pounds for each man. Pipes and cigarettes have also been enclosed with the other parcels. The boxes have been sent to Mr. Richard Solomon, George street, Cape Town, who will send them forward to their destination. Friends and relatives of the Montreal boys in South Africa, who may be writing to them, are asked by the League to remind them that they may obtain their parcels by applying to Mr. Solomon. The cases containing the goods will go to Cape Town direct from St. John.

A REMARKABLE STORY.

Woman Gave Birth to a Child After
Being Buried Alive.

Paris, Nov. 18.—A newspaper here reports a remarkable story from Pauillac. Mme. Bobin, a passenger on the steamer Laplant Senegal, was landed at that port suffering with what was supposed to have been yellow fever. She was placed in the lazaretto, where her condition became worse, and finally the doctors certified that she was dead, and she was buried. One of the nurses, however, doubted that the woman was dead, and communicated with Mme. Bobin's father, who caused the body of his daughter to be exhumed, when it was found that the supposed dead woman had given birth to a child in the coffin. An autopsy showed that Mme. Bobin did not have yellow fever, and that she had died from suffocation after she was buried. Her father sued the prefect and health officers, and was awarded 200,000 francs (\$38,000) damages.

UNLOADED A BABY

On an Unsuspecting Montrealeer, Who
Found Himself Much Embarrassed.

Boston, Mass., Nov. 18.—Patrick Ryan, of Montreal, on a visit to Lynn, Mass., Saturday evening, had an amusing experience with a baby. Mr. Ryan had been visiting Boston and took an express train for Lynn. A young woman, pretty, well dressed and with an infant in her arms, took a seat by his side. Suddenly she remarked, "There, I have forgotten my ticket." She turned to Mr. Ryan and asked him if he would willingly care for the baby a minute while she went for the ticket. Mr. Ryan gallantly offered to take the baby. The young woman did not return and the train started with Mr. Ryan doing his best to quiet the squalling infant. Sympathetic women on the train came to Mr. Ryan's aid, but they seemed to enjoy the predicament after he had told his story, and some were inclined to shake their heads and look wise. Mr. Ryan had enough of the role of father by the time he reached Lynn, and he left the train at a two-forty clip and told his troubles to a policeman. The baby was sent to a Lynn institution for care.

VERDICT OF \$250 FOR A TOOTH.

Wrestler Muldoon Strikes a Baker and
Is Sued for \$5000.

White Plains, N. Y., Nov. 18.—A jury in the Westchester county court gave to Joseph Suda \$250 for the loss of a tooth which, he said, was knocked out of his mouth by William Muldoon, the wrestler. Last spring Muldoon, with some patrons of his sanitarium, was driving by Rye lake, three miles west of this village, when Suda, who is a prosperous baker, came along. Muldoon called to him to get out of the road. He refused, and a fight took place, the baker coming out second best.

Muldoon said at the trial that Suda's tooth fell out of his jaw because of fright and old age. On the stand Suda said that Muldoon hit him so hard that he turned a double somersault, and when he was able to get on his feet his tooth was missing. Suda asked for \$5000 damages.

The jury brought in a verdict for \$250 for Suda, saying that he had suffered that amount through the loss of the tooth.

Tragedies of the Sea.

Halifax, Nov. 18.—News reached here from Louisburg, C. B., last night, that the Norwegian steamer Ella had been wrecked on the coast of Newfoundland Saturday, and that all on board perished. No further particulars of the disaster are obtainable. The Ella was running in the Black Diamond line, between Montreal and St. John's with freight, and left Montreal Thursday.

News was received last night of another wreck on the Newfoundland coast. The barque Titania, from Liverpool for St. John's, was dashed to pieces near Trepassy. One man was killed by a falling spar and the remainder of the crew managed to reach shore after a terrible experience.
