Clyde Fitch is a tireless worker. He writes much and reads more and says "the reason some persons are 'written out' is that they don't do enough 'reading in.'"

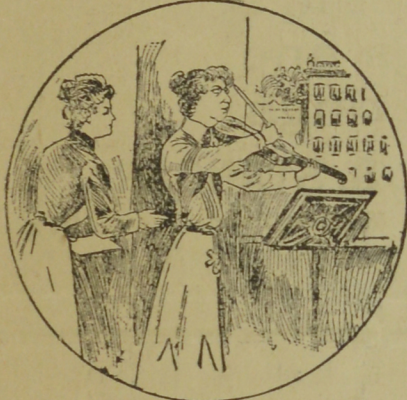
